# EU, team Europe stand with Ukraine on War Anniversary

In a joint statement, the EU Delegation, Team Europe, and the Ukrainian Embassy strongly condemned Russia's continued aggression, particularly the deliberate targeting of Ukraine's energy infrastructure during winter

ISLAMABAD: The European Union Delegation, Team Europe, and the Embassy of Ukraine jointly commemorated the fourth anniversary of Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine with a solemn ceremony hosted at the Embassy of the Republic of Poland. The event featured a documentary screening and a photographic exhibition depicting the human toll of the war. Diplomats, politicians, journalists, think-tank representatives, human rights activists, NGOs, and civil society leaders attended to express solidarity with Ukraine and reaffirm support for its sovereignty and territorial integrity. In a joint statement, the EU Delegation, Team Europe, and the Ukrainian Embassy strongly condemned Russia's continued aggression, particularly the deliberate targeting of Ukraine's energy infrastructure during winter. They called such actions unacceptable and a violation of international humanitarian law, urging Russia to cease hostilities, withdraw forces, and engage in meaningful peace talks. The EU reiterated its commitment of €90 billion in aid and ongoing sanctions to hold Moscow accountable.

Ukrainian Ambassador H.E. Markian Chuchuk reflected on "Four Years of Ukraine's Struggle for Freedom," highlighting the immense human cost of the war, including Russian casualties, Ukrainian deaths, child abductions, and mass displacement. He thanked Pakistan for its principled support and urged Islamabad to play a proactive role in advancing peace through its position on the UN Security Council. EU Ambassador H.E. Raimundas Karoblis, speaking on behalf of Team Europe, praised Ukraine's resilience and condemned Russia's attacks on civilians and infrastructure. He emphasized Europe's determination to continue economic pressure on Russia and highlighted Pakistan's role in multilateral efforts. German Ambassador H.E. Ina Lepel reaffirmed Europe's support, citing the EU's €90 billion aid package and condemning Russia's war crimes. Polish Ambassador H.E. Maciej Pisasrski denounced Russia's strikes on residential areas and critical infrastructure, stressing Poland's full solidarity with Ukraine. Speakers collectively underscored that ending Russia's war of aggression requires sustained diplomatic and practical support for Ukraine, accountability for war crimes, and coordinated global action to prevent further destabilization.

## PM Shehbaz Sharif takes notice of new Nepra rules

ISLAMABAD: Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif on Wednesday took notice of the recent changes made by the National Electric Power Regulatory Authority (Nepra) regarding solar consumers and directed the Power Division to file a review appeal against it. The power regulator on Monday changed the terms of contracts for all existing and future net-metered solar consumers – known as prosumers – to contain rising solar energy penetration and protect an expensive and inefficient state-owned power network. The notification effectively terminated the existing net-metering regime and replaced it with net-billing for all. A statement from the PM Office (PMO) issued today said the premier had taken "immediate notice" of the matter. The development follows outcry

# D. Trump now says 10 Aircraft were shot down

FLORIDA: US President Donald Trump has now claimed that as many as 10 fighter jets were shot down during the Pakistan and India conflict, doubling his initial figure. Pakistan Travel Guide "I settled eight wars. Of the eight wars, at least six were settled because of tariffs," Trump said on Fox Business, during a discussion about the effectiveness of his tariff policy. Expanding further, he said: "In other words, I said if you don't settle this war I'm going to charge you tariffs, because I don't want to see people getting killed. And they said, 'Well, what does this have to do...' I said, 'You're going to be charged.'" "Like India and Pakistan – it would have been a nuclear war in my opinion. They were really going at it. Ten planes were shot down. They were going at it." He recalled that Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif had mentioned that President Trump saved at least 10 million lives when he got us to stop fighting, "because he – they were going to go nuclear in my opinion. Without tariffs, that would not have happened". While Trump has credited himself – and by Pakistan – for stopping the war, India has not acknowledged the US president's role.

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## British woman shot dead by father

TEXAS: A British woman who was shot dead by her father while visiting his home in Texas had argued with him about US President Donald Trump earlier that day, an inquest has heard. Lucy Harrison, from Warrington in Cheshire, was shot in the chest on 10 January 2025 in Prosper, near Dallas. Police in the town investigated the 23-year-old's death as possible manslaughter but no criminal case was brought against Kris Harrison after a grand jury in Collin County declined to indict him. An inquest into Lucy Harrison's death opened earlier at Cheshire Coroner's Court, where her boyfriend Sam Littler described the "big argument" about Trump, who was preparing to be inaugurated for his second term of office. Littler, who travelled to the US with Lucy Harrison for the

### Tension with Afghanistan mounts as diplomatic efforts falter

PESHAWAR: Tensions between Pakistan and Afghanistan have escalated sharply following a series of retaliatory measures that have strained diplomatic ties, disrupted trade and deepened mistrust between the two neighbouring countries. Despite official justifications from Pakistan's security establishment regarding the closure of border crossings, suspension of trade routes and tightening of travel restrictions, analysts suggest Islamabad may have misjudged Kabul's response. According to a senior Afghan journalist, Pakistan appeared to assume that the Taliban administration, like previous governments in Kabul, would eventually yield under economic and diplomatic pressure. However, the Afghan authorities have responded with what analysts describe as an unusually firm and uncompromising stance. In recent weeks, Pakistan sealed key border crossings, halted bilateral trade and intensified

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### SHO among four police cops martyred

PESHAWAR: At least four police personnel, including a station house officer (SHO), were martyred during an operation against terrorists in Dera Ismail Khan (DI Khan) on Wednesday. Police were conducting an operation in the Wanda Badh area of DI Khan when an exchange of fire took place between police personnel and militants. SHO Faheem Mumtaz was among those martyred, while three other officers, including a deputy superintendent of police, were injured in the encounter. Meanwhile, Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi strongly condemned the terrorist attack on police in DI Khan, during which four police officers were martyred and three others injured.

# Asif terms opposition leader's remarks on army "highly irresponsible"

Says "Political differences are natural in a democracy. We may disagree on policies and ideologies, but targeting a national institution in this manner is inappropriate"

ISLAMABAD: Federal Minister for Defence Khawaja Muhammad Asif on Wednesday said that the opposition leader's remarks in the National Assembly the other day regarding the Pakistan Army were "highly irresponsible," as such statements undermined a national institution that has rendered immense sacrifices for the country. Addressing the National Assembly, he said, "Political differences are natural in a democracy. We may disagree on policies and ideologies, but targeting a national institution in this manner is inappropriate." He said that the Pakistan Army represented the entire federation and all provinces and highlighted their sacrifices in the fight against terrorism, particularly over the past several years as thousands of officers and soldiers had embraced martyrdom in the line of duty. He explained that 3,141 officers and soldiers of the Pakistan Army had embraced martyrdom from 2021 to February 2026 in the ongoing war against terrorism. The minister strongly rejected claims that the Army represents any single province or region, terming it a "federal force" with personnel from across the country, including Punjab, Sindh,

Mengal, who was elected as a member of the lower house from Khuzdar's NA-256 in the February 2024 elections, had tendered his resignation on September 3, 2024, citing the worsening situation in the province and declaring no confidence in the state.

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# Syria and Pakistan tied in a timeless bond

Dr. Ramez Alraee, Ambassador of Syria to Pakistan talks to daily Islamabad POST

ISLAMABAD: In an exclusive conversation with Dr. Ramez Alraee, Ambassador of Syria to Pakistan, the story of Syria unfolds not as a mere nation but as a living archive of human civilization. "Syria is a museum under the open sky," he reflects, evoking the grandeur of Damascus and Aleppo—cities that have carried the pulse of humanity for over 11,000 years. From Roman arches to Islamic minarets, Byzantine mosaics to Ottoman courtyards, Syria's stones speak in the languages of countless civilizations. Damascus, the world's oldest continuously inhabited capital, is described as a city where time folds in on itself. Its Old City, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, holds more than 125 archaeological landmarks. At its heart lies the Umayyad Mosque, a masterpiece of early Islamic architecture, where golden mosaics shimmer with paradisaical gardens and the shrine of John the Baptist rests in reverence. Around it, souqs hum with centuries-old rhythms—the clatter of cobblers, the fragrance of spice merchants, and the famed pistachio ice cream of Bakdash. From the slopes of Mount Qasioun, the city unfolds in a tapestry of minarets and courtyards, its resilience evident in the way families, artisans, and

worshippers continue traditions that have endured empire shifts and modern conflict. Aleppo, crowned by its hilltop Citadel, tells another chapter of Syria's endurance. Once a mercantile hub on the Silk Road, its caravanserais, mosques, and vaulted souqs testify to a city of craft, cuisine, and music. Homs, meanwhile, stands as a crossroads of faith, its skyline marked by the Mosque of Khalid ibn al-Walid and the formidable crusader fortress Krak des Chevaliers. Palmyra, set in the desert, remains a world treasure—a caravan stop between East and West, with colonnaded streets and Roman temples that echo Syria's grandeur.

Religious heritage, Dr. Alraee emphasizes, is central to Syria's identity. The shrines of Sayyida Zainab and Sayyida Ruqayyah draw pilgrims from across the Muslim world, while Christian monasteries in Maaloula and Saydnaya, along with the earliest-known house-church at Dura-Europos, remind us of Syria's role in early Christianity. "Our religious heritage is a symbol of coexistence," he says, underscoring Syria's spiritual depth. Turning to Pakistan, Dr. Alraee describes the relationship as brotherly, rooted in shared values and mutual respect. Pakistan's unwavering support for Syria's sovereignty has reinforced trust,

and both nations are committed to expanding cooperation in tourism, education, culture, archaeology, and trade. He warmly invites Pakistanis to visit Syria, promising not only history but hospitality—guests treated as family, embraced by the warmth of Syrian tradition.

Looking ahead, Syria is charting a new path of economic development. With sanctions easing and international exhibitions returning, Damascus is preparing to host "NASTEX 2026," the largest textile exhibition in the region, from April 1 to 4, 2026. For Pakistan, a global leader in textiles, this event offers a unique opportunity to engage directly with Syrian institutions and entrepreneurs, strengthening economic ties and opening new avenues of cooperation. In his closing words, Dr. Alraee portrays Syria as a nation of resilience. "Every stone in Syria tells a story, every city carries the memory of civilizations that shaped the world," he says. He extends a heartfelt invitation to Pakistanis: to walk through Damascus, marvel at Palmyra, feel the spirit of Aleppo, and witness the rebirth of a nation that continues to inspire. Syria, he insists, is not only rebuilding its monuments but revitalizing its cultural and spiritual life, welcoming scholars, pilgrims, tourists, and explorers alike. It is a land where history began—and where hope for a brighter tomorrow is being written anew.





## CM opens Bara Bypass road, mother-child nutrition facility

PESHAWAR: Chief Minister (CM) Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Sohail Afridi, on Wednesday inaugurated the Bara Bypass Road, marking a significant step toward resolving long-standing traffic congestion issues in the area. According to an official briefing, the Bara Bypass Road is 7 kilometers long and includes a 152-meter-long bridge. The total cost of the project is Rs 1.32 billion, out of which Rs 1.21 billion has already been spent. The project has been completed to improve regional connectivity and facilitate smoother transportation. Speaking on the occasion, the CM said the bypass road would significantly reduce traffic pressure in Bara Bazaar and nearby residential areas. He added that the project would also promote local trade and boost economic activities by improving access and mobility. Earlier, the CM also inaugurated a special nutrition facility for mothers and children at the District Headquarters (DHQ) Hospital in Khyber district. During the inauguration ceremony in Jamrud, Sohail Afridi stated that the facility would provide screening, diagnosis, and treatment services for malnourished women and children. Under the nutrition program, mothers, children, and other patients will receive quality nutritional support at the hospital. He emphasized that the new nutrition facility would directly benefit the local population of Khyber district by providing hospital-level nutritional care, contributing to improved maternal and child health outcomes in the region.—APP

## 'Laptops under PM program distributed on merit'

PESHAWAR: Federal Minister for Kashmir Affairs, Gilgit-Baltistan and SA-FRON, and President of Pakistan Muslim League (N) Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Engineer Amir Muqam, said here Wednesday that the world has accepted Pakistan as a champion ruling the skies "To take the country forward, we must adopt merit. Laptops under PM scheme are being distributed purely on merit, and the youth are Pakistan's bright future," he said while addressing, as the chief guest at Khyber Medical University under the Prime Minister's Laptop Scheme for the distribution of laptops among students. In his address, Federal Minister Engineer Amir Muqam said that the Vice Chancellor of Khyber Medical University, Hilal-e-Imtiaz Professor Dr Zia-ul-Haq, present at the ceremony, is a source of pride for us, and he was pleased to be among the students. He reiterated that the youth are Pakistan's bright future and that laptops are being distributed on the basis of merit. The Federal Minister said that the laptop scheme was first launched in

2011 by then Chief Minister of Punjab, Muhammad Shehbaz Sharif When Muhammad Nawaz Sharif became Prime Minister of Pakistan in 2013, the scheme was expanded across Pakistan and continued successfully. Unfortunately, it was discontinued in 2018, but after remaining suspended for four years during PTI rule, Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif restarted this landmark program in 2022. He emphasized that the Prime Minister's Laptop Scheme is being run purely on merit. If the country is to progress, merit must be adopted. He congratulated the students who received laptops and their parents, saying that their children earned them on merit and that the scheme is 100 percent merit-based. Addressing the students, he said that they are the future of the country and will be responsible for running it; therefore, investing in youth is investing in the nation's future. He strongly condemned the recent incidents of terrorism in Islamabad and earlier in Balochistan, saying that Khyber Pakhtunkhwa has itself been a victim of

terrorism and its people understand the importance of peace. "The memory of the APS tragedy is still fresh. Therefore, everyone must play a role in ensuring peace. With peace, education and employment will flourish, and there should be no compromise on peace." He said that in May last year, India attacked Pakistan, but by the grace of Allah, the defense of Pakistan was in strong hands. Under the leadership of Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif and Field Marshal Syed Asim Munir, the Pakistan Armed Forces defeated an enemy ten times larger in such a way that even their children will remember it. He added that their intentions are sincere and that it is not possible to deprive students of facilities like laptops. He said he never had a personal desire to become a minister, but considered service as worship. Despite facing life-threatening attacks, he never stepped back from serving the people.—DNA

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# Japan, UN-Habitat and JICA for boosting disaster resilience in KP school

ISLAMABAD: The Government of Japan, the United Nations Human Settlements Programme (UN-Habitat) and the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) signed an Exchange of Notes and a Grant Agreement during a signing ceremony held, for the project on 'Strengthen the disaster resilience of educational infrastructure in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Province'. The initiative is supported through a grant of JPY 427 million, equivalent to approximately USD 2.7 million, from the Government of Japan.

Due to the geographical characteristics, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa is prone to climate-driven hazards. The 2025 cloudbursts and flash floods damaged 437 schools, severely disrupting education services especially in Swat and Buner among the hardest-hit districts. The grant will support the rehabilitation and retrofitting of schools damaged by the 2025 floods in Swat and Buner districts. The project aims to restore safe, resilient and functional learning environments by strengthening school structures and improving ventilation and lighting. It will also re-instate gender-sensitive WASH facilities, ensuring dignity, privacy and accessibility for girls and children with disabilities. Speaking at the signing ceremony, the Ambassador of Japan to the Islamic Republic of Pakistan, H.E. Mr. Akamatsu Shuichi, appreciated the collaborative partnership and reaffirmed Japan's continued support to Pakistan's resilience agenda. Ambassador Akamatsu emphasized that strengthening school infrastructure is a critical investment in protecting children and ensuring continuity of education in the face of climate induced disasters. Ms. Kazuko Ishigaki, Regional Director for Asia and the Pacific, UN-Habitat, highlighted UN-Habitat's



leadership in delivering safer learning environments. She noted that the retrofitted schools will provide structurally stable classrooms, improved ventilation, and essential WASH services, enabling children to learn with confidence, safety and dignity. By positioning schools as hubs for disaster preparedness and response, the project will extend preparedness and first-aid benefits to surrounding communities, strengthening local resilience and emergency response capacities. Mr. Sugawara Takayuki, Senior Representative of JICA, emphasized that this project addresses the JICA's approach to disaster

risk reduction principally by "Promoting Build Back Better". He mentioned that JICA promotes this concept to ensure that the country as a whole including the affected areas can rebuild in a way that is more resilient to future disasters. It is crucial not to repeat the same damage in a similar disaster to ensure sustainable economic and social development.

Mr. Mohamed Yahya, United Nations Resident and Humanitarian Coordinator, expressed appreciation to the Government of Japan and JICA for their partnership with Pakistan and the United Nations. He highlighted that the initiative aligns with

the UN Sustainable Development Cooperation Framework and supports Pakistan's implementation of the Sendai Framework, advancing resilience for the most vulnerable communities.

Through the construction and rehabilitation of disaster-resilient schools, along with the provision of disaster resilience training, this collaborative effort will contribute to the implementation of the Sendai Framework by reducing loss of life, the number of people affected, and economic damage caused by natural disasters, while advancing human security in flood-affected communities.

# Siddiqui stresses edu reforms focus on nurturing critical thinking

ISLAMABAD: Federal Minister for Federal Education & Professional Training (MoFE&PT), Dr. Khalid Maqbool Siddiqui, stressed that Education reform must go beyond textbook revision and focus on nurturing critical thinking, ethical grounding, creativity, and responsible citizenship. He made these remarks while addressing a two-day national summit opened on Wednesday under the theme "New National Curriculum of Pakistan." The first day of the two-day Summit witnessed participation from distinguished members of Parliament and Provincial Assemblies, Vice Chancellors of universities, representatives of provincial and area education departments, development partners, curriculum experts, and education leaders from across the country. Addressing the participants, Dr. Khalid Maqbool Siddiqui, highlighted the urgent need to transform Pakistan's curriculum in light of contemporary challenges. The Minister emphasized implementation fidelity, coordination with provinces, and the importance of preparing learners for emerging global realities while remaining rooted in Pakistan's cultural and ideological foundations. Earlier, the proceedings of the Summit were commenced with the National Anthem and recitation from the Holy Quran, followed by a welcome address by Mr. Nadeem Mahbub, Secretary, MoFE&PT. The Secretary warmly

welcomed the distinguished guests, UNESCO, and UNICEF, and underscored the importance of a nationally coherent, future-oriented curriculum aligned with Pakistan's constitutional values, cultural identity, and developmental aspirations. Subsequently, the Director, NCC Wing, MoFE&PT, presented the objectives of the Summit and shared the vision and mission of the proposed new curriculum framework. The Summit featured keynote addresses by leading international expert Mr. Alonso Sanchez (World Bank), who shared global perspectives on curriculum transformation and instructional reform. His insights emphasized evidence-based policymaking, strengthening classroom practices, and building coherent systems linking curriculum, pedagogy, and assessment. In his keynote address, Mr. Ahsan Iqbal, Minister for Planning, Development and Special Initiatives, reflected on the historical evolution of education and curriculum in Pakistan and underscored its strategic significance for national progress. He described curriculum reform as a mission close to his heart and highlighted the role of education in restoring Pakistan's intellectual and civilizational excellence. Referring to historical periods when Muslim civilizations led global knowledge, he stressed the need to revive a culture of inquiry, innovation, and scholarship. He emphasized the importance of

strengthening conceptual learning in local languages to ensure deeper comprehension and inclusivity. Furthermore, he strongly highlighted the need to integrate Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) within the national curriculum framework, underscoring that skill-based education must be embedded from early stages to equip youth with practical competencies aligned with market needs and national development priorities. He proposed key features for effective implementation of the new curriculum, including competency-based frameworks, focus on science, technology and innovation, civic responsibility, and structured mechanisms for phased and sustainable implementation. The first day concluded with an engaging panel discussion on "National Curriculum of Pakistan (NCP): Issues, Challenges and Way Forward," followed by breakout group discussions where participants deliberated on thematic areas and proposed practical recommendations for systemic reform. The deliberations of Day One have set a strong foundation for consensus-building on a transformative, inclusive, and future-ready National Curriculum that aims to nurture empathy, creativity, teamwork, collective competence, and responsible citizenship across Pakistan's diverse education landscape.—DNA

# HR body backs over 1,000 RWMC workers regularisation

RAWALPINDI: The Human Resource (HR) Committee of the Board of Directors of Rawalpindi Waste Management Company (RWMC) on Wednesday agreed to a proposal for regularisation of more than 1,000 workers and forwarded the matter to the Board for final approval.

During the visit, he met citizens present at the office, listened to their complaints and sought feedback on the facilities being provided, staff conduct and pace of work. The commissioner said revenue offices were among the most frequented public offices and, therefore, must be upgraded to state-of-the-art standards to ensure efficient service delivery. He observed that public service was the fundamental responsibility of government officers and staff, and directed that offices be made genuinely citizen-friendly to strengthen public trust. Emphasising accuracy of record, transparency and strict adherence to merit, he said all official matters must be handled in accordance with prescribed rules and regulations. He directed the officials not to keep applications and files pending without justification, and to ensure that each case was decided within the stipulated timeline. The commissioner instructed the Additional Deputy Commissioner (Revenue) to maintain a complete tracking record of cases so that responsibility could be fixed in instances of delay. He further directed that the standard of public service be improved, staff should treat visitors with courtesy and respect, and citizens' matters be resolved promptly without causing unnecessary inconvenience. He also called for ensuring essential facilities at public offices and establishing an effective mechanism for redress of complaints.—APP

## Sheikho gang behind bars as Police arrest 2 members

ISLAMABAD: Islamabad Capital Territory (ICT) Police have arrested two members of the notorious "Sheikho gang" involved in multiple incidents of robbing citizens after withdrawing cash from banks, and recovered Rs2.2 million looted money from their possession. An official told APP on Wednesday that Khanna police carried out a successful operation against the organized gang, apprehending its two members who were allegedly involved in several armed robbery incidents in the twin cities. The official said that during the operation, police recovered Rs2.2 million in looted cash along with weapons and ammunition used in the crimes. During interrogation, the arrested suspects reportedly confessed to committing multiple robberies at gunpoint, targeting citizens outside banks. They also revealed that they had injured victims who resisted during the incidents. DIG Muhammad Jawad Tariq said that all legal requirements would be fulfilled to ensure strict punishment for the accused. He reiterated that indiscriminate action against those depriving citizens of their hard-earned money would continue, adding that large-scale operations against organized and active criminal gangs are underway across the federal capital.—APP

## FGEHA accelerates F-14/15 development

ISLAMABAD: Federal Government Housing Authority (FGEHA), operating under the Ministry of Housing and Works, has significantly intensified construction activities in Sector F-14/15, marking a decisive phase in one of the capital's most anticipated housing developments. In a major push to fast-track progress, heavy machinery and workforce deployments have been scaled up, signaling the Authority's renewed determination to meet development targets within the stipulated timeframe. Officials said that the project has now entered a "high-gear execution phase," with visible on-ground activity expected to accelerate in the coming weeks. An official spokesperson

of FGEHA told that the development of basic infrastructure — including roads, sewerage systems, and electricity networks — is planned for completion within three years under the existing contract framework. However, he clarified that the timeline may be adjusted depending on operational factors, with extensions permissible under contractual provisions if required. In a significant development, the National Logistics Cell (NLC) has formally mobilized at the site, bringing additional technical capacity and execution strength to the project. Authorities anticipate that development momentum will further intensify by the end of January, transforming the pace and scale of operations across the sector. Addressing technical preparations, the spokesperson revealed

that a comprehensive joint survey will be conducted during the first quarter to record natural surface levels. This will pave the way for extensive earthwork operations, including large-scale leveling and grading — a critical step toward laying the groundwork for modern urban infrastructure. Responding to concerns regarding rising construction material costs, the official assured allottees that FGEHA had proactively incorporated an escalation factor into the project's PC-1 planning document. "The financial framework already accounts for anticipated market fluctuations," he said, underscoring the Authority's foresight in financial planning. On the issue of installment payments, the spokesperson disclosed that approximately 55 percent of allottees have cleared their third installment

to date. Regarding the possibility of an extension, he clarified that no formal decision has been made. "At present, the deadline has expired. Whether to grant further time or impose a penalty rests entirely with the Board," he explained. He added that, so far, no penalties have been imposed, but the matter remains under consideration. FGEHA reiterated that sustained cooperation from members remains essential to ensure timely achievement of project milestones. The Authority expressed appreciation for the continued trust of its allottees and reaffirmed its commitment to delivering a well-planned, fully serviced residential sector. ## Lane violations no more

ISLAMABAD: Islamabad Traffic Police (ITP) have intensified enforcement against lane violations by heavy traffic on IJP Road, and key roads launching a focused campaign aimed at improving road safety and traffic discipline at Federal capital. An ITP official told on Wednesday that heavy vehicles travelling outside designated lanes pose serious risks to commuters and contribute to traffic congestion. The official said that during the past 24 hours, ITP took legal action against 155 heavy vehicles for violations, including lane violations and overspeeding. He said several vehicles involved in dangerous driving practices were impounded and shifted to police stations in accordance with the law. Chief Traffic Officer (CTO) Captain (R) Hamzah Humayun issued a stern warning to heavy vehicle drivers to strictly observe lane discipline or face strict penalties. He emphasized that lane violations are not minor infractions but safety hazards that can endanger human lives. The CTO Hamzah warned that repeated violations may result in vehicle seizure and cancellation of driving licences. He said Islamabad Traffic Police will continue the campaign without leniency to ensure safer roads for citizens.—APP

## Net metering reform shields 1.3% vulnerable consumers

ISLAMABAD: Prime Minister's Coordinator Rana Ehsan Afzal on Wednesday said the revised solar net metering policy is aimed at preventing additional costs from being passed on to the remaining 1.3% of consumers, particularly low-income households, while maintaining a reasonable three-year payback period for solar investors. While speaking to a local media channel, Prime Minister's Coordinator Rana Ehsan Afzal explained that the revised solar net metering policy was designed to balance supply and demand, a principle followed by energy regulators globally. He emphasized that the policy ensures long-term stability of the power system while promoting renewable energy growth. Responding to a query about consumers' concerns, he highlighted that the reforms protect around 1.3% of vulnerable consumers from additional costs, particularly low-income households. He also noted that solar investors would continue to benefit from a reasonable three-year payback period, which the government considers fair and sustainable.—APP

## Kazakhstan envoy meets climate minister



ISLAMABAD: Kazakhstan's Ambassador to Pakistan, Yerzhan Kistafin, on Wednesday called on Federal Minister for Climate Change and Environmental Coordination Dr Musadik Malik to discuss bilateral relations, environmental cooperation and upcoming regional initiatives. According to an official statement, the ambassador appreciated

the hospitality extended to Kazakhstan's President Kassym-Jomart Tokayev and his delegation during their recent visit to Pakistan, noting that ties between the two countries were steadily strengthening. Kistafin invited Dr Malik to attend a Regional Ecological Summit scheduled to be held in Astana in April. The minister welcomed the invitation and

highlighted the longstanding historical and cultural links between Pakistan and Kazakhstan, stressing the need to expand cooperation and trade not only bilaterally but also with the wider Central Asian region. The two sides also reviewed progress on the implementation of a memorandum of understanding signed during President Tokayev's visit and

explored potential joint initiatives, particularly in artificial intelligence, financial technology and e-governance. Environmental challenges, including water scarcity and climate change, also featured in the discussions, with both sides emphasizing enhanced collaboration in environmental protection and sustainable development.—DNA

## Farmers in Punjab turn to broccoli cultivation

ISLAMABAD: Sensing a lucrative opportunity, progressive farmers in Punjab are increasingly turning to broccoli cultivation, as the demand for the vegetable rises among upper-income consumers. Although broccoli remains a niche crop compared to traditional vegetables such as cauliflower and cabbage, it is now widely available at major supermarkets, specialized vegetable outlets, and online platforms. Currently, broccoli is being cultivated on the outskirts of major cities, particularly Lahore, as well as in Sheikhpura, Kasur, Sahiwal, and Pakpattan districts. "This is a profitable crop. There is a strong demand for broccoli in Lahore, Islamabad, and Karachi," said Pir Mehmood Chishti, a broccoli grower from village Tibba Sherkot in Pakpattan district. Talking to Wealth Pakistan, Chishti noted that despite attractive prices, growers face uncertainty due to an underdeveloped marketing network for the exotic vegetable. "The retail price of broccoli ranges between Rs400 and Rs700 per 500 grams, which is significantly higher than cauliflower or cabbage," he said.

However, he added that imported seed remains the highest cost in broccoli cultivation. Marketing also poses a major challenge for growers. Because broccoli is unfamiliar to the general public, its market is limited, Chishti explained. According to him, the main buyers include high-end hotels, departmental stores, and select vegetable shops in large urban centers such as Lahore, Karachi, and Islamabad. Some farms also sell broccoli directly to affluent households through online platforms for its use in salads. "You cannot supply broccoli in large quantities. Sending small volumes is more profitable because the demand is limited. In case of oversupply, growers face losses," he said. Several varieties of broccoli are being cultivated in Pakistan, with the green variety being the most popular. The crop, often described as a superfood, is primarily grown during the cool season from September to March. Vegetable seed dealers say all broccoli seed used in Pakistan is imported from countries such as Holland, Japan, China, and Thailand.—APP

## No formal info literacy programme in place

ISLAMABAD: The National Assembly was informed on Wednesday that no formally structured "Information Literacy Programme (ILP)" is currently operating under the Ministry of Information and Broadcasting; however, various affiliated departments are implementing related initiatives through different platforms. Responding to a question by Ms. Naeema Kishwar Khan, Parliamentary Secretary for Information and Broadcasting, Danyal Chaudhry said the ministry's institutions were carrying out programmes through different forums aimed at enhancing public awareness and responsible media engagement, though not under a specific programme name. He said Pakistan Television Corporation (PTV) is run-

ning training courses and awareness programmes through various forums. The PTV Drama and Film Academy is also conducting capacity-building initiatives for media professionals, focusing on digital literacy, artificial intelligence (AI), ethical journalism, credible news production and public awareness content. Similarly, Pakistan Broadcasting Corporation (PBC), through Radio Pakistan, is promoting media and information literacy nationwide, particularly in remote and underserved areas. Through its Programme Wing and News and Current Affairs Channel, the corporation incorporates themes such as responsible use of information, digital awareness and countering misinformation into programmes broadcast in 23

languages. These include educational, youth, women, religious, and current affairs content. The Parliamentary Secretary added that the Press Information Department (PID) is also conducting different outreach and awareness programmes. Its Countering Violent Extremism (CVE) Cell has organized seminars, training sessions and outreach activities for journalists, students and civil society members. Over the past two years, the PID has also executed large-scale communication campaigns addressing fake news, cybersecurity, national security, Kashmir, the economy and youth empowerment. The Press Council of Pakistan (PCP) is supporting media literacy through internship programmes and

ISLAMABAD: Substantive cooperation outcomes have been achieved between Jinan Animal Husbandry Industry Craftsman College and Pakistani counterparts after a visit to Pakistan, held in conjunction with the 2026 China-Pakistan Agriculture Investment Conference. The collaboration injects new impetus into bilateral livestock industry development, aligning with the advancement of China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) 2.0, China Economic Net reported. During the visit, two key cooperation documents were signed to solidify consensus, the College revealed. It inked a Framework Agreement on Industrial and Technological Cooperation and Talent Training with Pak-China Joint Chamber of Commerce & Industry (PCJCCI), to jointly establish the China-Pakistan Animal Husbandry and Veterinary Industry Technology Cooperation Center, which will undertake technological R&D, standard-setting and customized talent training. 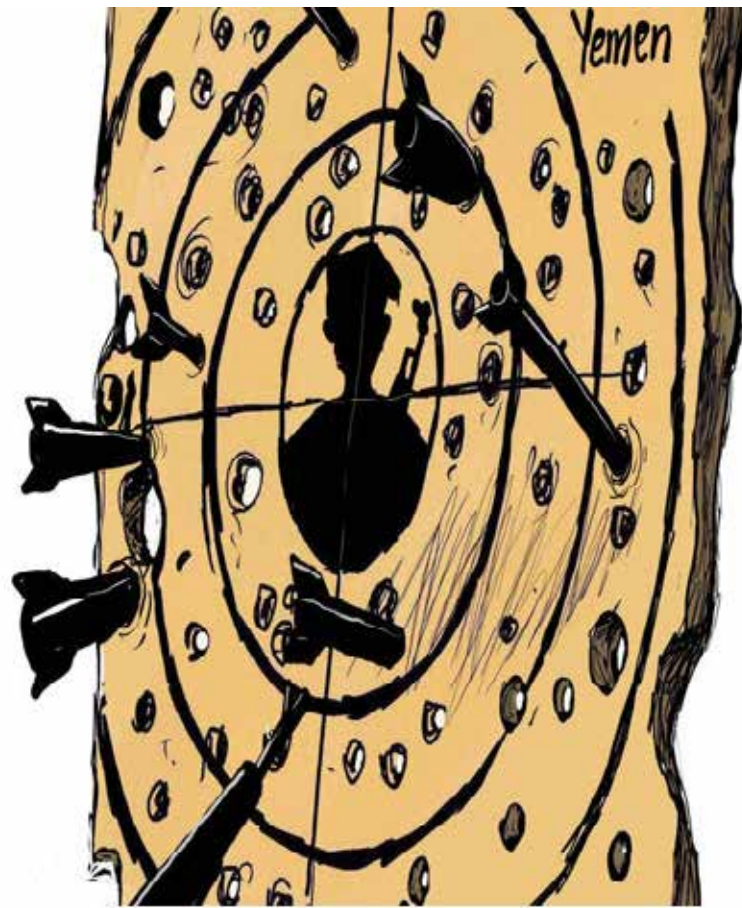
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## Emerging markets must build on their recent success

It used to be that when advanced economies sneezed, emerging markets caught a cold. That is no longer true. Following recent global shocks, such as the post-pandemic inflation surge and a new wave of tariffs, emerging markets have held up well. Inflation has continued to slow, currencies have generally retained their value and debt issuance costs have remained at manageable levels. There has been no sign of the kind of financial turbulence that came with past economic shocks. In fact, emerging markets have expanded their role as a key global growth engine, with their share of the world economy more than doubling since 2000. The 10 emerging markets in the G20 alone now account for over half of global growth. While supportive external conditions have played a part in emerging markets' impressive resilience, so have the policies and institutions underpinning it. Central banks have grown more independent, with clearer inflation targets and less reliance on foreign exchange interventions to absorb shocks. And more emerging markets are using fiscal rules to impose budgetary discipline. In Brazil, for example, monetary reforms paid off in the country's fight against inflation. Guided by an inflation-targeting framework established in 1999, Brazil was one of the first countries to raise interest rates as prices surged during the pandemic. It has since refined its framework and is now expected to reach its 3 percent target next year. Likewise, Nigeria has implemented tough reforms to improve its energy pricing framework and phase out central bank financing of budget deficits. And Egypt is pushing ahead with plans to broaden its tax base, including by widening its value-added tax, closing loopholes and digitizing tax administration. In a world that is likely to remain turbulent for some time, emerging markets need to press ahead with focused reforms. But while emerging markets have made great strides in improving their policy frameworks and enhancing credibility, this is no time for complacency. Their strong recent performance also reflects favorable circumstances such as lower interest rates, accommodative financial conditions and robust commodity prices. Moreover, emerging markets' resilience has not yet translated into faster growth. Nearly six years after the COVID-19 out-



break, gross domestic product in emerging markets and developing economies is on a slower growth path than before the pandemic – a trend that has set back the goal of closing the income gap with advanced economies. At the same time, profound shifts in geopolitics, trade, technology and demographics could make it even harder for emerging markets to catch up. In a world that is likely to remain turbulent for some time, emerging markets need to press ahead with focused reforms. Each country must strike a balance between growth-promoting policies and maintaining economic resilience (through reserves and other instruments that offer shelter in downturns). Creating the conditions for a new job-rich growth surge requires strengthening the business environment to mobilize domestic investors and attract foreign capital. Stronger institutions and governance will lead to deeper financial markets in which the most dynamic and promising companies can grow. Policymakers must also position their economies to take advantage of the potential productivity gains from artificial intelligence. India, Saudi Arabia and other members of the Gulf Cooperation Council, for example, have unveiled impressive infrastructure investments that will lay the foundation for AI adoption for decades to come. Where possible, other emerging markets should follow their lead. Some frontier markets also have the advantage afforded by a young and fast-growing working-age population that is hungry for opportunities. This demographic asset can yield an enormous dividend, but only if countries make substantial investments in education and training to prepare their workforce for the challenges ahead. Increasingly, these economies are coming together to discuss how they can build on their hard-won resilience. Although strains in old alliances have introduced additional uncertainty, the shifting geopolitical and trade landscape does present opportunities for new forms of integration and cooperation. Emerging markets are already playing a leading role in this shift. From Southeast Asia to Africa and Latin America, regional groupings are forging new trade connections and deepening their members' economic and financial ties. As emerging markets' economic clout has increased, so has their influence in global debates. Increasingly, these economies are coming together to discuss how they can leverage their growing scale and build on their hard-won resilience. Their growing prominence was top of mind at this week's AIUla Conference for Emerging Market Economies, held in AIUla, Saudi Arabia. Jointly organized by Saudi Arabia and the International Monetary Fund, this annual event brings together policymakers, business leaders and economic thinkers to chart a course for these economies. Emerging market leaders mapped out plans to thrive in a world of shifting partnerships by emphasizing continued openness and collaboration. Their common goal is to face global volatility with sound economic policies that strengthen resilience and help their people become more prosperous and secure.

## When Rules Apply Selectively

Calls for restraint are dismissed as self-serving

WHEN Canadian Prime Minister Mark Carney addressed the World Economic Forum in Davos, his remarks cut through the usual diplomatic pleasantries. He spoke not of optimism or resilience, but of contradiction. For decades, he argued, Western states claimed to uphold a rules-based international order while quietly bending those very rules whenever it suited their interests. Liberal values were celebrated in speeches, free trade was praised in principle, and international law was invoked selectively – firmly against rivals, cautiously against allies, and rarely against oneself. This was not a radical critique voiced from the margins. It came from the heart of the Western establishment, delivered at a forum that has long served as a symbol of elite consensus. That alone gives Carney's words a particular weight. More importantly, they reflect a reality that much of the world has experienced for years, even if it has rarely been acknowledged so openly by those who benefited most from the system.

The idea of a rules-based order emerged from the ruins of the Second World War. It promised stability through shared norms, predictability through institutions, and fairness through law rather than force. In theory, it was meant to restrain power and protect the weak. In practice, power has often shaped the rules, decided when they apply, and determined who must obey them. Western countries prospered immensely under this arrangement. Open markets expanded where it suited them, financial systems were designed around their interests, and global institutions reflected their priorities. Yet when the same rules threatened domestic industries, political stability, or strategic dominance, exceptions were quickly carved out. Trade barriers were reintroduced under new labels, sanctions replaced dialogue, and international law became a tool of pressure rather than a shared constraint.

The language of liberalism masked these inconsistencies. Human rights were defended passionately in some regions, ignored in others. Military interventions were justified in the name of international responsibility, while equally severe violations elsewhere were met with silence. Allies were forgiven for breaches that would have triggered outrage had they been committed by adversaries. Over time, this pattern did not go unnoticed. It bred resentment, scepticism, and a deep sense of double standards across much of the Global South. Carney's admission that "we participated in the rituals" is telling. The rituals of summits, declarations,

and communiqués allowed the appearance of moral authority to be maintained even as the substance eroded. Calling out hypocrisy was avoided, not because it was invisible, but because it was inconvenient. The system worked well enough for those at the centre, and discomfort was an acceptable price for continued advantage.

Today, that comfort has disappeared. The international order is under strain not only because of rising powers or regional conflicts, but because its moral foundations have weakened. When rules are applied unevenly, they lose legitimacy. When norms are enforced selectively, they cease to be norms and become instruments of power. Appeals to international law are met with reminders of past violations that went unpunished. Even within Western societies, public confidence in globalisation and international institutions has declined, fuelled by the sense that the benefits were unevenly distributed while the costs were socialised. The consequences are visible. Trade is increasingly fragmented, alliances are more transactional, and international institutions struggle to command consensus. Economic nationalism, once criticised as backward, has returned in the language of strategic autonomy and national security. Sanctions, tariffs, and subsidies have become routine policy tools, even as free trade remains a rhetorical ideal. For developing countries, the implications are particularly severe. They are asked to adhere to fiscal discipline while facing mounting debt, to open markets while confronting protectionism elsewhere, and to commit to climate targets without comparable access to technology or finance. The promise that integration into the global system would lead to shared prosperity has, for many, remained unfulfilled.

This is where Carney's remarks matter beyond Davos. Acknowledging hypocrisy is not the same as correcting it, but it is a necessary first step. The question is whether Western states are prepared to move beyond ritual towards reform. That would require more than adjusting language; it would demand a rebalancing of power within global institutions, a willingness to accept constraints on one's own behaviour, and an honest reckoning with past inconsistencies.

A genuinely rules-based order cannot survive if rules are negotiable for some and binding for others. International law cannot command respect if it is treated as optional. Free trade cannot regain credibility if it operates only when politically convenient. And human rights cannot be universal if their defence depends on strategic alignment.

None of this suggests abandoning international cooperation. On the contrary, it underscores the need to rescue it from selective application. A more stable global order would not emerge from dominance disguised as virtue, but from reciprocity grounded in fairness. That means listening to grievances that were previously dismissed, sharing responsibility rather than prescribing discipline, and recognising that legitimacy flows from consistency. The shifting balance of power makes this reckoning unavoidable. As new economic and political centres emerge, the ability of any group of states to define the rules unilaterally is diminishing. Influence now depends less on enforcement and more on credibility. Countries that are seen as fair arbiters, rather than self-interested referees, will shape the future order. For Pakistan and other developing states, this moment presents both risk and opportunity. The weakening of old certainties creates instability, but it also opens space for voices that were previously marginalised. Demands for fairer trade terms, debt relief, and equitable climate arrangements are harder to ignore when the authority of the existing system is under question. Yet this requires strategic clarity. Moral arguments alone will not suffice. Coalitions must be built, institutions engaged, and alternatives proposed that are practical rather than merely critical. The aim should not be to replace one form of imbalance with another, but to contribute to a system that is more even-handed and durable. Carney's speech will not, by itself, transform global politics. Davos has heard confessions before, and the world has seen how easily reflection gives way to routine. But the significance lies in what his words reveal: an awareness, within the West itself, that the old narrative no longer convinces. The gap between rhetoric and reality has become too wide to ignore. Whether this admission leads to reform or merely to a more careful choice of words remains to be seen. What is clear is that the era of unquestioned authority is over. A rules-based order cannot be sustained by selective adherence. If it is to endure, it must finally become what it has long claimed to be a system where rules apply not just to others, but to all.

YEMEN turned a new page with the formation of a new government last week. Led by former Foreign Minister Dr. Shaya Al-Zindani, it promised major economic, political and security reforms. Al-Zindani is a veteran diplomat who served in the diplomatic corps of the pre-1990 southern government, then in the unity government post-1990, before he was appointed foreign minister in 2024. As a conciliatory leader who avoids friction and inflammatory rhetoric, he is the man for the moment. The challenges before the new government are immense. Politically, the main task is to resume the search for a political solution to the Yemen crisis. The UN-mediated talks with the Houthis are at a standstill and need to be jumpstarted. With the dissolution of the Southern Transitional Council, the government has reunited all areas under its authority and is in a good position to lead the negotiations. Yemen needs to strengthen its international support systems. During the eight-year conflict with the Southern Transitional Council, it was nearly paralyzed as the rebel group usurped government authority and pursued its own diplomatic moves. The near-unanimous expressions of support for the new government are a measure of how much the international community is eager for Yemen to resume its rightful place in the region and that it is ready to lend a helping hand. These support groups supplemented the work of joint Gulf Cooperation Council-Yemen committees and bilateral relations. Security is a paramount concern for the new government. Internally, it has to deal with the Houthi military threat. Although there has been a tenuous truce for about four years, the rebel group has broken it with numerous attempts to annex more land. It also poses a serious threat to maritime security and freedom of navigation in the Red Sea, Bab Al-Mandab Strait and Gulf of Aden. The Yemeni government's ability to patrol its territorial waters was hampered by the fragmentation of security forces and the rivalry between them.

The situation improved with the Southern Transitional Council's dissolution last month and especially since the government decided to put all armed groups under a unified command in coordination with the Coalition to Restore Legitimacy in Yemen. Yemen could now play a larger role in countering Houthi threats, both internal and in Yemeni waters, but it needs support from the rest of the world. The third major challenge, after the political and security spheres, is the state of the economy, which has hampered the government's ability to provide basic services and humanitarian assistance to the population. The Southern Transitional Council rebellion against the internationally recognized government in 2017 exacerbated an already fragile economy, which nearly collapsed in 2015 following the Houthi takeover of the capital Sanaa the previous September.

Yemen's gross domestic product contracted by more than 37 percent in three years, from \$43 billion in 2014 to about \$31 billion in 2016 and \$27 billion in 2017, the year the Southern Transitional Council began its rebellion. During its eight-year control of much of the south between 2017 and 2025, the economy shrank to \$17 billion. Thus, the Houthi insurgency in the north and the Southern Transitional Council rebellion in the south caused a 58-percent contraction from 2014 levels.

To bring the economy back from this unprecedented collapse, the government needs security, stability and the resumption of economic activity. There is significant economic potential but the government needs the help of its friends and partners, especially in restoring economic capacity. There are at least four areas of potential economic growth that could be maximized through international engagement and cooperation. Oil and gas production can bring in fuel for the needed economic recovery and funds for government expenditure. Restoring farmers' ability to grow crops and export surplus could bring life back to the countryside and improve food security. In the past, Yemen had thriving fisheries for both local consumption and export. Tourism also has some potential, especially specialized and ecotourism. Realizing the significant potential in these four areas requires several steps, which the government could handle with the help of its growing group of friends. Security needs to be restored to jumpstart economic activity. The exchange rate needs to be stabilized to reassure traders. And a sound economic plan is needed to spur investment.

measures against undocumented Afghan nationals, including arrests and repatriations. Afghan officials and commentators have criticised these steps, calling them coercive and counterproductive. The fallout has affected ordinary citizens on both sides of the border. Traders have reported significant losses due to suspended supply chains, while families dependent on cross-border movement face uncertainty. The repatriation drive targeting Afghan nationals has also drawn criticism from humanitarian groups. Diplomatic efforts to ease tensions have so far yielded limited results. Dialogues held in Doha, Ankara, Tehran and Riyadh reportedly failed to produce a breakthrough. In addition, informal outreach through religious scholars and clerics has not led to a thaw in relations, particularly amid continued public statements from Islamabad emphasising security concerns. Observers note that this marks one of the rare occasions when Kabul has adopted a sustained and consistent position in the face of pressure from Islamabad. The Taliban administration has maintained that it will not compromise on what it describes as sovereignty and national dignity. Meanwhile, some political figures in Pakistan have acknowledged past policy miscalculations regarding Afghanistan. Defence Minister Khawaja Asif recently conceded that previous engagements with militant groups had produced unintended consequences — a statement seen by analysts as a sign of introspection within sections of the political leadership.

"My deepest thanks also go to the Athletics Federation of Pakistan for providing the international stage. Together, we didn't just compete; we conquered," he added. This golden victory further solidifies Haider Ali's status as Pakistan's most successful Paralympic figure. He is expected to land in Pakistan on February 14, where a hero's welcome awaits him. District authorities and local sports fans in Gujranwala are already preparing for a historic reception to honor the man who continues to prove that physical challenges are no barrier to world dominance.

## Sirbaz Khan, Abid Baig first Pakistanis to reach true summit

ISLAMABAD: The Alpine Club of Pakistan (ACP) has confirmed that renowned mountaineer Sirbaz Khan and fellow climber Abid Baig are the first Pakistani climbers to have verifiably reached the true summit of Tirth Mir during the 2025 climbing season, following the completion of an independent and evidence-based inquiry. According to a press release issued by the ACP, the review was conducted by a specially constituted Inquiry Committee under the direction of the ACP Executive Board to assess summit claims related to two Pakistani expeditions to Tirth Mir. The committee comprised Col (R) Sher Khan as Chairman, along with members Naila Kiani and Tayyab Syed. The panel examined summit photographs, GPS data, official expedition reports and statements from expedition leaders before reaching its conclusions. The ACP stated that the expedition led by Sirbaz Khan submitted credible, coherent and independently verifiable evidence confirming a successful ascent of the true summit on August 19, 2025. Based on the material reviewed, the committee validated the claim and formally recognised Sirbaz Khan and Abid Baig as having reached the true summit. The inquiry further concluded that the expedition led by Abdul Joshi did not reach the true summit on August 1, 2025. The team was found to have reached a false summit, which was believed at the time to be the main summit due to severe weather conditions and the absence of a device to verify altitude. The committee noted that the evidence submitted by the Abdul Joshi-led team was insufficient to conclusively establish that the true summit had been attained. However, the report acknowledged that fixed ropes installed by the team up to approximately 7,550 metres significantly reduced the technical workload for subsequent climbers. The ACP appreciated the professional, transparent and diligent work of the Inquiry Committee, emphasising that the review process was undertaken solely to uphold accuracy, fairness and the integrity of Pakistan's mountaineering records. — DNA

Hong Kong legend Romantic Warrior

## Person detained for questioning over kidnap of US TV anchor's mother

LOS ANGELES: Authorities have detained a person for questioning over the kidnapping of the mother of US TV anchor Savannah Guthrie, media reported Tuesday, the same day the FBI released new photos of an apparent suspect in the case. Citing unnamed law enforcement sources, major networks CNN, ABC and Fox reported that law enforcement officials have detained someone for questioning in connection to the abduction of Nancy Guthrie, who is being held for ransom. The person has not been charged, CNN reported. The update comes amid breathless coverage of the kidnapping of the high-profile anchor's mother in a case that has gripped the country. Earlier Tuesday the FBI released images showing a person in a full-face balaclava apparently tampering with a front-door camera outside Nancy Guthrie's home in the southwestern city of Tucson, Arizona.

The six photographs and three videos posted by FBI Director Kash Patel on his X account show an individual on a deserted doorstep in the dark, in eerie black-and-white imagery. The person is described as an "armed individual." ABC reported however that there was no indication that the person who was detained was the same person as the one seen in the photographs. Nancy Guthrie, mother of NBC News "Today" co-host Savannah Guthrie, is believed to have been kidnapped from her home on the night of January 31 or in the early hours of February 1. The images date to "the morning of her disappearance," Patel said on X. "As of this morning, law enforcement has uncovered these previously inaccessible new images showing an armed individual appearing to have tampered with the camera at Nancy Guthrie's front door the morning of her disappearance," Patel wrote.

White House spokesperson Karoline Leavitt began a media briefing by saying she and President Donald Trump had just reviewed the newly released imagery. Nancy Guthrie's family has received ransom letters with payment demands, the FBI has said. Footage shows the individual approaching Guthrie's front door, head down, clad in long pants, a zip-up jacket, hat and gloves, and carrying a backpack. The person's hands loom over the camera for several seconds before he or she turns, looking for something on the ground, then stepping outside the entryway and pulling up some plants. Subsequent footage appears to show the person pushing the plants against the camera. Pima County Sheriff Chris Nanos last week stated that the doorbell camera outside Nancy Guthrie's home was disconnected at 1:47 am on Sunday, February 1. At 2:12 am, "software detects a person on a cam-

era, but there's no video available," he said. Savannah Guthrie on Monday released the latest video appeal for public help in tracking down her ailing mother, who suffers from heart problems and needs regular medication. "As we enter into another week of this nightmare...thank you so much for all of the prayers and the love that we have felt," an emotional Guthrie said on Instagram. "Law enforcement is working tirelessly around the clock trying to bring her home, trying to find where she was taken, and we don't know where. "We believe our mom is still out there. We need your help." Nancy Guthrie's disappearance has garnered wall-to-wall coverage in US media, with dozens of reporters and camera crews descending on the quiet Arizona suburb where she lives. Authorities said they believed the missing woman was still alive, and said blood discovered on her doorstep belonged to her. — Agencies

**PSX gains 896 points to close at 183,049 points**

ISLAMABAD: The benchmark KSE-100 Index of the Pakistan Stock Exchange (PSX) on Wednesday witnessed bullish trend, gaining 896.25 points, a positive change of 0.49 percent, to close at 183,049.81 points compared to 182,153.55 points on the previous trading day, according to PSX data. During the session, the ready market recorded a trading volume of 734.671 million shares with a traded value of Rs 35,393 billion, against 1,062.309 million shares valuing Rs 37,883 billion in the previous session. Market capitalization increased to Rs 20.710 trillion from Rs 20.634 trillion a day earlier. Out of 477 active companies in the ready market, 208 advanced, 223 declined, while 46 remained unchanged. K-Electric Limited topped the volume chart with 120.603 million shares, followed by Cnergyco PK with 81.776 million shares and F. Nat. Equities with 51.954 million shares. The top gainers included Khyber Textile Mills Limited, which rose by Rs 147.00 to close at Rs 1,620.09, and Sitara Chemical Industries Limited, which gained Rs 59.29 to settle at Rs 939.27. On the losing side, PIA Holding Company Limited declined by Rs 740.67 to close at Rs 18,226.00, while Rafhan Maize Products Company Limited fell by Rs 339.65 to close at Rs 9,575.02. In the futures market, turnover stood at 149.370 million shares with a traded value of Rs 8,556 billion, compared to 286.117 million shares worth Rs 10.318 billion in the previous session. Out of 328 futures-market companies, 132 recorded gains, while 195 declined and one remained unchanged.—APP

**Gold prices surge by Rs 2,300 per tola**

ISLAMABAD: Gold prices witnessed a significant increase in the local market on Wednesday, as the price of 24-karat gold per tola surged by Rs2,300 to settle at Rs528,562, according to the All Pakistan Sarafa Gems and Jewellers Association. Likewise, the price of 10 grams of 24-karat gold rose by Rs1,972 to Rs453,156, while the price of 10 grams of 22-karat gold increased by Rs1,808 to Rs415,408. In the international market, the price of gold gained \$23 to reach \$5,058 per ounce. Meanwhile, silver prices also recorded an upward trend in the local market, with the price of 24-karat silver per tola climbing by Rs120 to Rs8,735, while the price of 10 grams of silver increased by Rs103 to Rs7,488. The price of silver in the international market rose by \$1.20 to settle at \$82.60 per ounce.—APP

**Rupee gains 01 paisa against US Dollar**

ISLAMABAD: The Rupee on Wednesday appreciated by 01 paisa against the US Dollar in interbank trading and closed at Rs 279.66 compared to the previous day's closing at Rs279.67. According to the Forex Association of Pakistan (FAP), the buying and selling rates of the Dollar in the open market were recorded at Rs 280.55 and Rs 282.2, respectively. The price of the Euro increased by Rs 0.20 to close at Rs 333.23 from the previous day's close of Rs 333.02, according to the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP). The Japanese Yen went up by 03 paisa and closed at Rs 1.82, whereas the exchange rate of the Emirates Dirham and the Saudi Riyal came down by 01 paisa each to close at Rs 76.13 and Rs 74.56, respectively.—APP

# Pak, KSA discuss for expanding regional market cooperation

The two sides agreed that Pakistan and Saudi Arabia, by leveraging their respective strengths, can position themselves as complementary partners—combining Pakistan's production capabilities with Saudi Arabia's capital strength, market access, and regional connectivity

ISLAMABAD: Federal Minister for Commerce Jam Kamal Khan held a comprehensive meeting with Ibrahim Al-Mubarak, Assistant Minister of Investment of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, to review and advance bilateral cooperation in trade, investment, and joint engagement in regional markets. The meeting reflected strong convergence of views on adopting an investment-led and partnership-based approach to economic cooperation. Both sides emphasized the importance of enhancing competitiveness, scaling up production, and strengthening value chains to unlock Pakistan's export potential and meet growing regional demand sustainably, said a release issued here on Wednesday. A key focus of the discussion was the joint exploration of regional markets, particularly Central Asia, Africa, and ASEAN, identified as high-growth regions offering significant opportunities for collaboration. The two sides agreed that Pakistan and Saudi Arabia, by leveraging their respective strengths, can position themselves as complementary partners—combining Pakistan's production capabilities with Saudi Arabia's capital strength, market



access, and regional connectivity. In the rice sector, the Saudi side expressed interest in corporate farming in Pakistan. It was noted that Pakistan already meets quality requirements, and that investment in corporate-scale farming, mechanization, storage, and logistics could enable consistent exports of rice from Pakistan to Saudi Arabia under structured, long-term arrangements. More broadly, in agriculture and food security, discussions covered cooperation in rice, fodder (including alfalfa), meat, and selected agri-products. Both sides explored the potential role of Saudi financing institutions in supporting export-linked agricultural and infrastructure projects in Pakistan, particularly those aligned with guaranteed offtake to Saudi Arabia. The meeting also examined corporate farming and mechanization as long-term solutions to productivity challenges, including in crops such as cotton, where declining yields and high manual input costs have affected competitiveness. The Commerce Minister noted that export-oriented investment models could help revive agricultural output while supporting downstream industries, including textiles and yarn.—DNA

## Philippines urges China to keep tone calm as rhetoric heats up

MANILA: The Philippine foreign ministry urged the Chinese Embassy in Manila on Wednesday to be "constructive" in its statements amid an escalating war of words between Chinese diplomats and public officials, including senators. The Department of Foreign Affairs' newly appointed maritime affairs spokesperson, Rogelio Villanueva, said that responses should be delivered in a "calm" and "professional" manner. "The DFA values candid and vigorous debate with its foreign counterparts on important issues consistent with the Philippines' democratic tradition," he said. The Chinese Embassy in Manila did not immediately respond to a request for comment. Villanueva's remarks came after the Senate approved a resolution on Monday condemning statements made by the Chinese Embassy in Manila, which criticized Philippine officials for defending the country's sovereignty and maritime rights in the South China Sea. The Chinese embassy rejected and condemned the resolution, calling it a "political stunt." On Tuesday, the Philippines' Ambassador to the United States, Jose Manuel Romualdez, underscored the need to "cool" the temperature between China and the Philippines, saying that the relationship between the two countries should not be defined solely by the maritime dispute. The Philippines and China have been locked in a series of maritime confrontations in recent years, with the Philippines accusing China of aggressive actions inside its exclusive economic zones, including dangerous maneuvers, water-cannoning, and interference in resupply missions. China, in turn, has accused the Philippines of intruding into what it claims as its territory. China's military has grown stronger in the past year in its fight against corruption, President Xi Jinping told the Chinese armed forces on Wednesday, making a rare public reference to the graft probes linked to the country's top generals. China's two highest-ranked generals have been ensnared in disciplinary probes, with He Weidong expelled in October last year and Zhang Youxia placed under investigation in January, marking one of the most high-profile purges of the Chinese military in decades. "The past year has been unusual and extraordinary," Xi told the military in a virtual address. "The People's Army has deepened its political education, effectively addressed various risks and challenges, and undergone revolutionary forging in the fight against corruption." The downfall of Zhang and He, the two vice chairmen of the Central Military Commission, has cut China's seven-man supreme military leadership body to just a committee of two people—Xi himself as the chair of CMC and a newly promoted vice chairman Zhang Shengmin. The seats of CMC's three remaining members are currently empty. Li Shangfu was expelled in 2024 and Miao Hua in 2025, while Liu Zhenli was placed under investigation for corruption last month.—DNA

## Sudan paramilitary drone strike on school kills 2 kids

KHARTOUM: A drone strike blamed on Sudan's paramilitary Rapid Support Forces killed two children and injured 12 others Wednesday in the southern city of El-Rahad, a medical source told AFP. El-Rahad lies in Sudan's Kordofan region, currently the fiercest battlefield in the war raging between the RSF and the regular army since April 2023. "I saw a dozen students injured," Ahmed Moussa, an eyewitness to the attack, told AFP, adding that the drone had struck a traditional Qur'anic school. El-Rahad, in North Kordofan state, was retaken by the army last February, as part of a rapid offensive that saw it push west to break a long-running siege on state capital El-Obeid. The RSF has been trying to re-encircle El-Obeid since, including by launching successive drone strikes on the main highway out of the city, which connects the western region of Darfur with the capital Khartoum. Since it began, the war has killed tens of thousands and left around 11 million people displaced, creating the world's largest hunger and displacement crises. It has also effectively split the country in two, with the army holding the north, center and east while the RSF and its allies control the west and parts of the south.—APP

## New poll shows only 6% of Arabs accept recognizing Israel

CHICAGO: Eighty-seven percent of citizens in the Arab world oppose recognition of Israel while only 6 percent accept it, according to a new survey by the Arab Center Washington DC. The 2025 Arab Opinion Index, conducted nine times since 2011, surveyed more than 40,000 people in 15 Arab countries on a wide range of issues including politics, economy and identity. "An overwhelming majority ... oppose recognition of Israel," Tamara Kharroub, deputy executive director and senior fellow at the ACW, said during a live webinar on Tuesday attended by Arab News. That finding has been consistent and within range in every poll conducted since 2014, according to the center's polling data. The 15 countries surveyed are Algeria, Egypt, Iraq, Jordan, Kuwait, Lebanon, Libya, Mauritania, Morocco, Palestine, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Sudan, Syria and Tunisia. The highest rates of opposition to recognizing Israel were recorded in Libya (96 percent), Jordan (95 percent), Kuwait (94 percent) and Palestine (91 percent). A conclusion cited in the poll said: "Those who opposed recognizing Israel cited various factors, mainly linked to its colonial, racist, and expansionist nature and its continued occupation of Palestinian territory. Cultural or religious explanations were largely absent. "The reasons cited by respondents clearly indicated that their position on recognizing Israel is not likely to change as long as its colonial nature persists." Kharroub said the number that accept recognition of Israel "dropped by 2 percentage points in the 2025 Arab Opinion Index, compared to the 2022 survey." She added of those 6 percent, "half made such a move conditional on the formation of an independent Palestinian state." Yousef Munayyer, ACW's head of the Palestine / Israel Program and senior fellow, said: "Israel continues to be widely perceived as a threat and not a partner. This is something that has only been escalated in recent years.—Agencies

## Israeli court ordered prisons to give Palestinian detainees more food

NABLUS: Five months after Israel's Supreme Court ruled that its prisons were failing to provide enough food for Palestinian detainees and ordered conditions be improved, emaciated prisoners are still emerging with tales of extreme hunger and abuse. Samer Khawaireh, 45, told Reuters that all he was given to eat in Israel's Megiddo and Nafha prisons was ten thin pieces of bread over the course of a day, with a bit of hummus and tahini. Twice a week some tuna. Videos saved on Khawaireh's phone show him at normal weight before he was detained in the West Bank city of Nablus last April, and clearly emaciated upon his release. He says he lost 22 kg (49 pounds) during nine months in captivity, emerging a month ago covered in scabies sores and so gaunt and disheveled his 9-year-old son Azadeen didn't recognize him. Reuters could not independently determine the total number of prisoners where the scarcity of food prevailed, or the total number of inmates who experienced its toll. Reuters could not independently verify Khawaireh's diet during his captivity, the reasons for his extreme weight loss, or exactly how widespread such experience is among the 9,000 Palestinians held in Israeli jails. But it was consistent with descriptions in some reports compiled by lawyers after prison visits. Reuters reviewed 13 such reports from December and January, in which 27 prisoners complained of a lack of food, with most saying provisions had not changed since the court order. The Association for Civil Rights in Israel (ACRI), which was involved in last year's landmark court case that led to the order for better treatment for prisoners, has accused the government of harboring a "policy of starvation" in prisons. The Israel Prisons Service declined to comment on Khawaireh's individual case but said it "rejects allegations of 'starvation' or systematic neglect. Nutrition and medical care are provided based on professional standards and operational procedures." The service "operates in accordance with the law and court rulings" and all complaints are investigated through official channels, a spokesperson said. "Basic rights, including access to food, medical care, and adequate living conditions, are provided in accordance with the law and applicable procedures, by professionally trained staff." Khawaireh, a journalist at a Nablus radio station who was held without charge, said he was never told why he was detained in a night raid on his house in April. Israel's military declined to comment. Independent verification of the treatment of detainees has become more difficult since the start of the Gaza War, when Israel barred prison visits by the International Committee of the Red Cross, a role the Geneva-based body has played in conflicts around the world for a century. ACRI has petitioned Israel's Supreme Court to allow Red Cross access to Palestinian detainees. It has also applied to court to have the prison service held in contempt for failing to comply with last September's order that it improve conditions. "All the indications that we're getting are that not much has changed" since the court ruling, the group's executive director Noa Sattath told Reuters. "The prisoners are not getting more food if they ask for it. There hasn't been any medical examination of the situation of the prisoners, and the prisoners are still hungry." The Supreme Court did not respond to a request for comment on the case. The number of detainees held by Israel swelled after the Hamas-led attacks on October 7, 2023, with thousands swept up during Israel's assault on Gaza and a crackdown in the occupied West Bank, though hundreds were freed under a ceasefire last October. Throughout the war in Gaza, Israel's Security Minister, Itamar Ben-Gvir, in charge of the prisons service, has compared Israel's treatment of Palestinians with the abuse faced by Israeli hostages held in Gaza by Hamas, many of whom were released in a state of near starvation that shocked Israelis. Hamas denies starving hostages, saying they ate as well as their captors under Israeli restrictions on supplies to Gaza. Sattath, of ACRI, said the treatment of hostages held by militants provides no justification for mistreating Palestinian detainees.—APP

# Finance minister lauds the US support in Pak's economic uplift

ISLAMABAD: John Mark Pommersheim, Deputy Assistant Secretary, Bureau of South and Central Asian Affairs, United States Department of State, accompanied by Natalie A. Baker, the U.S. Chargé d'Affaires to Pakistan, called on the Federal Minister for Finance and Revenue at the Finance Division. The Finance Minister welcomed Mr. Pommersheim and appreciated the longstanding support and engagement of the United States in Pakistan's economic development, particularly cooperation in multilateral financial frameworks. Both sides exchanged views on Pakistan's economic outlook, reform agenda, and avenues for enhancing bilateral economic cooperation. The Finance Minister briefed the visiting delegation on

Pakistan's macroeconomic stabilization and reform progress with focus on transitioning toward sustainable, export-led growth. He shared that the fiscal deficit has declined, the current account has improved due to strong remittance inflows and growth in IT exports, and credit ratings have shown positive movement. The Minister emphasized that the government will stay the course in strengthening fiscal discipline, ensuring external stability, and undertaking structural reforms that support durable growth. He noted that reforms in state-owned enterprises and right-sizing of the public sector are being accelerated to improve efficiency and reduce fiscal risks. The Finance Minister also highlighted growing investor confidence, citing recent

indigenous investment initiatives and increased private-sector participation. Mr. Pommersheim acknowledged Pakistan's efforts toward fiscal stabilization and welcomed the signs of improvement in key macroeconomic indicators. He emphasized that the United States values a stable and prosper

ous Pakistan and noted that strengthening the investment climate remains a shared priority. He observed that U.S. businesses are closely watching reform progress and that improved policy consistency would further support commercial engagement. The Finance Minister reiterated

Pakistan's commitment to facilitating foreign investment and maintaining regular engagement with the U.S. business community, including the U.S. Chamber of Commerce and the American Business Council. The Finance Minister also briefed Mr. Pommersheim on Pakistan's plans to re-enter international capital markets, including Panda Bond issuance, as part of a broader strategy to diversify financing sources. On privatization, the Minister reaffirmed the government's resolve to move forward expeditiously. He noted that the privatization process is gaining momentum, with upcoming steps including transactions in the banking and power distribution sectors, as well as outsourcing of major airports beginning with Islamabad.



## Turkish, Greek leaders set for talks on maritime borders

ANKARA: Turkish President Tayyip Erdogan will host Greek Prime Minister Kyriakos Mitsotakis on Wednesday for talks likely to focus on migration and longstanding maritime disputes, as the NATO allies and historic rivals try to build on warming ties. Fifteen migrants died in a shipwreck off the Greek island of Chios last week after their boat collided with a Greek coast guard vessel and sank in the Aegean Sea off the Turkish coast. Mitsotakis will be accompanied by ministers responsible for foreign affairs, finance, development and migration, Greek officials said. Developments in the Middle East, Iran and Ukraine, migration, trade and organized crime are also likely to be on the agenda. Greek Foreign Ministry spokeswoman Lana Zochiou said on Tuesday the aim was "to assess the progress of bilateral cooperation" and "to keep communication channels open to defuse any potential crises.—APP

## Lebanon, Jordan seek solutions after Damascus bans non-Syrian trucks

BEIRUT: Lebanon and Jordan are seeking a solution with Syria after the latter barred foreign trucks from entering its territory, officials from both countries told AFP on Tuesday. Damascus had issued a decision on Saturday stipulating that "non-Syrian trucks will not be allowed to enter" the country, and that goods being imported by road must be unloaded at specific points at border crossings. The decision exempts trucks that are only passing through Syria to other countries. Dozens of trucks unable to enter the country were lined up on the Lebanese side of the Masnaa border crossing on Tuesday, an AFP photographer saw. Ahmad Tamer, head of land and maritime transportation at the Lebanese transport ministry told AFP that discussions were underway with Damascus over the decision. He said the issue was not specifically targeting Lebanon—which is trying to reset ties with Damascus after the fall of Bashar Assad—adding that he hoped to hold a meeting with the Syrian side soon. Lebanon sends around 500 trucks to Syria per day, according to Tamer. In Jordan, also affected by the decision, transport ministry spokesperson Mohammed Al-Dweiri told AFP that "discussions are currently underway, and we are awaiting a response from the Syrian side regarding allowing foreign trucks to enter and cross." Dweiri said that Jordanian trucks were continuing to unload their cargo at the free zone at the Nassib border crossing with Syria despite some "confusion.—APP

## Taiwan to send team to assess US rare earth deposits

TAIPEI: Taiwan plans to send officials to assess US rare earths deposits with a goal to have such minerals refined on the island, Economy Minister Kung Minghsin said on Wednesday. President Donald Trump's administration has stepped up efforts to secure US supplies of critical minerals after China rattled senior officials and global markets last year by withholding rare earths required by American automakers and other industrial manufacturers. Trump last week launched a US strategic stockpile of critical minerals, called Project Vault, backed by \$10 billion in seed funding from the US Export-Import Bank and \$2 billion in private funding. While semiconductor powerhouse Taiwan is not formally part of that scheme, it has previously held talks with the United States on how it can help, given Taipei's concerns about over-reliance on a China-centric supply chain. China views Taiwan as its own territory and has stepped up its military threats. Speaking to reporters in Taipei, Kung said the ministry's Geological Survey and Mining Management Agency would go to the United States to assess rare earths deposits there.—APP

**Indian cricketer Abhishek Sharma hospitalized**

NEW DELHI: Prolific Indian opener Abhishek Sharma has been hospitalised with an upset stomach ahead of the group match against Namibia at the T20 World Cup, a cricket board official said on Wednesday. The explosive left-hander is key to India's chances of defending their title at the 20-team tournament and is doubtful for the Group A fixture on Thursday in New Delhi. The 25-year-old was admitted to a Delhi hospital on Tuesday after he missed training with a stomach issue he carried from the opener in Mumbai, the official told AFP on condition of anonymity. India's assistant coach Ryan ten Doeschate acknowledged the concern on Tuesday, saying the batsman had "still got a few issues with his tummy". "We hope that he'll be available for the game in a few days' time." Abhishek was out for a duck in India's win over the United States but has been a strong performer in the lead-up to the tournament. India play arch-rivals Pakistan in a blockbuster on Sunday.

**Punjab pledges Rs 10bln for FC**

LAHORE: Punjab Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz has announced a Rs10 billion allocation for the Frontier Corps (FC) to strengthen the force's capacity-building and bolster security in Balochistan. Addressing FC headquarters during her visit to Balochistan on Tuesday, she paid tribute to those serving in Balochistan under difficult and dangerous circumstances. In her speech, which was aired on Wednesday, Maryam shared that she found out a few months ago that the FC required Rs10 billion for "capacity building". "I was asked to contribute whatever Punjab could," she stated. "I decided it was not a favour... it was a responsibility. I said we will provide them the entire Rs10bn." The chief minister highlighted that the allocation aimed to enhance operational readiness and strengthen security efforts in Balochistan, particularly in light of recent threats and attacks. CM Maryam's visit came in the wake of a spate of attacks across Balochistan on January 31, which brought parts of the restive province to a standstill for several days. Security forces had responded by killing a total of 216 terrorists during "Operation Radd-ul-Fitna-1" in the province.

# Pak announces appointments of envoys to key capitals

ISLAMABAD: The federal government has appointed 19 ambassadors and consuls general to key capitals and cities abroad following the approval of Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif, Deputy PM and Foreign Minister Senator Ishaq Dar announced on Wednesday. The foreign minister said the new postings were aimed at building on two years of active international engagement. Dar expressed confidence that the envoys would represent Pakistan with "clarity of purpose and wisdom, with clear emphasis on "economic diplomacy". He praised the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and diplomats serving far from home, de-

scribing their professionalism as central to Pakistan's global representation. The appointments cover major missions in the United Kingdom, Europe, Africa, Central Asia and North America, reflecting Islamabad's focus on diversifying partnerships and promoting commercial interests overseas. Ambassador Mudassir, currently serving in Iran, was designated for Uzbekistan, a post from which Ahmad Farooq is returning. Additional Secretary for Disarmament and Foreign Office spokesperson, Andrabi, was posted as Permanent Representative to the UN in Geneva, a location where he has previously served.

## Netanyahu to push Trump on Iran missiles in talks

Israeli president likely to urge US counterpart to take harder line on Iran's ballistic missile programme

TEL AVIV: Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu will push Donald Trump on Wednesday to take a tougher stance in nuclear talks with Iran, after rushing to Washington to stiffen the US president's resolve. Trump said on the eve of the hastily arranged White House meeting – set to begin at 11am local time (1600 GMT) – that he was weighing sending a second US "armada" to the Middle East to pressure Tehran to reach a nuclear deal. But Netanyahu, making his sixth visit to the United States since Trump took office, will also be urging the US leader to take a harder line on arch-foe Iran's ballistic missile programme. Tehran, which resumed talks with Washington last week of "destructive influences" on diplomacy ahead of the Israeli premier's visit. Netanyahu had been expected to come to Washington for a February 19 meeting of Trump's "Board of Peace" for Gaza, but reportedly brought forward his visit as the US-Iran talks proceeded. While talking up hopes of a nuclear deal, Trump warned in an interview with the Axios news outlet on Tuesday that he was "thinking" of sending a second aircraft carrier strike group to the region. "Either we will make a deal or we will have to do something very tough like last time," Trump told Axios. "We have an armada that is heading there and another one might be going." Trump, who ordered US strikes on Tehran's nuclear sites during Israel's 12-day war with Iran last June, separately told Fox Business that any deal would have to involve "no nuclear weapons, no missiles."

## President Zardari warns escalation involving Iran could destabilize region

ISLAMABAD: President Asif Ali Zardari on Wednesday welcomed the efforts aimed at easing tension and promoting regional peace, warning that any military escalation involving Iran could destabilise the Gulf region, South Asia and Western Asia. "Any instability involving Iran, or any attempt to resolve issues through military means, carries grave risks. Such actions could... undermine global peace, and cause serious harm to the global economy. The stakes are far too high for confrontation," The president said while speaking at a reception hosted by the embassy of Iran to celebrate 47th anniversary of Iran's National Day. He said Pakistan opposed unilateral sanctions and coercive measures, including against Iran, and believed that peaceful engagement best served regional and global security. "Pakistan welcomes efforts aimed at easing tensions and encourages continued dialogue among relevant parties in a constructive spirit, with the objective of promoting peace and stability in the region," he added. Earlier, the president requested the participants to observe one minute of silence in memory of the victims of the recent blast in Islamabad, and the tragedies in Iran. "Let's pray that wars never come to us," the president prayed. Referring to the ongoing conflicts, terror-

ism, external interference and unresolved regional flashpoints in the region, the president said Pakistan firmly believed that such challenges could not be addressed through force or unilateral actions. President Zardari emphasized that Pakistan and Iran shared responsibilities as neighbouring countries and remained committed to cooperation on border management, counter-terrorism, and turning the shared frontier into a zone of cooperation, lawful trade and development. He said Pakistan valued balanced relations globally and remained ready to play a constructive role in promoting restraint, dialogue and regional peace. The president extended his warm congratulations to the leadership and people of Iran. "May our partnership continue to grow, and may our region move towards security, stability and shared prosperity," he prayed. He said Pakistan and Iran were not only neighbours; but also civilisational partners. "Our shared border reflects centuries of interaction, coexistence and mutual respect. Our relationship is rooted in faith, history and enduring cultural bonds that continue to shape our region." He noted that the Persian language and its great literary tradition had profoundly influenced Pakistan's intellectual life. For hundreds of years, he said Persian served as the official language of large parts of the regions that now form Pakistan.

## Pak urges South Sudan parties to recommit to 2018 peace accord

**UNITED NATIONS:** Amid political deadlock among signatories to the 2018 South Sudan peace agreement and a dangerous escalation in armed confrontations, Pakistan has called on all stakeholders to recommit to the agreement in good faith and to address differences through inclusive dialogue. "It is time for renewal of national consensus," Ambassador Asim Ahmad, permanent representative of Pakistan to the United Nations, told the UN Security Council which on Tuesday debated the deteriorating situation in South Sudan, an African country that gained independence from the Republic of Sudan in 2011. At this critical juncture, he stressed the need to prevent another descent into violence, warning, "The cost of failure would be borne first and foremost by the South Sudanese people, and would also have profound regional consequences. "It is time for more deeper engagement, not distancing or abandonment," the Pakistani envoy added. Against this backdrop, Ambassador Asim Ahmad underscored the crucial role of the United Nations Mission in South Sudan (UNMISS), saying there is a continued need for the Mission to remain operational and robust at a time of heightened political uncertainty, inter-communal violence, and regional spill-over risks. "The upcoming renewal of UNMISS is critically important and should preserve the Mission's core capacities, which are urgently needed to support the South Sudanese people and prevent further deterioration of situation," he said, while calling for ensuring safety and security of UN personnel. Noting with "concern" UN Secretary-General's assessment of the operational impact of the ongoing liquidity crisis on UNMISS, the Pakistani envoy said, "In an already fragile environment, reductions in Mission's capacity carry serious risks for the protection of civilians and the safety and security of UN personnel." "The reported decline in patrols, reduced reach, and other implications underscore the real consequences of resource shortfalls on mandate delivery," he said, highlighting the fact that out of the 17,000 troops sanctioned by the Security Council to implement the mandate, only around 9,700 remain in UNMISS. These challenges are further compounded by the regional spill-over of the conflict in the neighbouring Republic of Sudan, Ambassador Asim Ahmad said, pointing out that the arrival of approximately 1.3 million people fleeing their country since April 2023 has placed additional strain on South Sudan's already strained systems. Further weakening UNMISS capacities would be particularly ill-timed and counterproductive, he added. – DNA

## Govt proposes imposing new fixed monthly charges on household consumers

*Fixed charge of Rs200 per month for those using up to 100 units, Rs300 for those using up to 200 units on cards*

ISLAMABAD: The federal government plans to collect an additional Rs132 billion a year from domestic electricity consumers by imposing new fixed monthly charges, while reducing per-unit tariffs by up to Rs1.53 for calendar year 2026. The move marks major restructuring that will shift Rs101 billion in subsidies away from households and toward the industrial sector. The proposal was presented as the National Electric Power Regulatory Authority (Nepra) opened hearings on a wide-ranging overhaul of power tariffs. For the first time, fixed charges will apply to both protected and non-protected domestic consumers, a move aimed at cutting cross-subsidies and lowering industrial electricity tariff by up to Rs4.04 per unit. The hearing was held on a petition filed by the Power Division and is chaired by Nepra Chairman Waseem Mukhtar. Officials from the Power Planning and Monitoring Company (PPMC) briefed the regulator on the new tariff structure. Under the plan, fixed charges will now apply to households consuming up to 300 units per month, including protected consumers. Previously, only non-protected users consuming more than 300 units paid fixed charges. For protected consumers, the government has proposed a fixed charge of Rs200 per month for those using up to 100 units and Rs300 for those using up to 200 units. As a result, subsidies for these two slabs have been reduced by Rs51 billion, bringing total subsidy support down to Rs423 billion.

## FCCP stays IHC proceedings in Dr Aafia Siddiqui case, halts contempt action

ISLAMABAD: The Federal Constitutional Court (FCC) on Wednesday stayed proceedings pending before the Islamabad High Court (IHC) in the Dr Aafia Siddiqui case, suspending the high court's scheduled hearings and effectively halting further action including the contempt of court proceedings. A three-member bench headed by Chief Justice of the Federal Constitutional Court Justice Amin-ud-Din Khan, and comprising Justice Ali Baqar Najafi and Justice Syed Arshad Hussain Shah, heard the matter. After taking up appeals filed by the federal government, the court restrained the IHC from proceeding further in the case, particularly with regard to potential contempt proceedings. In its appeals, the federal government challenged the IHC's interim orders as well as its contempt-related proceedings. The government also sought to set aside the May 16, 2025 order through which the high court had allowed an amendment to a petition in a matter that had been disposed of nearly a decade earlier. During the hearing before the FCC, Additional Attorney General Rashid Hafeez

represented the federal government, while Advocate Imran Shafiq appeared on behalf of Dr Fozia Siddiqui. The Federal Constitutional Court also issued notice to Dr Fozia Siddiqui and stated that at the next hearing it would examine the maintainability of the appeals and other legal questions involved. Dr Fozia Siddiqui had approached the IHC, contending that her sister, Dr Aafia Siddiqui – currently imprisoned in the United States – faces threats to her life, safety, and physical and mental health. The federal government, in its stance, argued that allowing the amendment amounted to judicial overreach and undermined the principle of finality in litigation. It maintained that reopening a matter disposed of many years ago was contrary to settled legal principles. The government further submitted that diplomatic efforts had already been undertaken in Dr Aafia Siddiqui's case. In October 2024, the prime minister wrote to the US president supporting a clemency appeal, following which a high-level official delegation was sent to the United States. Efforts were also made to explore bilateral and multilateral agreements on prisoner transfer; however, US authorities did not agree to any such arrangement.
