ASHGABAT: Meeting of the Prime Minister with President of Türkiye on the sidelines of International Conference on Peace and Trust Prime Minister Muhammad Shehbaz Sharif met H.E. GILGIT-BALTISTAN: President Asf Ali Zardari on Friday approved the schedule for the upcoming general elections in Gilgit Baltistan, according to an official notification. The notification read that elections for the Gilgit Baltistan Assembly will be held on January 24, 2026. Storm Byron razes 12 buildings in Gaza

GAZA: Gaza's Ministry of Interior and National Security said that response teams have fielded over emergency calls 4.300 from residents through out the enclave since the storm began, Al Jazeera reported. In the past few hours, the ministry said at least 12 previously shelled buildings have collapsed because of powerful winds and heavy rainfall. The ministry said its police forces were helping civil defence and municipal teams conduct rescue operations despite limited resources. Several people were missing, and authorities believe they may be trapped beneath the rubble of collapsed buildings or remain unaccounted for.

Five cops injured in **Bannu blast**

BANNU: Five cops were injured after terrorists launched a late-night attack on a police checkpost in Shaikh Landak area located within the Havaid police jurisdiction in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa's Bannu, it emerged on Friday.

A statement released by the spokesperson for the regional police officer, Kashif Nawaz, said Fitna al Khawarij terrorists attacked the post late on Thursday night.

Fitna al Khawarij is a term the state uses for terrorists belonging to the banned Tehreek-i-Taliban Pakistan (TTP). The statement said that police personnel showed courage, bravery and acted in a timely manner, managing to repel the attack.

"As a result of the effective and vigorous retaliatory fire by the police, the terrorists suffered heavy casualties," the statement said. It said that the exchange of fire continued for three hours, adding that reports suggested that several terrorists had been killed and injured. It added that armed tribesmen and members of the peace committee backed police personnel in the gunfight with the terrorists. ISLAMABAD: In a significant step towards leveraging emerging financial technologies to strengthen Pakistan's capital markets and enhance global investor access, the Ministry of Finance, Government of Pakistan, today signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Binance Investments Co., Ltd., one of the world's leading blockchain and digital asset technology companies.

The MoU was signed at the Finance Division, Islamabad, by Federal Minister for Finance and Revenue, Senator Muhammad Aurangzeb, and Mr. Richard Teng, Co-CEO of Binance, in the presence of Mr. Changpeng Zhao (CZ), CEO of Binance. The MoU establishes a framework for exploring potential collaboration on the tokenisation and blockchain-based distribution of Pakistan's real-world and sovereign assets, including government bonds, treasury bills, commodity reserves and other federally owned assets. Subject to applicable laws, policies and regulatory approvals, the initiative may involve assets of up to USD 2 billion, with the objective of enhancing liquidity, transparency and international market accessibility. Under the proposed arrangement, Binance and/or its affiliates may provide technical expertise, advisory support, training and capacity building to enable Pakistan to assess modern, compliant blockchain infrastructure.


SBP likely to hold rate at 11% as IMF flags inflation risks

All 12 analysts surveyed in a Reuters poll expect no cut in the policy meeting on Monday

KARACHI: The State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) is expected to retain interest rates at 11% on Monday, a Reuters poll showed, as analysts push back rate-cut forecasts to late 2026 after the IMF warned inflation risks persist and policy must stay "appropriately tight". All 12 analysts surveyed expect no cut in the policy meeting on Monday. A majority of them see inflation hovering at 6%-8% in the coming months before rising again toward the end of fiscal 2026 as base effects fade and food and transport prices stay volatile after flood-related supply disruptions. Most respondents now believe the central bank will not begin easing until the closing months of FY26, which ends in June 2026, with some analysts pushing forecasts for the first cut into fiscal year 2027, beginning July 2026. The IMF, in a second review released on Thursday, said monetary policy needs to remain "appropriately tight and data-dependent" to keep expectations anchored and noted that the SBP had maintained positive real interest rates on a forward-looking basis.

It said the tight stance had been pivotal in reducing inflation and should be maintained to ensure price stability and support the rebuilding of external buffers. Analysts said these risks, along with the SBP's preference for maintaining positive real interest rates, would keep policymakers cautious. The SBP has held its policy rate at 11% since September, after cutting it by 1,100 basis points between June 2024 and May 2025 as inflation fell sharply from highs near 40% in 2023.

Forced DNA testing violation of rights, rules SC

ISLAMABAD: The Supreme Court of Pakistan has ruled that compelling an individual to undergo a DNA test is a clear violation of fundamental rights, declaring that such an order infringes upon personal dignity and cannot be made part of the legal process.

In a significant judgment, the apex court set aside the directives of the Lahore High Court and the Special Judge Anti-Corruption Pakpattan, which had required a citizen, Khalid Hameed, to undergo a compulsory DNA test. The Court held that forcing a person to take a DNA test in matters such as paternity disputes or alleged tampering with documents constitutes a blatant violation of fundamental rights. According to the approved written judgment authored by Justice Muhammad Hashim Khan Kakar, DNA testing is a highly sensi-

The judgment further noted that the private complaint filed by the petitioner was originally related to allegations of forgery and corruption. Questions of paternity or lineage were not directly connected with the case. The Supreme Court clarified that crimes such as forgery must be proven through evidence and documentary record, not through DNA testing. Citing Articles 9 and 14 of the Constitution, the Court reiterated that personal liberty and privacy are fundamental rights of every citizen. Forcing an individual into a medical procedure without consent is unlawful, malicious, and contrary to human dignity. The judgment added that raising unnecessary doubts about a person's paternity not only harms the individual but also causes social stigma and mental anguish for the mother and the entire family.

The Supreme Court emphasized that an order compelling a DNA test amounts to a violation of "personal dignity" and cannot be incorporated into legal proceedings. The Court noted that it has repeatedly stressed the importance of respecting citizens' private lives in previous rulings. The Supreme Court directed the Special Judge Anti-Corruption Pakpattan to proceed with the case strictly in accordance with the law, without the requirement of a DNA

Illegal cigarette manufacturing setup seized

ISLAMABAD: In a major crackdown on the illicit tobacco trade, the Regional Tax Office (RTO) Abbottabad has seized a fully operational illegal cigarette manufacturing setup.

The setup includes high-capacity MK-8 cigarette-making machines, a packing unit, stamping and bundle-making equipment, and substantial quantities of tow, packaging material, and non-duty-paid cigarettes, said a news release here on Friday.

The manufacturing facility was found running inside the hujra of a politically influential individual.

All machinery and illicit products have been confiscated, and legal proceedings have been initiated under the Federal Excise Act, 2005 The successful enforcement action follows just a day after RTO Abbottabad intercepted 3,000 bales of raw tobacco in a separate intelligence-based operation, highlighting a coordinated and intensified crackdown against illegal tobacco manufacturing and smuggling in the region. During the raid, enforcement teams discovered packaging materials belonging to Falcon Tobacco, which is already under investigation in a separate case being pursued by RTO Peshawar. The presence of these materials indicates linkages within the broader illicit manufacturing and distribution network.

The seized MK-8 machines. known for their high-speed cigarette production capability, were found fully operational alongside auxiliary systems used for packing. stamping, and bundle preparation.-APP

KP introduces major recruitment reforms

PESHAWAR The Khyber Pakhtunkhwa government has introduced sweeping administrative reforms aimed at ensuring merit, transparency, and uniformity in public-sector recruitment and postings across the province The initiatives were undertaken on the directives of Chief Minister Muhammad Sohail Khan Afridi. The provincial Higher Education Department issued an official notification on Friday confirming that all recruitments in government and semi-government institutions will now be conducted through the Educational Testing and Evaluation Agency (ETA). With this decision, all previous exemptions granted to semi-autonomous

bodies have been withdrawn, it added. Officials stated that the move is intended to eliminate discrepancies arising department-specific hiring procedures and to establish a transparent, merit-based system that offers equal opportunities to all candidates. Meanwhile, The provincial cabinet on Friday approved the e-transfer Policy 2025 for teachers in the Education Department. Chief Minister Sohail Afridi said the new policy would reinforce merit and transparency He noted that the digital system was a long-needed reform that would allow teachers to focus on their primary responsibility, education, without administrative hur-

He said that if a revision in fine amounts is deemed necessary, the government will bring an amendment accordingly, as public convenience and justice remain the government's top priorities. Senator alleges 'corruption' of billions at MOFA attestation wing

ISLAMABAD: After Senator Rana Mahmoodul Hassan alleged on Friday that "corruption of billions of rupees" was being committed daily at the foreign affairs ministry in the attestation of documents, a Senate body decided to raise the matter with the Foreign Office (FO). The attestation of documents, such as educational and marriage certificates, by the foreign affairs ministry is typically required for recognition by international and foreign entities. The matter came up during a meeting of the Senate Standing Commit-

tee on Foreign Affairs, where Senator Hassan of the PPP alleged corruption in the process and remarked: "Overseas Pakistanis are either running from post to pillar for a single signature or paying money for corruption." He said that people had been complaining about having to spend nights on pavements to get their documents attested. The attestation process should either be digitised or union councils and deputy commissioners should be authorised to attest documents, he stressed. Senator Anwaarul Haq Kakar also raised the question of why the process was not being digitised. "Is there a lack of resources?" he said,

adding that there should be an app for the FO. He further stated that the FO should be asked why the issue was not being resolved. "The higher-up in the Foreign Office does not want to let go of control, and the subordinate is running a shop," he commented without taking any names and elaborating further. "What is the job of the Foreign Office?" he added.

PML-N Senator Agha Shahzaib Durrani claimed during the meeting that a commander of the banned Tehreek-i-Taliban (TTP) had travelled for Haj and Umrah on a Pakistani passport.

At that, Jamiat Ulema-i-Islam-Fazl Senator Maulana Attaur Rehman asked, "Who

allowed the TTP to enter [the country]?" Senator Kakar responded to that, saying, "We, too, were with those who gave the permission." He also mentioned that when TTP's Mullah Mansour died, a Pakistani passport was also found in his possession. As the Senate standing committee expressed reservations over the attestation process, it decided to raise the matter with the FO. Earlier in the meeting, Senator Agha Shahzaib Durrani was elected to chairperson of the standing committee.

Senate body approves transfer of Railways (Amendment)

Bill, 2025

ISLAMABAD: The Senate Standing Committee on Railways on Friday unanimously approved the draft of the Transfer of Railways (Amendment) Bill, 2025 after detailed deliberations The body met under the chair of Senator Jam Saifullah Khan which was attended by Senator Dost Ali Jeesar, Senator Kami Ali Agha, Senator Rubina Khalid and Senator Shahadat Awan. Federal Minister for Railways Muhammad Hanif Abbasi briefed the committee on the objectives of the proposed legislation, saying that the amendments aim to attract investment by enabling track access for various stakeholders. He said that the provision would play a pivotal role in facilitating major national projects, including the Reko Diq project. The committee was informed that several provincial governments had expressed interest in investing in Pakistan Railways, and the proposed amendments would create an enabling framework for them to contribute to railway infrastructure development. The Chairman directed the Ministry to ensure the Minister's inclusion in the Board to reinforce public oversight and strengthen institutional supervision. The committee also recommended several measures to improve Pakistan Railways' performance. It advised the Ministry to engage Chambers of Commerce to encourage investment and expand public-private partnerships. The Chairman further instructed that the ongoing infrastructure upgrades-such as the installation of LED lighting at major railway stations—be extended to smaller

stations as well. He also called for enhanced public awareness campaigns on safety near railway tracks The Chairman directed the Ministry of Railways to present a comprehensive briefing in the next meeting, covering issues such as outsourcing, new recruitments, its effects on employees, manpower planning, budgetary impacts, and comparative revenue statistics before and after outsourcing initiatives.-APP

Senate panel seeks full disclosure of **ETPB** properties

ISLAMABAD: The Senate Standing Committee on Less Developed Areas on Friday directed the Evacuee Trust Property Board (ETPB) to submit a complete record of all properties under its management, along with revenue details, before the next session. The Sub-Committee, chaired by Senator Danesh Kumar, convened the same day, where the convener asked ETPB officials to brief the panel on the criteria and mechanisms through which the department generates its revenue He expressed concern that numerous ETPB properties had been leased out at disproportionately low monthly rental values, and instructed the Board to undertake a comprehensive reassessment and fair revaluation of these assets. During the briefing, the ETPB representative informed the committee that surveys of various properties had been completed and rents reassessed accordingly. Based on these surveys, rental values are expected to increase by up to 460%. The officials added that certain aspects of the matter were linked to ongoing judicial proceedings; therefore, progress was being carried out gradually and strictly in line with legal requirements. While reviewing the agenda, Convener Danesh Kumar expressed displeasure over the delayed submission of the working paper, noting that timely provision of documents would have enabled the committee to conduct a more detailed examination prior to the meeting. The meeting was attended by Senator Nadeem Bhutto, Chairman Evacuee Trust Property Board (ETPB), the Additional Secretary, and other senior officers of the ETPB. Highlighting the importance of the ETPB's mandate, Senator Danesh Kumar underscored that the restoration and maintenance of temples, gurdwaras, and other heritage sites play a vital role in projecting Pakistan's positive soft image globally. Speaking about Balochistan, he noted that the Hinglaj Mata Mandir hosts the second-largest Hindu religious pilgrimage after India. He informed the committee that one temple in Balochistan had recently been handed over to the Sikh community, while an ancient Mandir in Zhob had been restored and returned to the Hindu community. He further shared that a local Imam had participated in the inauguration ceremony, presenting an exemplary gesture of interfaith harmony.-DNA

Syedaal briefed on FIA Cyber Crime Wing performance

ISLAMABAD: Deputy Chairman Senate Syedal Khan on Friday met Director General of the FIA Cyber Crime Wing, Syed Khurram Ali, at the Parliament House, where the DG gave a detailed briefing on the wing's functions, performance, and challenges. The Director General explained that the Cyber Crime Wing (CCW) is a specialized department of FIA operating under the Prevention of Electronic Crimes Act (PECA 2016). Established in 2007, the wing is equipped with modern technology and possesses expertise in digital forensics, technical investigations, information security audits, penetration testing, and professional training. He further noted that the CCW is the only national institution that directly receives public complaints and takes legal action against perpetrators of cybercrimes. Deputy Chairman Senate Syedal Khan appreciated the services of the Cyber Crime Wing, expressing concern over baseless propaganda targeting political leaders and prominent personalities on social media. He emphasized the need for effective mechanisms to curb such practices. He stressed that strategies must be adopted that safeguard individuals from defamation and encourage the responsible and constructive use of social media in the national interest. He appealed to the public to use social media responsibly, noting that its misuse not only harms the country but also affects the reputation of key national figures. The Deputy Chairman expressed hope that FIA's Cyber Crime Wing would continue to enhance its performance and play a vital role in national development, public protection, and the promotion of healthy digital platforms. He underlined the importance of robust strategies to counter misinformation circulating on social media, stating that the role of the Cyber Crime Wing in this regard is of critical importance. -APP

Weekly inflation falls slightly

ISLAMABAD: The weekly inflation, measured by the Sensitive Price Indicator (SPI), recorded a slight decrease of 0.03 percent for the combined consumption group during the week ended on December 11, 2025, the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) reported on Friday According to the PBS data, the SPI for the week under review was recorded at 335.73 points, down from 335.84 points last week. On a year-on-year basis, the SPI increased by 3.90 percent. The weekly SPI with base year 2015-16 = 100 covers 17 urban centres and 51 essential items for all expenditure groups. The SPI for the lowest consumption group (up to Rs17,732) decreased by 0.26 percent, to 326.84 points from 327.70 points. The SPI for consump-

Rs22,889-29,517 and Rs29,518-44,175; decreased by 0.17 percent, 0.09 percent, 0.04 percent respectively, while it increased by 0.02 percent for and above Rs44,175. During the week, out of 51 items, prices of 12 (23.53%) items increased, 10 (19.61%) items decreased, and 29 (56.86%) items remained stable. Major commodities registering a weekon-week decrease included tomatoes (16.18%), sugar (4.91%), onions (4.08%), potatoes (1.71%), bananas (1.01%), pulse gram (0.36%), pulse masoor (0.10%), gur (0.08%) and LPG (0.08%). Items showing an increase in prices included chicken (6.19%), wheat flour (2.88%), eggs (0.93%), cooking oil 5 litre (0.72%), vegetable ghee 2.5 kg (0.70%),

tea prepared (0.56%), powdered milk (0.39%), pulse moong (0.37%), washing soap (0.20%) and firewood (0.08%). On a year-on-year basis, major increases were observed in the prices of sugar (30.28%), gas charges for q1 (29.85%), wheat flour (21.59%), gur (14.96%), beef (13.42%), firewood (12.86%), powdered milk (9.46%), chicken (8.62%), diesel (8.42%), lawn printed (8.29%) and cooking oil 5 litre (7.92%) an bananas (7.79%). Commodities witnessing year-on-year decline included potatoes (42.59%), tomatoes (40.75%), garlic (37.46%), onions (30.23%), pulse gram (28.95%), tea packet (17.79%), pulse mash (13.33%), electricity charges for Q1 (8.40%) and salt powder (5.08%).APP

CDA plans mulberry-free Capital

ISLAMABAD: Deputy DG Environment at the Capital Development Authority (CDA), Irfan Azeem Khan Niazi announced on Friday that the Prime Minister is prioritizing the beautification of the capital, with plans to inaugurate new flyovers within the next two days and replace mulberry trees with species better suited for allergy-prone residents. In an exclusive conversation with PTV News Channel, the DG disclosed that two new flyovers at D Chowk and Shaheen Chowk will be inaugurated within the next two to three days, depending on the Prime Minister's availability. He emphasized that these flyovers are part of the ongoing efforts to improve the capital's infrastructure. The Interior Minister has strictly advised CDA DG that the focus remain not only on the timely construction of the flvovers but also on the beautification

of the green spaces surrounding them. This includes the addition of flowering plants to enhance the city's aesthetic appeal and environmental quality. He further added that the Faizabad remodeling project, which includes widening the roads and extending the loops, is nearing completion, adding, these upgrades will significantly enhance traffic flow in the area. He also discussed the ongoing beautification of key interchanges, emphasizing that efforts to enhance their aesthetic appeal with greenery and landscaping are well underway.

Responding to a query about mulberry trees causing allergies for residents, he explained that when Islamabad was first developed. the population was much smaller, adding, however, with the growing population, the issue has become

more prominent. He assured that by Spring, Islamabad will be mulberry-free, with 75% of the work already completed. Talking about park maintenance,

he disclosed that there are 12 major parks in Islamabad, including the second phase of Lake View Park, which is set to begin soon. He also mentioned that a comprehensive program is being introduced for community parks, along with the implementation of uniformed cards for food vendors. In total, Islamabad has 320 parks total and efforts are underway to enhance their maintenance and facilities. When asked about tree cutting, he explained that no one, including citizens, can cut or trim trees without obtaining permission from the CDA. He called for greater awareness of this policy to protect the city's environment. In his concluding remarks, he highlighted that social media platforms are actively being used to address citizen concerns, with the Chairman of CDA personally overseeing the matters. He emphasized that if any citizen reports a complaint, they receive a

response directly from the CDA.

Indian Police crackdown aims to crush Hurriyat resistance in Sopore

Researcher Rafay calls for skilled cybersecurity

workforce

ISLAMABAD: Prominent cybersecurity researcher Rafay Baloch has urged Pakistani youth to build strong technical foundations and adopt globally recognised certifications to compete in the rapidly expanding cyber industry, as ethical hacking is no longer a niche discipline but a critical component of modern digital safety. In an exclusive interview with APP here, he explained that the concept of hacking is neutral and becomes harmful only when associated with malicious motivations. He said the public often views hacking through a negative lens due to cybercrimes, financial fraud and identity theft, but ethical hacking aims to identify vulnerabilities before criminal actors exploit them. "The methods may be similar, but the intent defines whether a hacker is securing a system or attempting to harm it," he said and highlighted the broad categories of hackers, including black-hat, white-hat and grey-hat. He emphasised that ethical hackers follow legal frameworks and responsible disclosure practices. He said the first step towards cybersecurity proficiency is curiosity, which drives individuals to understand how systems function internally and how they can be breached. He noted that persistence remains equally essential, as hacking is a highly challenging, technical field. Commenting on education pathways, he said many globally renowned hackers did not come from formal computer science backgrounds but relied on self-learning, experimentation and community engagement. "With modern tools such as large language models and AI-assisted programming, the barriers for beginners have significantly decreased, enabling students without deep coding knowledge to pursue cybersecurity roles, he maintained. He said that practical exposure through online labs, exercises and challenges is far more valuable than relying solely on textbooks. Rafay cautioned against a common trend in which students shift rapidly from one technology field to another, such as blockchain, AI, and cybersecurity, without genuine interest. He advised aspiring professionals to choose a specialisation based on passion rather than hype, as long-term success requires sustained commitment. Among in-demand roles, he cited penetration testing, bug hunting, cloud security and mobile application security as areas offering strong career prospects. He said certifications such as OSCP, CISSP, CISA and CREST are widely respected internationally and often serve as key differentiators for job applicants. These certifications, coupled with hands-on experience, help candidates stand out in competitive global markets, he said, adding that new regulatory frameworks, including SOC 2 and GDPR compliance standards, have increased the global demand for offensive security testing. Discussing cybercrime, Rafay said Pakistan's laws, including PECA, impose strict penalties for unauthorised access and data modification. -DNA

Global action urged to protect climate-threatened heritage

Pakistan Calls for Global Action to Safeguard Climate-Threatened Cultural Heritage as Minister Aurangzeb Khan Khichi Highlights Urgent Risks and Proposes International Collaboration at High-Level ICCROM Event in Rome This Week



ROME: Federal Minister for National Heritage & Culture Aurangzeb Khan Khichi delivered a keynote statement at a high-level special event titled "Culture-Climate Nexus: The Missing Link", held on the margins of the International Centre for the Study of the Preservation and Restoration of Cultural Property (ICCROM) General Assembly. Speaking before international delegates, the Minister highlighted Pakistan's vast and diverse cultural heritage from the ancient urban civilizations of Mohenjo-Daro and Harappa to the Buddhist sites of Taxila and Takht-i-Bahi, the Mughal-era Lahore Fort and Shalimar Gardens, and vibrant indigenous cultures stressing that these treasures now stand on the frontline of the global climate crisis. He underscored the severe impact of climate change on Pakistan's heritage, recalling the 2022 floods that damaged more than 750 registered heritage sites, including the UNESCO World Heritage Site of Mohenjo-Daro. The Minister further pointed to growing threats such as glacial lake outburst floods jeopardizing rock carvings along the Karakoram Highway and petroglyphs in the Diamer-Bhasha region, as well as coastal erosion and rising sea levels affecting Banbhore and the Makli Necropolis. Calling for stronger international solidarity, Khichi urged the global community to formally recognize cultural heritage as a strategic asset within climate adaptation and mitigation frameworks. He advocated integrating heritage protection into Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs) and National Adaptation Plans (NAPs), and proposed the establishment of a dedicated funding window for climate-impacted heritage under the Loss and Damage Fund. The Minister also recommended the creation of an ICCROM-led global knowledge platform bringing together scientists, heritage professionals, indigenous communities, and youth to co-develop resilient, culture-centered solutions. He further proposed incorporating culture-based indicators into the UNFCCC Global Stocktake to measure cultural loss alongside rising global temperatures. It is important to mention here that Cultural Minister Aurangzeb Khan Khichi is leading Pakistan's delegation to the ICCROM General Assembly Session, taking place in Rome, Italy from December 10-12, 2025.-DNA

SAPM engages Turkish business delegation to boost bilateral ties

Rain, snowfall set to end dry spell

ISLAMABAD: After an extended period of dry weather that has persisted through the early winter months, mirroring drought patterns seen in recent years, Pakistan is finally set to receive much-needed precipitation this weekend, according to the Pakistan Meteorological Department (PMD).


A shallow western disturbance approached the western regions of the country on Friday bringing with it the promise of rain and snowfall across multiple provinces.

The Met Office forecasts light to moderate rain and thunderstorms in the plains, with snowfall expected over hilly areas from December 13 to 15. The precipitation will bring relief to regions that have been gripped by unusually dry conditions during what is typically a wetter period.

Light to moderate rain and thunderstorm accompanied by snowfall over the hills is expected in Chitral, Dir,

Swat, Shangla, Kohistan, Malakand, Manshera, Abbottabad, Haripur, and Bunner from December 13 to 15 with occasional gaps. The same weather pattern will affect Gilgit-Baltistan including Diamir, Astore, Ghizer, Skardu, Hunza, Gilgit, Ghanche, and Shigar during this period. Kashmir areas including Neelum Valley, Muzaffarabad, Poonch, Hattian, Bagh, and Haveli are similarly expected to receive light to moderate rainfall and snowfall over the hills between December 13 and 15 with occasional gaps. Partly cloudy to cloudy conditions with light rain and snowfall are expected in Bajaur, Mohmand, Khyber, Orakzai, Kurram, and Waziristan on December 14 and 15. The same weather pattern will affect Quetta, Ziarat, Zhob, Sherani, Chaman, Pishin, Qilla Abdullah, Qilla Saifullah, and Noushki during this timeframe. There are chances of drizzle in Islamabad, Rawalpindi, Pe-

shawar, and the Potohar region, while light rain and light snow is expected in Murree and Galliyat on Sunday and Monday. From the night of December 12 through December 16, moderate and at times dense foggy conditions are likely to develop over plain areas of Punjab, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, and upper Sindh. These foggy conditions may reduce visibility significantly and disrupt traffic over motorways and highways, and the public is advised to remain cautious during this period. The Met Office has indicated that another western disturbance is likely to influence western and upper parts of the country from December 19, suggesting that the current dry spell may finally be coming to an end with multiple weather systems on the horizon. The rain will also help reduce effects smog which is causing serious consequences for those having allergies.-DNA



What comes after multilateralism

THE world is on the cusp of a profound geopolitical restructuring, as escalating great power rivalries erode the multilateral structures that have supported the global order since the mid-20th century. To prevent the international system from sliding into chaos and conflict, those unwilling to accept a world governed solely by raw power must find ways to reinforce today's debilitated multilateral institutions through informal arrangements and bilateral agreements. From the end of the Second World War to the early 2010s, multilateralism provided the framework for international cooperation. Though imperfect and often inconsistent, it was the most effective model of global governance ever created. But after more than a decade of continuous erosion, it is clear that the multilateral system as we know it can no longer facilitate collective action.

Without a framework capable of coordinating relations among countries, the alternatives are stark: a world government — an unfeasible prospect — or a steady drift toward anarchy. Multilateralism emerged as the pragmatic middle ground: collective decision-making and binding rules, rather than a single global authority or none at all. Born of unique historical circumstances, this model took shape as the US — the dominant postwar global power — promoted a treaty-based system guided by enlightened self-interest. That vision was realized at the Bretton Woods and San Francisco conferences, which led to the establishment of the UN, the International Monetary Fund, the World Bank and the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade, as well as its successor, the World Trade Organization. It is now clear that the multilateral system as we know it can no longer facilitate collective action

In principle, if not always in practice, these multilateral institutions were open to all countries, with bodies like the WTO and the International Civil Aviation Organization providing a shared framework of rules, standards and responsibilities. But in recent years, they have been severely undermined by the rise of sovereigntism in developed economies like the US and in emerging powers like China. The US, for its part, played a significant role in weakening the very institutions it helped create. The 2003 invasion of Iraq and its intervention in Libya's civil war in 2011 showed that the world's major powers did not see themselves as bound by the so-called rules-based international order. This trend was reinforced by President Donald Trump's election in 2016, while his return to office in 2025 represented an explicit repudiation of the multilateral approach. Meanwhile, Russia and China have been eager to undermine a system they view as detrimental to their interests. Russia's 2008 invasion of

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Georgia and invasions of Ukraine in 2014 and 2022 openly defied international law, bringing large-scale war back to Europe. Likewise, China's "Made in China 2025" industrial strategy violates WTO rules and its aggressive actions in the South China Sea show complete disregard for the 2016 arbitral ruling that rejected its expansive maritime claims.

The consequences are now widely evident: on the issues that matter most, multilateral institutions no longer drive global decision-making. Paralyzed by vetoes by its permanent members, the UN Security Council has been largely inactive, with the notable exception of its recent endorsement of Trump's Gaza peace plan. At the same time, the WTO – whose establishment in 1995 was multilateralism's last meaningful achievement — can no longer enforce its own rules since the US rendered its appellate inquorate in 2019.

This institutional paralysis is part of a broader trend. No major multilateral institution has been created in decades, while informal arrangements - lacking binding rules and often involving nonstate actors - have proliferated, offering more agile and adaptable forms of coordination better suited to an increasingly fragmented world. Today, multilateral institutions account for only a quarter of the global governance ecosystem. In this environment, preventing the disintegration of the international order is a daunting task. What is needed are intermediate mechanisms that do not depend on universal participation or the adoption of comprehensive, binding rules. While achieving global consensus is virtually impossible, informal alliances, public-private platforms and flexible coordination mechanisms can help mitigate geopolitical risks. Informal arrangements have proliferated, offering more agile and adaptable forms of coordination Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance – which has immunized more than a billion children since 2000 - offers a useful model, as do the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers, with its globally accepted technical standards (including Wi-Fi), and the International Organization for Standardization. Although lacking legal authority, these bodies have achieved technical legitimacy and broad voluntary compliance. Once secondary to multilateral institutions, they may now emerge as pillars of global coordination.

As private actors, subnational governments, academic institutions and professional networks continue to gain influence, diplomacy is no longer the exclusive domain of foreign ministries. Global governance, in turn, is becoming increasingly decentralized, especially in critical areas like cybersecurity. To avert a global catastrophe, today's institutional vacuum must be filled by flexible, workable arrangements: less formal, less universal and less binding, yet still capable of facilitating cooperation among countries and key actors. These include public-private partnerships, interregional agreements such as the EU-Mercosur trade deal and "coalitions of the willing" like the Just Energy Transition Partnerships. Admittedly, this approach involves higher transaction costs and cannot guarantee certainty or uniformity. But the task facing international policymakers is not to design the perfect model — it is to identify the one that is most viable in a rapidly changing world teetering on the edge of systemic collapse.

Can Civilisation Collapse in an Hour?

OR most of human history, civilisations did not die suddenly. They rose slowly, flourished over centuries, and declined through prolonged periods of decay, conquest, or exhaustion. The Roman Empire did not fall overnight. Pharaonic Egypt endured dynasties across millennia. Persian, Greek, and later imperial systems were replaced gradually by rival powers, often after decades of war, rebellion, and internal rot. Their foundations were physical—land, food, water, animals, metals, and manpower—and therefore their destruction required time, force, and mass mobilisation. That historical rhythm has now been broken.

Modern civilization has entered a phase in which collapse is no longer necessarily slow or visible. For the first time in human history, the core operating system of society is not material but digital. Cities, institutions, economies, and even military power are no longer coordinated primarily by physical mechanisms, human judgment, or local redundancy, but by data. This shift has made modern civilization extraordinarily efficient—and extraordinarily fragile.

In earlier eras, even when empires fell, daily life often continued. Farmers still tilled land. Local markets still functioned. Water could still be drawn from wells. Authority might collapse, but society retained resilience because its foundations were decentralised and human-scale. Today, by contrast, modern cities function as tightly coupled machines. Their survival depends on uninterrupted flows of data that synchronise power grids, traffic systems, hospitals, supply chains, financial transactions, communications, and emergency services. When that coordination fails, the city does not merely slow down—it stops.

A severe disruption to critical data systems—whether through cyberattacks, malware, corrupted databases, sabotaged fibre-optic links, or compromised control software—could paralyse entire regions without a single shot being fired. The destruction would not come through explosions but through silence: dark screens, frozen systems, stalled traffic, grounded flights, empty fuel pumps, inaccessible bank accounts, and broken communication.

We have already witnessed partial versions of this vulnerability. Disruptions to energy distribution have plunged major cities into darkness. Failures in digital coordination have erased billions of dollars from financial markets in minutes. Interruptions in pipeline or logistics data have triggered fuel shortages and panic buying despite ample physical supply. These incidents reveal a sobering truth: scarcity today is often not material but informational.

The modern supply chain illustrates this danger most clearly. A grocery store shelf looks simple, but behind it lies a complex, data-driven choreography of procurement, warehousing, refrigeration, inventory forecasting, transport routing, fuel purchasing, and digital payment systems. Food does not disappear because farms stop producing; it disappears because coordination fails. When databases are corrupted or systems shut down, the entire chain collapses rapidly, even though physical goods still exist.

Transportation systems are even more exposed. Modern aviation is entirely dependent on data-navigation, scheduling, air traffic control, maintenance logs, and safety systems. Shipping relies on digital tracking, port scheduling, customs processing, and fuel optimisation. Trains and metros depend on automated signalling. Road traffic is governed by sensor-driven control systems. A serious digital failure would not only halt movement but risk catastrophic accidents across air, sea, and land. Military power, once the domain of brute force, is now inseparable from data supremacy. Modern aircraft are flying computers. Naval fleets are networked command systems. Missile defence, surveillance, and early-warning systems rely on continuous data fusion. Even nuclear command-and-control structures are deeply digital. This reality transforms the nature of warfare. Victory no longer depends solely on destroying armies or occupying territory, but on disabling an adversary's digital nervous system.

In such a world, resilience becomes the true measure of sovereignty. A country that cannot secure, isolate, and rapidly restore its critical data infrastructure can be defeated without ever engaging in conventional battle. Conversely, a state that masters digital defence—and offensive disruption—can neutralise rivals with minimal physical confrontation. Warfare thus shifts from mass killing to systemic paralysis.

This transformation carries grave ethical and political consequences. When cities are paralysed, civilians suffer first. Hospitals, water systems, emergency services, food distribution, and communications are all civilian infrastructures, yet they are increasingly vulnerable to digital attack. The traditional distinction between battlefield and home front dissolves. A cyber strike on data systems can harm millions of ordinary people instantly, without warning or visible aggres-

sion.

pace. Cybersecurity is still treated largely as a technical or national issue, addressed through firewalls, patches, and specialised units. These measures are necessary but insufficient. What is needed is a civilisational response. Data is no longer merely a commercial or strategic asset; it is the backbone of modern life. Its protection must be elevated to the level of international norms and collective responsibility. Just as humanity eventually recognised rules governing chemical weapons, attacks on hospitals, and treatment of civilians, it must now establish clear red lines around digital infrastructure. There must be international agreements defining unacceptable attacks on

There must be international agreements defining unacceptable attacks on civilian data systems, shared mechanisms for attribution and investigation, and credible consequences for violations. Without such frameworks, escalation will be silent, deniable, and destabilising.

At the national level, societies must rethink how

At the national level, societies must rethink how they design systems. Extreme efficiency without redundancy is a recipe for collapse. Civilisation now requires layered resilience: segmented networks, offline fallbacks, manual override capacity, secure authentication, and decentralised control. Public institutions must be able to function, at least partially, when digital systems fail. Citizens must be educated to understand that convenience comes with vulnerability, and that resilience demands investment and restraint. Elon Musk's warning that future empires may fall not in years but in minutes is not exaggeration-it is diagnosis. The danger is not that technology itself is destructive, but that civilisation has placed too much of its survival logic into fragile, interconnected systems without sufficient safeguards.

Humanity stands at a critical threshold. The same data-driven intelligence that has made cities cleaner, faster, and more productive could also become the instrument of unprecedented collapse. Civilisations will still rise and fall for familiar reasons—political failure, injustice, moral decay—but now they face an additional risk: sudden paralysis. A civilization that can be stopped in an hour must learn to protect what keeps it alive. The future will not be decided only by armies or economies, but by whether humanity can govern its own digital heartbeat. If it fails, the fall of empires will no longer be written over centuries—but logged in error reports, measured in minutes, and remembered as the moment when progress outpaced wisdom.

The Prophet Muhammad (Peace be upon him) instructed, "A Muslim is the brother of a Muslim. He does not oppress him, nor does he

abandon him, nor does he look down upon him." In

these words, one finds the moral compass for deal-

ing with the shortcomings of those closest to us. To abandon a relative, a friend, or a colleague because of their mistake is to abandon a part of ourselves. Ego, however, has become one of the most destructive forces in modern social behavior. The notion of "wearing the crown of ego," refusing to initiate reconciliation, or expecting others to bow first creates an environment where forgiveness becomes a rarity. In Pakistani households, workplaces, and even public institutions, countless conflicts linger not because the issues are grave, but because individuals refuse to let go of pride. The Qur'an teaches us, "Indeed, Allah does not like the arrogant and boastful" (Qur'an 31:18). When ego overshadows wisdom, correction becomes impossible, and relationships turn cold. In family life, especially, this philosophy carries

In family life, especially, this philosophy carries immense value. Parents, siblings, and spouses are bound not only by affection but by moral duty. A father's sternness, a mother's moment of anger, a sibling's careless word—these are not reasons to divide hearts. Instead, they are reminders of human frailty. The Prophet (peace be upon him) said, "The best among you are those who are best to their families." To be "best" in this context means to forgive readily, advise gently, and understand deeply. Where ego prevails, affection fades; where humility prevails, affection flourishes.

The same truth applies at the societal level. Communities fracture when individuals or factions refuse to acknowledge that shared destiny is more important than personal pride. Our neighborhoods, mosques, educational institutions, and workplaces all experience moments where misunderstandings arise. Pakistan's social fabric is strong precisely because, historically, people have preferred collective harmony over individual stubbornness. Sufi thought, which has shaped much of our cultural and spiritual heritage, re-

peatedly discourages the dominance of ego. Maulana Rumi writes, "Raise your words, not your voice. It is rain that grows flowers, not thunder." The essence of correction lies in gentleness, not confrontation.

In national life as well, this wisdom holds weight. Pakistan's political discourse and social media conversations often reflect a harshness that stands in contrast to our traditions of tolerance. If political actors, social leaders, and citizens embraced the idea that errors within the nation are a collective concern—rather than weapons for mutual humiliation—the journey toward national cohesion would accelerate. Prosperity lies in unity, and unity demands humility.

Even in economic dealings and professional relationships, the act of correcting mistakes with dignity rather than ego strengthens institutions. Leaders who listen rather than command, colleagues who cooperate rather than compete, and citizens who forgive rather than hold grudges create an atmosphere in which shared progress becomes natural. Gaza's maternal and newborn health system 'decimated', UN warns

Gaza's health system for mothers and newborns has been "decimated", the United Nations said on Thursday, with Israeli attacks destroying almost all hospitals, cutting off medical supplies and driving sharp rises in maternal deaths, miscarriages and newborn fatalities amid mass displacement and hunger.

According to the UN human rights office (OHCHR), more than 70,000 Palestinians have been killed since 7 October 2023. OHCHR said 94 per cent of Gaza's hospitals have been damaged or destroyed, leaving pregnant women and newborns without essential care.

"The Israeli blockade has also prevented the entry of objects indispensable to the survival of civilians, including medical supplies and nutrients required to sustain pregnancies and ensure safe childbirth," the Office said. By late 2024, women in

US President Donald Trump's Social Media Checks Raise FIFA 2026 Travel Concerns

WASHINGTON: The United States is planning a travel ban ahead of the FIFA World Cup 2026 that would result tourists from 42 visa-waiver countries to submit five years of their social media history before entering U.S. The move, pushed by U.S. President Donald Trump, has sparked a furious fan backlash online, ahead of the extravaganza of the global sports extravaganza.

Travelers are voicing fears the rule will bog down entry, causing massive queues at the airports and discouraging people from traveling at all. The proposal would require every tourist to list every social media account they used in the last five years, along with old phone numbers, past email addresses, and multiple biometric details, including face, fingerprints, and DNA. Officials defend the measure as necessary to scan "anti-American views" pre-entry. The policy was established via an execu-

BEIJING: The China-Pakistan Modern Seed Industry Cooperation and Exchange Conference was held in Wuhan, China

Economic Net (CEN) reported on Friday. Syed Fahad Ali Sherazi, a participant in the Thousand Agricultural Talents

Training Program in China from Pakistan, couldn't help but give a thumbs up after eating a Mianwo, a kind of Wuhan-style

donut-shaped snack. This young man was so delighted to discover that the canola oil used to fry it came from his home-

land, and the canola seeds were the result of joint research and development between China and Pakistan. In October,

Huazhong Agricultural University and Wuhan Qingfa Hesheng Agricultural Development Co., Ltd. jointly held a three-

month training course on Seed Production and Processing Technology. During the tea break, the organizer specially pre-

pared semi-finished Mianwo, which were deep-fried on-site in "special" canola oil until golden brown. The crispy exterior

and tender interior, along with the aroma of oil, attracted many Pakistani trainees. All of them sampled the exotic food, as

well as many took photos and videos to share with their friends and family. Very soon, the trainees discovered the "spe-

cial feature" of the rapeseed oil: the plastic bottle was printed with HC-021C, the name of a new canola variety that has

been vigorously promoted for cultivation in Punjab, Pakistan, in recent years. This canola variety was jointly developed

by China and Pakistan, and the oil extracted from it is sweeter and more fragrant than that of local varieties. Zhu Xiaobo,

general manager of Qingfa Hesheng, the Chinese lead research institution for HC-021C, explained that Pakistan is a major

consumer of edible oil but relies on imports for 94% of palm oil, and long-term consumption can easily lead to cardiovascu-

lar diseases. The safety of edible oils urgently needs to be addressed. From 2009 to 2019, the company, in collaboration

with Pakistani partners, successfully bred a new generation of high-quality hybrid canola variety HC-021C, which has

many characteristics such as short growth period, high yield, high oil content, and good oil quality. It has become the

preferred variety for local farmers. To date, its cumulative planting area has exceeded 2.5 million mu (0.17 million hec-

tares). Pakistani trainees, including Jatoi Ghulam Hussain and Muhammad Anser, expressed their sincere gratitude for

the excellent courses arranged by the organizer and shared their plans for applying the technologies after returning home,

'extinction level' for rare orangutans BANGKOK: Indonesia's deadly flooding was an "extinction-level disturbance" for the world's rarest great ape, the tapanuli orangutan, causing catastrophic damage to its habitat and survival prospects, scientists warned on Friday. Only scientifically classified as a species in 2017, tapanulis are incredibly rare, with fewer than 800 left in the wild, confined to a small range in part of Indonesia's Sumatra. One dead suspected tapanuli orangutan has already been

found in the region, conservationists told AFP "The loss of even a single orangutan is a devastating blow to the survival of the species," said Panut Hadisiswoyo, founder and chairman of the Orangutan Information Center in Indonesia. And analysis of satellite imagery combined with knowledge of the tapanuli's range suggests that the flooding which killed nearly 1,000 people last month may also have devastated wildlife in the Batang Toru region. The scientists focused on the so-called West Block, the most densely populated of three known tapanuli habitats, and home to an estimated 581 tapanulis before the disaster. There, "we think that between six and 11 percent of orangutans were likely killed," said Erik Meijaard, a longtime orangutan conservationist "Any kind of adult mortality that exceeds one percent, you're driving the species to extinction, irrespective of how big the population is at the start," he told AFP. But tapanulis have such a small population and range to begin with that they are especially vulnerable, he added. of Chinese-tech hybrid rice, canola, and other seeds has been increasing year by year in the region. Chinese seeds have already borne fruit of friendship far away from home. Just like fragrant Mianwo, China-Pakistan agricultural cooperation will surely "fry" a more golden and splendid future through mutual trust and win-win results.—DNA

UN agency warns displaced Gazans face floods, as emergency supplies blocked

GENEVA: Hundreds of thousands of displaced Gazans face flooding of their tents and shelters by heavy rains, and materials for shelters and sandbags are not being allowed to enter the enclave, the UN International Organization for Migration said on Friday Torrential rain swept across the Gaza Strip on Thursday, flooding hundreds of tents sheltering families displaced by two years of war, and leading to the death of a baby girl due to exposure, local health officials said. Nearly 795,000 displaced people are at heightened risk of potentially dangerous flooding in low-lying, rubble-filled areas where families are living in unsafe shelters, the IOM said. Insufficient drainage and waste management also heightened the risk of disease outbreak, the UN agency added. Materials to help reinforce shelters such as timber and plywood, as well as sandbags and water pumps to help with flooding have been delayed from entering Gaza due to ongoing access restrictions, the IOM said. Israel says it is meeting its obligations and accuses agencies of inefficiency and failing to prevent theft by Hamas, which the group denies. COGAT, the Israeli military arm that oversees humanitarian matters. was not immediately available for comment. Supplies already dispatched to Gaza, including waterproof tents, thermal blankets and tarpaulins, were not able to withstand the flooding, the IOM added.-APP

French forces use tear gas to clear protesters

LES BORDES SURE ARIZE: Veterinarians arrived at a French farm Friday under police escort to slaughter a herd of cows suffering from a potentially deadly disease, an AFP reporter said, after police used tear gas to clear away angry protesters trying to protect the animals Farmers have staged protests in several parts of France in recent days, accusing the authorities of not doing enough to support them. Hundreds of agricultural workers have demonstrated for two days outside the farm in the southern area of Ariege near the Spanish border. They set up a cordon around the farm after the authorities on Wednesday said that more than 200 Blonde d'Aquitaine cows at the farm had nodular dermatitis - widely known as lumpy skin disease - and would have to be euthanized. Gendarmes used tear gas late Thursday to fight their way past dozens of farmers who stayed after nightfall to blockade the farm in the village of Les Bordes-sur-Arize, while protesters hurled stones, branches and other makeshift missiles as hay bales burnt in the background. Four people were arrested, Interior Minister Laurent Nunez said. Several farmers and supporters had earlier chopped down trees and set up barricades to stop veterinary staff from entering to carry out the killing. Regional prefect Herve Brabant said that the brothers who owned the farm had agreed to have the herd slaughtered in line with precautions against the disease. But Pierre-Guillaume Mercadal, of the local Rural Confederation union leading the protest, said one brother had agreed and one was opposed. "They are tearing this family apart," he said. Marina Verge, 33, the daughter of one of the owners, on Wednesday told AFP that killing the cows amounted to destroying "almost 40 years" of their life's work. "They're in shock, it's unimaginable. They didn't expect it," she said. "You don't imagine finding yourself without livestock overnight." Other cases have also been detected in the region and some 3,000 of the 33,000 cattle in Ariege have already been vaccinated. Lumpy skin disease, which cannot be passed to humans but can be fatal for cattle, first appeared in France in June. French authorities insist the outbreak is under control and that they are preparing a mass vaccination program. The World Organization for Animal Health says that cases have also been reported in Italy this year. According to the European Food Safety Authority, the disease is present in many African countries. In 2012, it spread from the Middle East to Greece, Bulgaria and the Balkans. A vaccination program halted that epidemic.-APP

Govt prioritizes olive cultivation with modern facilities: Tanveer

ISLAMABAD: Minister for National Food Security & Research, Rana Tanveer Hussain on Friday said that the government was prioritizing the supply of quality saplings, research, modern oil extraction facilities and overall improvement of the olive value chain to promote olive cultivation in the country Addressing the inaugural session of the 7th National Olive Festival, the minister said that government was taking measures for the upgrading olive packaging, branding and marketing to international standards, which was essential to enhance its exports. The minister stated that Pakistan has vast potential for olive cultivation and that the crop is no longer an experiment but hays now matured into a fully emerging industry. He said that Pakistan's climate is highly suitable for the cultivation of premium-quality olives, adding that olives were an effective solution to climate change and an ideal crop for water-scarce regions. He noted that the olive sector is providing thousands of farmers with profitable and climate-resilient livelihoods, while also creating new business and employment opportunities in rural economies. He highlighted that Pakistan has the potential to become a leading regional hub for olive cultivation and processing, adding that the consumption of olive oil and other olive products is increasing in the country, and a portion of Pakistan's olive oil is already being exported - including the award-winning Pakistani olive oil that secured a silver medal in the United States. Rana Tanveer Hussain noted that olives constitute a major global agricultural industry, citing Spain's \$11 billion and Italy's significant annual exports. In comparison, Pakistan's total agricultural exports stand at \$9 billion,

while the country spends \$4 billion annually on importing palm oil. He emphasized that by increasing domestic olive production, Pakistan can not only meet its own needs but also generate valuable foreign exchange through exports in the coming years. He appreciated the support of the Italian government for the development of Pakistan's olive sector, noting that Italy is providing technical assistance and has also approved a 20 million project for Pakistan. He further announced that Pakistan

is expected to become a member of the International Olive Council within the next two to three months, which will enhance global recognition of Pakistan's olive industry. The minister reiterated that farmers are the backbone of the country and assured that the government will extend all possible support to them. He expressed confidence that olives have become a strategic crop for Pakistan and that the country's journey towards becoming an "olive hub" is progressing rapidly.

Series of Israeli strikes hit Lebanon

BEIRUT: A series of Israeli strikes hit south and east Lebanon on Friday, state media reported, as Israel's army said it was targeting Hezbollah sites, the latest such raids despite a year-old ceasefire Lebanon's state-run National News Agency (NNA) reported strikes in around a dozen locations, including up to around 30 kilometers (20 miles) from the Israeli border, citing at times "heavy raids." Israel has kept up strikes on Lebanon despite a November 2024 ceasefire that was supposed to end more than a year of hostilities with the Iran-backed militant group Hezbollah, and has also kept troops in five areas it deems strategic. The Israeli military said in a statement that its forces "struck a training and qualification compound" used by Hezbollah's elite Radwan Force where operatives "underwent shooting exercises and additional training on the use of various types of weapons." The army also "struck additional Hezbollah military infrastructure in several areas in southern Lebanon.-APP

Vawda claims ex-ISI chief going to testify against Imran Khan

Khawaja Asif alleges May 9 events were former ISI chief and PTI founder's "joint plan"

ENATOR Faisal Vawda claimed on Thursday that court-martialled former ISI chief Lt Gen (retd) Faiz Hamid was going to testify against Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) founder Imran Khan, which would intensify legal troubles for the latter.

Vawda, a former PTI leader, made the claims while speaking on Geo News programme "Aaj Shahzeb Khanzada Kay Sath", said that Hamid will also present evidence against the incarcerated ex-premier.

The Field General Court Martial (FGCM) sentenced the former top spy to 14 years of rigorous imprisonment earlier today "on four charges related to engaging in political activities, violation of the Official Secret Act," according to the Inter-Services Public Relations. He insisted the PTI founder appeared firmly "caught in the legal squeeze" stemming from the May 9 cases, warning that the process would intensify.

The May 9 events refer to the 2023 riots that were triggered by the arrest of PTI founder from the premises of Islamabad High Court (IHC) in a graft case. During the protests, the miscreants targeted the civil and military installations, including the Corps Commander's House in Lahore and the General Headquarters (GHQ) in Rawalpindi. – APP

US to deny tourists visa applications aimed at 'giving birth to secure citizenship'

WASHINGTON: The United States' embassy in India has said that it will deny tourist visa applications if its consular officers believe that it is primarily aimed at giving birth in the country to secure US citizenship for a child. "This is not permitted," the US embassy in New Delhi said in a post on X.

The move, as reported by the Gulf News, adds to uncertainty for Indian visa holders which have so far caused unease among professionals accounting for over 70% H-1B approvals and nearly 90% H-4 visas with work authorisation.

The US embassy in India has rescheduled visa interviews with some applicants given fresh appointment dates extending to mid-2026. The Trump administration, back in September, proposed that would rework the H-1B visa selection process to fa-

vour higher-skilled and better-paid workers, according to a related Federal Register notice, a move that follows a White House proclamation on Friday introducing a \$100,000 fee for the visas.

Trump "frustrated" with Kyiv, Moscow over talks on war

KYIV: US President Donald Trump is "extremely frustrated" with Russia and Ukraine, his spokeswoman said on Thursday, as Kyiv said Washington was still pushing it to make major territorial concessions as part of its plan to end the nearly four-year war. "The president is extremely frustrated with both sides of this war," Karoline Leavitt told reporters. "He doesn't want any more talk. He wants action. He wants this war to come to an end." Earlier Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky made remarks that appeared to show little had changed in Washington's core position on how the conflict should end since it sent a 28-point plan to Kyiv and Moscow last month that heavily favoured Russia. Zelensky said that Washington was still pushing it to cede land to Russia as part of an agreement to end the war that started with Moscow's February 2022 invasion. Washington wants only Ukraine, not Russia, to withdraw its troops from parts of the eastern Donetsk region, where a demilitarised "free economic zone" would be installed as a buffer between the two armies, Zelensky told reporters, including from AFP. Under the latest US plan, Moscow would also stay where it is in the south of the country, but pull some of its troops out of Ukrainian regions that Russian President Vladimir Putin has not claimed to have annexed in the north. - Agencies

Pakistan, Iraq boost security cooperation, improve **Pilgrim Facilitation**

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan's Federal Minister for Interior and Narcotics Control, Mohsin Naqvi, held an important meeting with his Iraqi counterpart, General Abdul Ameer Al-Shammari, during which both sides discussed measures to enhance bilateral relations and improve facilities for Pakistani pilgrims traveling to Iraq. The two ministers held a detailed exchange of views on strengthening cooperation between the interior ministries of both countries on a sustainable and effective basis. They agreed to deepen coordination to ensure smooth arrangements for pilgrims as well as progress in broader security matters.

The Iraqi Interior Minister highly appreciated Pakistan's recent steps to formally organize and regulate pilgrim groups, calling the efforts "commendable" and noting that such effective measures were taken for the first time under the current administration. He assured that all pilgrims included in the list provided by Pakistan's Ministry of Interior would be allowed entry into Iraq. Mohsin Naqvi emphasized that pilgrims traveling to Iraq would not be permitted to overstay beyond the specified period, adding that relevant institutions of both countries would remain in close contact to ensure compliance and smooth coordination.

Both ministers also agreed to further strengthen cooperation in security matters, counterterrorism, prevention of human trafficking, and the exchange of information through a joint mechanism. Minister Naqvi expressed gratitude to the Iraqi government and people for their continued cooperation and traditional hospitality towards Pakistani pilgrims. He reaffirmed that the safety, dignity, and facilitation of Pakistani pilgrims remain the top priority of the Government of Pakistan. Iraqi Interior Minister General Al-Shammari announced that he would soon visit Pakistan to finalize a joint plan aimed at enhancing pilgrim facilitation, security cooperation, and bilateral ties.

Pakistan assures IMF of farm input tax hikes, cuts in uplift schemes

Govt vows to fully deregulate sugar sector, continue tariff adjustments in power sector

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan has committed to the International Monetary Fund (IMF) that it will raise tax rates on fertilisers, pesticides and sugary products, and move selected items to the standard 18% GST slab. These steps form part of Islamabad's bid to successfully complete the second review and unlock the third \$1 billion tranche under the \$7 billion Extended Fund Facility (EFF), as well as the first \$200 million tranche from the \$1.4 billion Resilience and Sustainability Facility (RSF). Further details of the IMF's report on Pakistan's economic performance have been released, with the Fund saying Pakistan has achieved most of the targets under the loan programme.

the balance of payment gap will continue to widen from the current fiscal year, reaching \$3.253 billion by 2029–30, after the existing programme concludes. This projection signals that Pakistan may require another IMF programme in the near future. The staff report says that contingency measures provide an important safeguard against fiscal risks. If revenue were to fall short of expectations by the end of December 2025, the Pakistan authorities plan to adopt additional measures to safeguard the fiscal targets, including increasing excises on fertilisers and pesticides by five percentage points, introducing excises on high-value sugary items, and broadening the sales tax base by moving select items to the standard rate. They are also prepared to reduce or postpone spending in response to lower revenues. The government has also assured the Washington-based lender that it will fully deregulate the sugar sector, continue tariff adjustments in the power sector and reduce system losses and cut costs. A nationwide installation of point-of-sale systems for 40,000 large retailers will be completed over the next two years, while all four provinces will move toward harmonised sales tax procedures.

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
