Pak says doing utmost to ease US-Iran tension

Renewed hostilities erupted on July 7, when Iran attacked commercial shipping in the Strait of Hormuz, including a Qatari liquefied natural gas tanker, accusing the US of violating the understanding. The attack prompted multiple waves of US strikes on Iranian military targets

ISLAMABAD: The Foreign Office (FO) said on Thursday that Pakistan was doing its "utmost" to bring the United States and Iran back to the negotiating table under the Islamabad memorandum of understanding (MoU) signed last month. Addressing a weekly press briefing, FO spokesperson Tahir Andrabi said Pakistan noted with concern that the security situation in the Middle East "remains precarious despite the relative calm of the past few days, which had kindled hopes that this positive development, this calm, would consolidate into a durable and fully respected ceasefire and pave the way for dialogue". Andrabi reiterated Pakistan's support for dialogue and diplomacy, maintaining that it remained the "only viable path forward". "We welcome all efforts aimed at sustaining cessation of hostilities and resumption of dialogue between Iran and the US," he said, adding that Pakistan remained engaged and will continue to do so. "Let me add that the negotiations between parties are ongoing to normalise the situation, particularly the situation in the Strait of Hormuz, as well as to de-escalate," he stated. He added that Pakistan was doing its "utmost" to bring the two parties back to the Islamabad MoU "so that all irritants can be removed in the light of the spirit of the agreement and the Pakistan-Qatar joint statement on June 22". Andrabi urged both the US and Iran to exercise "maximum restraint and fully adhere to their commitment to resume

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Kuwait says Iran strike hit Chinese firm

DUBAI: The Kuwaiti military said on Thursday that an Iranian strike north of the country hit a building belonging to a Chinese firm, killing a worker and causing significant damage to the structure. "Competent authorities immediately began taking the necessary measures and dealing with the situation upon the occurrence of the incident, in coordination with the relevant authorities," Maj. Gen. Saud Abdulaziz Al-Otaibi, spokesperson of the Defense Ministry, said in a statement. Kuwait, including other Gulf states and Jordan, have been hit by Iranian attacks targeting American assets over the past few weeks, in retaliation for US military operations. US military assets in Kuwait's Al-Adiri camp and Ali Al-Salem airbase were hit by the Iranians. Al-Otaibi added that Kuwait's armed forces were

MUZAFFARABAD: Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP) Chairman Bilawal Bhutto Zardari on Wednesday warned that the federal government's "countdown" would begin if elections in Azad Jammu and Kashmir (AJK) were rigged. Addressing a public rally in Muzaffarabad, the PPP chairman said the people's mandate must be decided through the ballot, not the bullet. He said that any theft of the public mandate must not be concealed. His remarks came days after the PML-N won nine seats while the PPP secured four of the 13 seats of the Azad Jammu and Kashmir Legislative Assembly elections in the Mirpur division. The PPP and PML-N – key allies in the Centre – exchanged heated words after the former accused the latter of rigging during the first phase of the AJK elections on July 27.

Pak repays \$1.4 billion Chinese loan

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan has repaid a \$1.4 billion Chinese commercial loan, but Chinese banks have not yet refinanced the amount, The News reported. The refinancing is expected to be provided to Islamabad after a few weeks, the report said, citing State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) Governor Jameel Ahmed. "We have undertaken foreign debt servicing of \$2.2 billion in July 2026, including \$1.4 billion of Chinese commercial loan and remaining \$800 million on account of other loans," Ahmed said while speaking to reporters outside Parliament House on Wednesday after attending a meeting of the Senate Standing Committee on Finance.

Saudi Arabia rolls over \$5 billion deposits with Pakistan for three years

SBP governor says rollover will help ease external-account pressure in current fiscal year

ISLAMABAD: Saudi Arabia has rolled over \$5 billion in deposits for three years, top officials confirmed on Wednesday. Finance Minister Muhammad Aurangzeb confirmed the development, while, according to The News, State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) Governor Jameel Ahmed also disclosed the same while speaking to reporters outside Parliament House. The rollover will help Pakistan reduce pressure on its external account as it manages foreign debt repayments in the current fiscal year, Ahmed said after attending the Senate Standing Committee on Finance. The SBP governor said Pakistan's foreign debt servicing had declined from \$26.5 billion in fiscal year 2024-25 to \$21.5 billion in the current fiscal year 2026-27, owing to various factors, including declining interest rates. 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US strikes Iran as widening war engulfs more countries

TEHRAN: The US carried out fresh strikes in Iran on Wednesday, the US military said, further intensifying a five-month-old war that was already expanding beyond its main fronts to embroil additional countries in the region. "US forces began launching strikes against Iran at 8:00pm ET today (local time)," US Central Command said in a statement. "The strikes are a powerful response to yesterday's attempted Iranian attacks on US forces based in the Middle East." Earlier on Wednesday, a drone hit a US-owned gas storage

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Bullet-ridden bodies of six labourers found

Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi strongly condemned the killing of the six labourers "by Fitna al-Hindustan terrorists" – a term the state uses to refer to groups it accuses of being sponsored by India to execute terrorist attacks on Pakistani soil

QUETTA: The bodies of six of seven labourers who were kidnapped earlier this week in the Turbat city of Balochistan's Kech district were found with bullet wounds on Thursday, an official told. On Tuesday, unidentified armed men had blocked Turbat-Mand Road in the Kalatak area of Kech district and taken away the seven labourers, who were travelling in a vehicle. The kidnappers had killed one of the labourers the same day and dumped his body on a highway. He said the kidnappers had taken the labourers to an undisclosed location, where one of them was killed shortly after the abduction and his body was dumped on the highway. They later also killed the six remaining labourers, whose bodies were found in Turbat's Nasirabad area, he added. Yousafzai said the bodies bore torture marks and bullet wounds, and it seemed that the labourers had been shot at close range.

Earlier this year, Senator Graham and his allies frequently traveled between Kyiv and Washington to demand maximum economic restrictions against Russia. Their proposals included imposing prohibitive tariffs—reaching up to 500%—on third-party nations purchasing Russian energy.

Pakistan needs more provinces; administrative system fully collapsed

ISLAMABAD: In a blunt and scathing assessment of the country's governance and economic trajectory, Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi declared that Pakistan's administrative system has completely collapsed, producing zero progress over the last 70 years. Speaking at the First Pakistan Investment Summit in Islamabad, Naqvi warned business leaders and policymakers that unless fundamental structural reforms are undertaken immediately, "even after 10 years, we will still be sitting here lamenting one another." Addressing a hall filled with the country's prominent corporate figures, Naqvi stated that the existing system is severely outdated and inherently incapable of delivering results. However, rather than laying blame solely on the political class, the minister turned the mirror on the commercial elite, holding them directly responsible for sustaining the status quo. "The business people sitting right here are, in fact, behind this rotten system," Naqvi remarked. "If you genuinely want to change this system, you have to stop funding politicians." He explained that donations from wealthy business figures fuel political parties during elections, enabling those same factions to capture power and perpetuate a broken apparatus. To break this cycle, Naqvi urged the business community to

halt political campaign funding and demand systemic accountability instead. Turning to economic survival, Naqvi stressed that Pakistan cannot continue running indefinitely on foreign loans. He called for urgent domestic resource generation and appealed for broad political unity, emphasizing that all political parties must set aside partisan divides and sit together to map out a structural path forward. Echoing these concerns, S.M. Tanvir, patron-in-chief of the United Business Group (UBG), identified major institutional fault lines hindering economic growth. Joining a unanimous call from various summit speakers, Tanvir highlighted the need for administrative restructuring, including the creation of new provinces and the emergence of fresh leadership. Speakers noted that Punjab's overwhelming administrative dominance as the largest province creates severe governance imbalances across the country. Summit speakers also painted a grim picture of Pakistan's social indicators, pointing out that over half the national population is currently living below the poverty line. With youth forming the majority of the population yet remaining largely unemployed, participants criticized temporary government handouts, asserting that laptops and micro-loans are not sustainable solutions for national development. Instead, the summit called for directly engaging

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Crackdown on illegal LPG refilling stations intensified

DERA ISMAIL KHAN, : The district administration has intensified its crackdown against illegal Liquefied Petroleum Gas (LPG) refilling in public transport vehicles, with several LPG refilling stations sealed. The joint operation led by Assistant Commissioner Dr. Muhammad Hamid Siddiq was carried out by monitoring teams of the Regional Transport Authority (RTA) in collaboration with the Industrial Development Officer (IDO) at various locations across the tehsil. According to the administration, during the inspection, authorities found multiple LPG refilling stations illegally refilling Public Service Vehicles (PSVs) using LPG cylinders. The stations were sealed on the spot, while legal proceedings were initiated against those responsible. Speaking on the occasion, Assistant Commissioner Dr. Muhammad Hamid Siddiq said that filling LPG in public service vehicles through cylinders or carrying out unauthorized refilling was illegal, highly dangerous, and poses a serious threat to human lives. He warned that the district administration would adopt a zero-tolerance policy against such violations. He further directed LPG station owners and transport operators to strictly comply with government regulations and safety standards, warning that violators would face sealing of stations, heavy fines, and legal action. —APP

KP okays road projects to promote sustainable tourism

The Khyber Pakhtunkhwa government has approved 17 tourism road projects aimed at improving access to major tourist destinations and promoting sustainable tourism across the province. Special Assistant to the Chief Minister for Tourism, Malik Adeel Iqbal, said the projects were approved by Chief Minister Muhammad Sohail Khan Afridi as part of the provincial government's efforts to strengthen tourism as a key driver of economic growth and local development. Under the plan, around Rs.5 billion will be invested in the construction and rehabilitation of 91.5 kilometers of roads linking major tourist destinations in Upper Chitral, Swat, Upper Dir and Lower Dir. The improved road network is expected to facilitate easier access for domestic and international tourists, enhance connectivity to scenic valleys, and improve travel infrastructure across the region. He said that said the projects would also promote local businesses, hotels, restaurants and transport services, create new employment and investment opportunities, and contribute to the socio-economic development of the province by expanding the tourism sector. —APP

NHMP foils arms smuggling bid on M-5, held two suspects

ISLAMABAD: The National Highways and Motorway Police (NHMP) on Thursday foiled an attempt to smuggle a large cache of weapons on the M-5 Motorway near Rohri and arrested two suspects. According to the NHMP spokesperson, Motorway Police officials signalled a speeding suspicious car to stop, but the occupants ignored clear instructions at three different locations and attempted to flee.

The spokesperson said NHMP personnel pursued the vehicle with professional skill and intercepted it near Rohri. NHMP foils arms smuggling bid on M-5 Motorway, arrests two suspects. During the search, officials recovered 14 submachine guns (SMGs), one shotgun, 23 pistols, over 18,000 rounds of ammunition of various calibres, 89 additional magazines, four telescopic sights and five mo-

bile phones from the vehicle. The suspects, identified as Ubaid Ullah, a resident of Peshawar, and Abdullah, a resident of Kohat, were allegedly transporting the consignment of weapons from Peshawar to interior Sindh. The arrested suspects, along with the recovered weapons, ammunition and vehicle, were handed over to the relevant district police for further legal proceedings, the spokesperson added. —DNA

Pol pricing body moves to phased deregulation of oil sector

The Minister emphasized that deregulation of the petroleum sector should be undertaken through a clear and measurable roadmap, with specific benchmarks and milestones identified to assess progress towards the intended objectives

ISLAMABAD: Fifth meeting of the Committee constituted by the Prime Minister to review the petroleum pricing mechanism was held under the chairmanship of Federal Minister for Petroleum Ali Pervaiz Malik. The sub-committees constituted by the main committee presented their findings and recommendations on various aspects of the petroleum pricing mechanism. KPMG also presented its report comparing petroleum pricing and taxation structures in the region. Members of the Committee appreciated the daily pricing formula and the steps taken to enhance transparency

as well as reduce volatility in the new petroleum pricing mechanism. The Minister emphasized that deregulation of the petroleum sector should be undertaken through a clear and measurable roadmap, with specific benchmarks and milestones identified to assess progress towards the intended objectives. The Committee was briefed that the dashboard on the Oil and Gas Regulatory Authority (OGRA) website is now operational and provides information on daily petroleum product prices, the applicable pricing formula and relevant Platts data, enhancing transparency and public access to pricing information. The meeting also reviewed the potential impact of strategic petrole-

um reserves and a proposed price stabilization fund on the pricing mechanism, including their role in mitigating market volatility and ensuring stability of petroleum supplies and prices.

The Minister said that Oil Marketing Companies (OMCs) should be made responsible for ensuring end-to-end digitization of the petroleum supply chain to improve transparency, traceability, efficiency and accountability across the system. The meeting further deliberated on the moratorium on the establishment of new OMCs and its implications for competition, investment and market structure. It was resolved that IFEM pool also needs a wholesome review. The issue of windfall

tax was also discussed. It was decided that the Finance Division, in consultation with the Federal Board of Revenue (FBR) and Petroleum Division, would present a report to the Committee on the matter in next meeting. It was decided that the Committee will continue to deliberate on the recommendations of the sub-committees and formulate a comprehensive roadmap for reforms in the petroleum sector with a view to promote transparency, competition, efficiency and consumer protection. The meeting was attended by National Coordinator NCMC, Lt General Zafar Iqbal, Minister of state for Finance Bilal Azhar Kiyani and other members of the committee.

CAREC consultation to boost regional digital connectivity

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan hosted the two-day CAREC Digital Corridor Consultation on July 29 and 30, bringing together senior officials, telecommunications operators, regulators, development partners and technical experts from nine CAREC member countries to discuss regional digital connectivity and digital infrastructure. The consultation was organised by the Asian Development Bank (ADB) in collaboration with the Ministry of Information Technology and Telecommunication (MoITT) and the Economic Affairs Division (EAD). Federal Minister for Information Technology and Telecommunication Shaza Fatima Khawaja attended the meeting and reaffirmed Pakistan's commitment to promoting regional digital connectivity and digital transformation. She stressed the need to strengthen digital infrastructure and regional cooperation

to create new opportunities for economic growth, innovation and private sector investment across the CAREC region. The consultation opened with remarks by Asad Al-eem, Regional Head of the Central and West Asia Department at the Asian Development Bank, who described the CAREC Digital Corridor as a strategic initiative to improve regional integration through stronger digital infrastructure, policy co-ordination and cross-border connectivity. During the meeting, Deloitte presented the preliminary findings of the CAREC Digital Corridor Feasibility Study, focusing on four key areas: connectivity infrastructure, digital computing and data centres, internet exchange points, and the regulatory environment. Delegates reviewed the findings and discussed cross-border connectivity, data centres, cybersecurity, data governance, regulatory

harmonisation and measures to encourage private sector investment. They also examined a proposed investment roadmap, including priority regional digital infrastructure projects, phased implementation plans and financing options through public-private partnerships. The participating countries agreed to submit written comments on the draft feasibility study over the next two weeks. The feedback will be incorporated into the final report, which will be presented at the 25th CAREC Ministerial Conference in September 2026. In her closing remarks, ADB Country Director Emma Fan thanked the participating delegations for their contributions and emphasised the need for continued cooperation among CAREC member countries to turn the Digital Corridor initiative into concrete regional investment projects.—DNA

ISLAMABAD: The Benazir Income Support Programme (BISP) Thursday strongly condemned attempts by certain elements to undermine its reputation for narrow personal or political interests, warning that legal action under the Prevention of Electronic Crimes Act (PECA) could be initiated against those making baseless allegations or using the programme for political point scoring. A BISP spokesperson said the programme is Pakistan's largest national social protection initiative and is widely recognised at both national and international levels as a successful model of transparency, efficient service delivery and timely financial assistance to deserving households. The spokesperson said delegations and development partners from around the world regularly visit Pakistan to study BISP's

operational model and successful practices, reflecting the programme's global recognition. Expressing concern over recent attempts to damage the institution's reputation, the spokesperson said millions of deserving women and families benefit from BISP and that targeting the programme through false allegations or political motives is unacceptable. The spokesperson added that BISP reserves the right to initiate legal proceedings under the PECA Act, wherever applicable, against those involved in spreading baseless claims. The spokesperson said BISP operates under the highest standards of transparency and accountability, with its financial and administrative affairs subject to regular audits, robust monitoring mechanisms and oversight by international development

partners, ensuring the credibility and integrity of its systems. The spokesperson said President Asif Ali Zardari and Prime Minister Muhammad Shehbaz Sharif have full confidence in the programme's transparent and effective service delivery mechanism. The use of BISP's beneficiary database during the Ramadan Relief Package, the COVID-19 emergency and flood relief operations, the spokesperson said, reflects the government's confidence in the programme. ERC reviews monsoon crisis

ISLAMABAD: The Emergency Response Committee (ERC) on Thursday held its seventh session at the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA) headquarters to review the flood situation, rescue operations, relief efforts and preparedness measures across Pakistan, with federal and provincial authorities pledging stronger coordination to deal with emerging challenges. The meeting, held on the directions of Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif, was chaired via video link by Federal Minister for Planning, Development and Special Initiatives Prof Ahsan Iqbal. Federal Minister for Power Sardar Awais Ahmad Khan Leghari attended the session at the National Emergencies Operations Centre (NEOC), while Federal Minister for Climate Change and Environmental Coordination Dr Musadik Malik, Federal Minister for National Food Security and Research Rana Tanveer Hussain, Federal Minister for Water Resources Mian Muhammad Mueen Wattoo, Punjab Health and Emergency Services Minister Khawaja Salman Rafique, chief secretaries of provinces and regions, Chairman NDMA and senior officials joined physically and virtually. According to officials, the committee reviewed the overall monsoon situation, including recent incidents, human casualties, infrastructure damage, rescue activities, relief operations and rehabilitation efforts in affected areas. The NEOC also briefed participants on the latest hydrological conditions, river flows and potential weather related hazards that could affect vulnerable regions in the coming days. The committee assessed response measures taken by federal ministries, provincial governments and district administrations and acknowledged the efforts of rescue agencies and local authorities in protecting communities, restoring essential services and providing assistance to affected populations. Participants stressed the need for seamless coordination among all stakeholders to ensure a swift and effective response to any worsening weather situation. Prof Ahsan Iqbal directed all relevant departments to maintain operational readiness, strengthen inter agency coordination, continue proactive preparedness measures and accelerate relief and rehabilitation work in areas impacted by heavy rains and flooding.

FIA urges public to verify visa agents

ISLAMABAD: The Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) Islamabad Zone on Thursday urged citizens to verify the credentials of visa agents before making any payments or travelling abroad, reiterating its commitment to combating human trafficking on the World Day Against Trafficking in Persons. An FIA official told APP, on the directions of the Director FIA Islamabad Zone, Deputy Director Anti-Human Trafficking Circle (AHTC) Islamabad Tariq Masood recorded a special video message to raise public awareness about the dangers of human trafficking and fraudulent overseas employment schemes. In his message, Tariq Masood advised people intending to travel abroad for employment or education not to trust unregistered or illegal visa agents. He urged them to verify the agent's registration and the authenticity of their visa before making any advance payment. He said human trafficking was a serious crime that not only deprived people of their hard-earned money but also put their lives at risk. He added that the FIA Anti-Human Trafficking Circle Islamabad was continuing its crackdown against human traffickers and would pursue such networks without discrimination. The official urged citizens to immediately report any suspicious visa agent or human trafficking-related activity to the FIA so that prompt legal action could be taken. He also highlighted the campaign's key message: "Verify Before You Travel.—APP

ISLAMABAD: The Institute of Regional Studies (IRS) organized a roundtable discussion titled 'India: From Strategic Relevance to Irrelevance?' bringing together former diplomats, military experts, and scholars to examine evolving regional and global strategic dynamics, particularly in the wake of developments in South Asia during 2025. Opening the session, President IRS Ambassador Jauhar Saleem observed that Pakistan is increasingly being perceived internationally as a responsible and peace-oriented state. He argued that changes in the United States' strategic approach towards India since May 2025 have created new opportunities for Pakistan to strengthen its strategic, political, and economic standing. He emphasized that Pakistan's strategic relevance should be viewed independently of India and leveraged through internal consolidation and prudent policymaking. Former envoy to US, China and India, Ambassador Ashraf Jahangir Qazi discussed India's defence relationship with the United States and argued that New Delhi's international in-

fluence has diminished following what he described as setbacks during Operation Sindoor. He maintained that India has also lost ground in shaping China's strategic calculus and is increasingly viewed as a source of regional instability. Ambassador Qazi suggested that India lacks support from Washington for any future military escalation and asserted that Pakistan's technological capabilities have been strengthened through cooperation with China. He also proposed that, given the limited utility of Chabahar Port, regional connectivity initiatives should instead focus on Gwadar. Former Foreign Secretary Ambassador Aizaz Ahmad Chaudhry cautioned that India's current decline in strategic relevance may be temporary rather than permanent. He attributed the shift primarily to changes in US strategic priorities under President Donald Trump, including a more constructive US-China approach, as well as growing regional discontent with New Delhi. Ambassador Chaudhry further argued that India has gradually lost its traditional leadership position in the Global South to China. Reflecting on the May 2025 crisis, he observed that Pakistan's response demonstrated how technological advances have

fundamentally transformed the character of asymmetric warfare. General (Retd.) Naeem Khalid Lodhi stressed that regardless of international perceptions, India will continue to remain strategically significant for Pakistan. He argued that India is already pursuing what he termed "Sindoor 2.0" through proxy actors and non-state elements operating against Pakistan. He maintained that the United States is unlikely to distance itself completely from India and recommended that Pakistan seek greater Chinese involvement on key issues such as Jammu and Kashmir and the Indus Waters Treaty. He also emphasized the importance of keeping diplomatic channels with India open through sustained efforts towards dialogue. Professor Mujeeb Afzal argued that India's strategic importance has been overstated by sections of the US media and Indian policymakers. He contended that expectations of India as an emerging great power have not been matched by its performance, exposing limitations in its strategic capabilities. According to Dr. Afzal, India's importance to the United States has largely depended on Washington's perception of China as a strategic competitor. He further observed that India's foreign policy has his-

torically displayed resistance to external influence, accompanied by strong strategic assertiveness. While describing India as a significant regional power, he argued that it has often been reluctant to assume broader regional responsibilities. Dr. Khurram Iqbal discussed what he described as a significant shift in US strategic thinking, arguing that Washington's emphasis has moved towards reinforcing its own centrality in the Pacific rather than India's role in the Indo-Pacific. He suggested that questions surrounding India's military credibility following Operation Sindoor, together with policy differences with Washington—including India's reluctance to acknowledge President Trump's role in the May 2025 ceasefire and perceived inconsistencies in its position on the Russia-Ukraine conflict—have contributed to a decline in India's credibility as a strategic partner. The discussion concluded that changing geopolitical realities are reshaping strategic alignments in South Asia and beyond. Participants emphasized the importance of Pakistan pursuing a balanced foreign policy, strengthening its domestic capacities, enhancing regional connectivity, and remaining prepared to capitalize on emerging strategic opportunities while maintaining diplomatic engagement with neighbouring countries.

Petroleum imports up by 5.76% to \$16.862 b

ISLAMABAD: The imports of the overall petroleum group witnessed an increase of 5.76 percent during the fiscal year (2025-26) as compared to the previous year, the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics (PBS) reported. The total imports of the petroleum group during July-June (2025-26) stood at \$ 16,862.742 million against the imports of \$ 15,943.726 million during the same months of last year. Among petroleum commodities, the import of petroleum products increased by 7.05 percent, from \$ 5,966.060 million last year to \$ 6,386.458 million during the period under review year. Likewise, the imports of Petroleum Crude increased by 31.58 percent from \$ 5,446.205 million last year to \$ 7,165.937 million while the import of Liquefied Petroleum Gas (LPG) went up by 3.21 percent during the period under review and stood at \$ 1,088.778 million as compared to \$ 1,054.937 million in the corresponding period in 2024-25. On the other hand, the import of Liquefied Natural Gas (LNG) decreased by 36.10 percent from \$ 3,476.159 million to \$ 2,221.183 million. The imports of all other petroleum group products went up by 5.88 percent and were recorded at \$0.386 million as against \$0.365 million.—APP

Sherry condemns Hangu terror attack

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP) Vice President Senator Sherry Rehman on Thursday strongly condemned the terrorist attack on a police check post in Hangu, paying glowing tribute to the police personnel who embraced martyrdom while courageously defending the country. In a statement, she said that DSP City Diyar Khan and nine other personnel, who laid down their lives while bravely confronting the terrorists, were the pride of the nation and a shining example of courage, sacrifice and dedication to duty. She said the terrorists would never succeed in their nefarious designs, adding that security forces and the brave people of the country stood united in the fight against terrorism and were prepared to make every sacrifice to eradicate the menace. Sherry Rehman expressed confidence that the day was not far when Pakistan would completely overcome the scourge of terrorism through the collective resolve.—APP

Govt to diversify products: Ahsan

ISLAMABAD: Federal Minister for Planning, Development and Special Initiatives Professor Ahsan Iqbal on Thursday said the government was pursuing robust diversification of Pakistan's product and market portfolios to achieve sustainable economic growth of at least six per cent. He stressed that expanding exports through new products and destinations was critical to securing long-term economic independence. Addressing a media briefing on the Monthly Development Report, the minister said the government was working closely with industry and the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP) to transform the country's top 20 export clusters into globally competitive sectors while promoting non-traditional industries, including engineering, light engineering, chemicals and advanced manufacturing. "Our destination is not only stabilisation but sustainable growth of at least six per cent. That growth has to be export-led; otherwise it will become another economic bubble that bursts within a few years," Ahsan said. He said the government had set a target of increasing Pakistan's exports to \$100 billion by 2035, adding that the existing export structure was inadequate to achieve this objective. "We have to diversify both our product portfolio and our export markets. Pakistan is still exporting many of the same products to the same destinations as it did 40 years ago. This model is no longer sufficient for a competitive global economy," he remarked. The minister said the government, in collaboration with the SBP and the private sector, was offering incentives to promote non-traditional export sectors, including engineering, light engineering, chemicals and advanced manufacturing, to broaden the country's export base. He said the strategy also aimed to transform Pakistan's top 20 export clusters into globally competitive industries capable of generating higher-value exports and strengthening the external sector. Ahsan acknowledged that merchandise exports during the last fiscal year were affected by disruptions in regional shipping routes, higher insurance costs and logistical challenges arising from the Iran-US conflict. However, exports of goods and services still recorded overall growth despite these external shocks. He said workers' remittances reached a record \$41.6 billion, up 8.6 per cent over the previous year, helping maintain external sector stability despite geopolitical uncertainties in the Gulf region.—DNA

World Day against trafficking in persons – 2026

ISLAMABAD : Every year on 30th July, the world observes the World Day against Trafficking in Persons to raise awareness of the plight of trafficking victims and to strengthen global efforts to protect and support them. This year's theme, "Trapped Behind the Scam", draws attention to the growing threat of trafficking in persons for the forced criminality, where criminal networks exploit vulnerable individuals by deceiving, coercing, and forcing them to commit crimes, including online scam operations and other cyber-enabled criminal activities that generate significant illicit profits for organized crime groups. To mark the day, representatives from federal

ministries, government departments, law enforcement and criminal justice institutions, the development sector, civil society organizations, and the diplomatic community gathered in Islamabad in a joint commemoration organized by the Federal Investigation Agency (FIA), United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC), International Organization for Migration (IOM), United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), International Labour Organization (ILO), Sustainable Social Development Organization (SSDO), International Centre for Migration Policy Development (ICMPD), and International Returns and Reintegration Assistance (IRARA). Messages delivered by representatives of the organizations underscored the importance of collective action to strengthen criminal justice responses, advance prevention efforts, and ensure comprehensive victim protection, assistance, and reintegration support. Senior officials from the Ministry of Overseas Pakistanis and Human Resource Development, and the Federal Investigation Agency highlighted Pakistan's ongoing efforts to strengthen its response to trafficking in persons and smuggling of migrants, while promoting safe, orderly, and regular migration. Key national initiatives highlighted included the National Emigration and Welfare Policy, developed under the leadership of Ministry of Overseas Pakistanis and Human Resource Development, as well as Pakistan's first dedicated five-year National Action Plan to Counter Trafficking in Persons (2026-2030) and National Action Plan to Counter Smuggling of Migrants (2026-2030).

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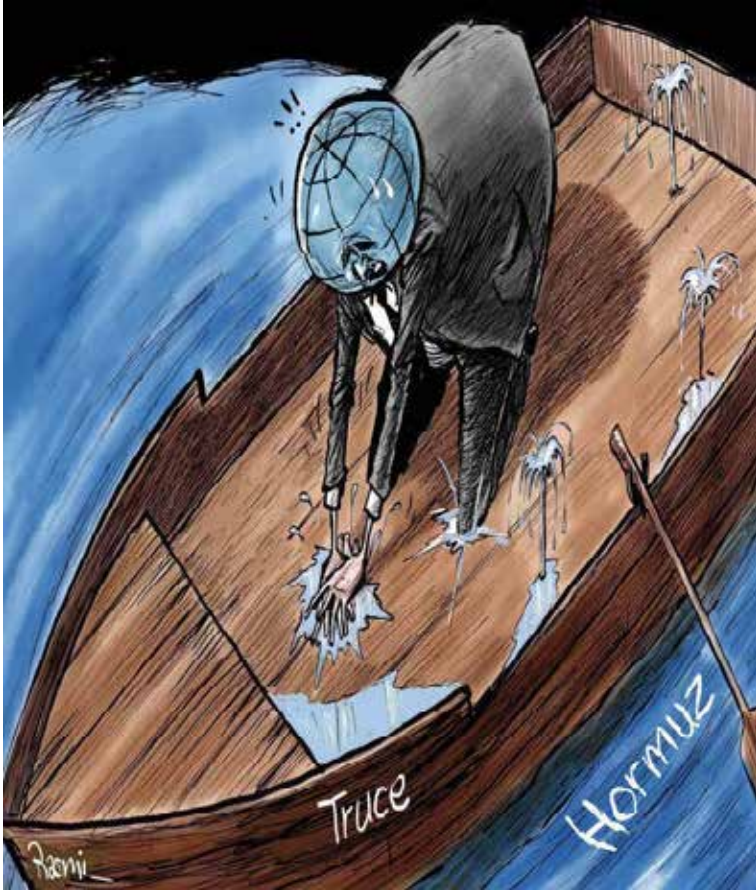

advisory, and protective roles—often numbering over 10,000 at peaks, including during the 1990-91 Gulf War. This sacred duty reflects not mere strategy but a religious obligation deeply felt by the nation. Adversaries, notably neighbouring India, seized every opportunity to portray Pakistan as a failing state. Yet at moments of trial, unseen help arrived. In May 2025, Pakistan demonstrated military prowess that astonished observers, restoring its lost prestige through resolute leadership that honoured the divine trust placed upon it. A landmark Strategic Mutual Defence Agreement with Saudi Arabia, signed on 17 September 2025 in Riyadh by Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif and Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, formalised decades of brotherhood. The day is not distant when an alliance of Islamic countries, forged through mutual respect and shared values, may emerge—bearing precedents in the European Union or NATO yet rooted firmly in Islamic principles of solidarity. Such a framework would face formidable obstacles: historical differences, external influences, and economic disparities. Yet with the spirit that carried Pakistan through partition, the 1971 trials, and recent triumphs, it remains achievable. Pakistan, with its strategic location, military capability, and diplomatic bridges—linking South Asia, the Gulf, and beyond—can serve as a pivotal node in this vision. It continues to champion economic cooperation within the OIC, advocate for peace with justice on issues like Palestine and Kashmir, and promote connectivity that benefits the wider ummah. Pakistan's journey, from ideological birth to its current resurgence, exemplifies faith sustained against the odds. As it advances, the nation carries not only the aspirations of its 250 million people but the hopes of many who see in its endurance a beacon for the Muslim world. With trust in Allah, unity among its ranks, and steadfast resolve, Pakistan is poised to fulfil a greater role in fostering stability, prosperity, and brotherhood across Islamic lands. The future beckons with challenge and opportunity alike; guided by its founding principles, the nation shall meet both with honour.

Iran's Nuclear Capability, Retaliation and Global Catastrophe

THE potential for nuclear escalation represents the most terrifying dimension of the Iran war. The Trump administration's framing of the Pickaxe mountain facility as a potential existential threat to the United States and the global community is deeply concerning. This facility is so strong, so formidable, and so meticulously designed that normal conventional weapons are unable to reach its core. The durability of Pickaxe to conventional interdiction has led to discussions in media, in podcasts and in political parlance about the potential use of nuclear weapons as perhaps the only solution to prevent Iran from assuming the status of a nuclear power. There are troubling indications that Donald Trump has already considered the use of nuclear weapons, with reports suggesting he has approached the Pentagon at least once, perhaps twice, to draw up nuclear strike options against Iran. The Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff has rejected these requests, citing fundamental unconstitutionality. However, the danger lies in the potential use of intelligence information to manufacture a threat that would be adaptable to US doctrine. The nuclear posture review and the commander's guidance to the nuclear implementation plan have already created a definition that permits the United States to use nuclear weapons if an existential threat is identified. If the United States determines that Iran is installing a viable centrifuge capability or has installed a nuclear warhead assembly plant, the cognitive justification for nuclear use becomes dangerously plausible. The potential for a nuclear strike on the Pickaxe facility would have catastrophic consequences. While Iran might survive a nuclear attack if it does not fall on most of its cities, the Iranian counterattack would likely eliminate Israel, a small country that cannot survive even a small or middle-level nuclear warhead. Furthermore, Iran has declared it possesses fissile material to produce 10 to 15 atomic warheads, along with sophisticated delivery mechanisms. Iran has made it clear that it possesses the fissile material necessary to produce nuclear weapons and has the delivery mechanisms already available in a very sophisticated form. The war has fundamentally altered the nuclear calculus. With the killing of the previous Supreme Leader, US intelligence agencies now assess that his successor is far more interested in pursuing a nuclear weapon. This shift represents a grave consequence of the US policy of regime change. Iran's leadership likely views the acquisition of nuclear capability as the ultimate deterrent against the existential threat posed by Washington and Israel.

The retaliatory potential extends beyond the immediate region. While Iran's delivery systems may not currently be able to reach the United States directly, such weapons could be transported through cargo ships and launched when they approach American shores. This possibility is logically, militarily, and otherwise plausible. The threat of retaliation would likely cause the United States and Israel to think hundreds of times before making such a decision, but the Trump administration's pumped-up ego and hubristic attitude may lead it to continue pursuing domination on the battlefield regardless of the consequences. Secondly, Iran's ability to shut down the Strait of Hormuz represents the most potent economic weapon at its disposal. The impact would extend far beyond those countries that import oil to include those that import fertilizers and food. Without fertilizer, the production of grain and food will be diminished to a large extent, creating starvation in many countries of the world. Both the shortage of oil, which runs the economy, and the shortage of fertilizer, which keeps the population alive, would affect billions of people. The resultant immigration pressure on Europe and other countries would be catastrophic. Millions of people would die, and those who are not admitted by European countries and other nations would perish in the sea or on the land. This catastrophic scenario has a great possibility if the issue is not resolved amicably. The expansion of the conflict to the Red Sea, where Iran's Houthi allies in Yemen have declared a naval blockade against Saudi Arabia, threatens to close a second major global shipping route, exacerbating the disruption of essential commodities. Europe, by remaining deaf, dumb, and blind to the crimes being committed by the United States, faces a future of unimaginable suffering. When Africa goes under, when the Sahel and West Africa lose the capacity to produce food, tens of millions of people will begin a forced migration because they have no choice. They will lose tens of millions in the deserts of the Sahara, but they will arrive at the shores of the Maghreb, of North Africa, and they will surge into Europe. The Iranian population, when they lose the capacity to produce food, will move through Turkey into Europe. Turkey will give them the sign to keep going, and Europe will be literally overrun by desperate refugees that will suck Europe dry. This is the future of Europe because of the policies of Donald Trump. The potential for billions of people to die represents the future of humanity because of the catastrophe that is about to unfold. Once this process begins, once the infrastructure of life support deteriorates, it cannot be readily reconstituted.

The world will be losing so much of its energy and resources responding to these global catastrophes that it will not be able to put the effort into reconstitution. Humanity is being condemned to an absolute decade or more of catastrophe. The responsibility for this war and its repercussions rests entirely with both Israel and the United States. They are the ones who should bear the burden of putting back the clock and turning the world once again to a normal situation. If the United States decides to use nuclear weapons, the world might see a total catastrophic situation that must be avoided by all countries putting their heads together in unity to stop this war as soon as possible, ensuring that humanity is not eliminated from the face of the earth. The international community must recognize that the conflict has reached a point where Iran has refused to succumb and the United States is bent on making Iran surrender. In both these situations, the only weaponry system the United States has now which can change the war scenario is the nuclear weapon. But if Iran also surprises both Israel and the United States as it has done in conventional warfare while starting nuclear warfare, then the world might see a total catastrophic situation. The potential for nuclear escalation, the disruption of global energy supplies, the threat of mass starvation, and the prospect of millions of refugees overwhelming Europe represent a catastrophic scenario that the world must recognize and address. The cycle of violence appears destined to continue, with Iran having learned to manage the conflict and the United States lacking a clear path to victory. The world needs to start shouting. The crimes being committed by the United States must be exposed, and the international community must demand an end to this insane policy. Donald Trump's decisions are condemning humanity to catastrophe, and every European leader who remains silent shares the responsibility for what is to come. The time for action is now. The world must put its head together in unity to stop this war as soon as possible, ensuring that humanity is not eliminated from the face of the earth. The alternative is unthinkable: a future of starvation, migration, and death on a scale never before witnessed in human history. This is not hyperbole; this is the reality of the moment, and it must be confronted with the urgency it demands.

History Still Carries a Warning

EVERY cycle of violence in Balochistan revives an old and uncomfortable question in Pakistan's political discourse: could the province become another East Pakistan? The comparison has gained renewed attention following the sharp escalation in militant attacks during the past two years. Coordinated assaults on security installations, expanding insurgent activity, and the persistence of political discontent have encouraged many observers to revisit the lessons of 1971. While the comparison is understandable, it is also incomplete. History seldom repeats itself in identical form. Yet it often offers warnings that states ignore at their own peril. The insurgency in Balochistan is not a recent development. It has accompanied Pakistan's political journey almost since independence. From the first rebellion in 1948 to successive waves of unrest, the province has remained trapped in a cycle of confrontation between the state and sections of Baloch nationalist groups.

The latest resurgence, however, appears more organised, technologically adept, and geographically dispersed than many earlier phases. Militant organisations have demonstrated an ability to strike military convoys, infrastructure projects, and even strategic coastal areas, presenting fresh challenges to Pakistan's internal security. It is this deteriorating security environment that has prompted renewed references to East Pakistan. At first glance, the similarities appear striking. In both cases, many citizens believed that their province contributed significantly to the national economy while receiving comparatively little in return. Before 1971, East Pakistan generated most of Pakistan's export earnings through jute, yet many Bengalis argued that development spending and political power remained concentrated

in West Pakistan. In Balochistan, similar arguments revolve around natural gas, mineral wealth, Gwadar Port, and the strategic projects associated with the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC). Despite possessing enormous natural resources, Balochistan continues to record poor indicators in education, healthcare, employment, and infrastructure. Such disparities have strengthened the perception that resource extraction has not translated into proportional local development. Whether every element of this perception is statistically accurate is open to debate, but perceptions themselves often shape political realities. Throughout history, feelings of exclusion have proved just as influential as measurable economic indicators. Identity politics has further deepened these grievances. East Pakistan's language movement became the defining symbol of Bengali political consciousness after the refusal to grant Bengali equal national status alongside Urdu.

In Balochistan, the issues differ in form but not entirely in substance. Questions surrounding cultural recognition, provincial autonomy, missing persons, political representation, and the space available for nationalist politics continue to dominate public debate. Over decades, distrust has accumulated, making compromise increasingly difficult. Security has consequently become the principal instrument of state policy. Pakistan's armed forces have undertaken repeated counter-insurgency campaigns aimed at dismantling militant organisations and restoring order. Many attacks have been successfully prevented, while numerous militant commanders have been eliminated. Yet military success has not translated into lasting political stability. Insurgencies rarely disappear through force alone when underlying political disputes remain unresolved. This lesson has emerged repeatedly across different regions of the world. It is here that memories of 1971 naturally arise. Pakistan's tragic experience in East Pakistan demonstrated that military operations, when detached from meaningful political engagement, may suppress violence temporarily without resolving the grievances that sustain it. That historical lesson deserves careful reflection not because Balochistan is destined to follow the same path, but because unresolved political conflicts tend to grow more complex over time. However, the similarities should not obscure the profound differences between the two cases.

The most decisive distinction lies in demography. Before Bangladesh's independence, Bengalis constituted the majority of Pakistan's population. The Awami League secured an undisputed electoral mandate in the 1970 general elections, giving Sheikh Mujibur Rahman constitutional legitimacy to form the federal government. The subsequent

refusal to transfer power transformed a political dispute into a national catastrophe. No comparable circumstance exists in contemporary Pakistan. Balochistan occupies almost half of the country's landmass but accounts for only a small proportion of its population. Its political influence within the federation cannot be translated into an electoral majority capable of reshaping national politics through parliamentary means. Consequently, the constitutional dynamics that precipitated the crisis of 1971 simply do not exist today. Geography also tells a different story. East Pakistan was physically separated from West Pakistan by more than a thousand miles of Indian territory, making military reinforcement extraordinarily difficult once war began. Balochistan, by contrast, remains fully connected to Pakistan's transportation and communication network. Highways, railways, and military logistics provide Islamabad with strategic access that was impossible in 1971. External conditions are equally different. Bangladesh's emergence as an independent state cannot be understood without acknowledging India's decisive military intervention. New Delhi provided extensive military, diplomatic, and logistical support to the Mukti Bahini before entering the conflict directly in December 1971. That intervention fundamentally altered the balance of power. Today's international environment offers no comparable scenario. Although Pakistan frequently accuses hostile external actors of supporting separatist violence, no neighbouring state has openly committed military forces or provided internationally acknowledged support on the scale witnessed during the Bangladesh Liberation War.

At the same time, China's substantial investments in Gwadar and CPEC create powerful incentives for regional stability rather than fragmentation. Beijing's strategic interests rest on a secure and economically integrated Balochistan. International politics itself has also changed dramatically. The Cold War environment, which shaped global alignments during 1971, has disappeared. Contemporary international diplomacy places considerably greater emphasis on territorial integrity and state sovereignty. Secessionist movements now face far higher diplomatic barriers to achieving international recognition than they did during the era of decolonisation. Another major distinction concerns political organisation. Bangladesh's independence movement possessed an elected political leadership, administrative structures, international diplomatic outreach, and broad popular mobilisation under a unified command. The Baloch insurgency, despite its persistence, remains divided among multiple organisations with differing strategies and objectives. Fragmentation has limited its political

coherence and prevented the emergence of a unified alternative governing authority. These differences make one conclusion unavoidable: Balochistan is not another East Pakistan, and predictions of an inevitable repetition of 1971 oversimplify Pakistan's contemporary realities. Yet rejecting the analogy should not become an excuse for complacency. A province need not secede to become a long-term strategic liability. Persistent insurgency can gradually weaken economic confidence, discourage foreign investment, delay infrastructure projects, and impose heavy financial and human costs on the state. CPEC, Gwadar Port, and the development of Pakistan's western regions all depend upon durable security combined with local political confidence. Neither objective can be achieved in isolation. This requires moving beyond a policy framework dominated exclusively by security considerations. Effective governance in conflict-affected regions demands credible political dialogue, accountable provincial institutions, transparent resource-sharing mechanisms, and visible improvements in public services. Development projects cannot succeed if local communities perceive themselves merely as spectators rather than beneficiaries. Equally important is rebuilding trust between the federation and the province. Trust cannot be restored through announcements alone. It grows through consistent implementation of constitutional commitments, meaningful participation in decision-making, fair economic opportunities, and confidence that grievances will receive institutional rather than coercive responses. Pakistan's federal structure already provides mechanisms for greater provincial participation.

The challenge lies less in constitutional design than in political execution. Genuine implementation of existing commitments may achieve far more than the repeated introduction of ambitious packages that fail to reach the communities they are intended to serve. The lesson of 1971 is therefore neither prophecy nor prediction. It is a reminder that national cohesion ultimately rests upon political legitimacy as much as military capability. States remain strongest when citizens believe they possess an equal stake in their collective future. Balochistan's future will not be determined solely by insurgent violence or security operations. It will be shaped by whether Pakistan succeeds in narrowing the distance between the federation and its largest province—politically, economically, and psychologically. The country possesses the opportunity to prevent history from becoming a recurring warning. Whether that opportunity is seized will influence not only the future of Balochistan but also the long-term stability of the Pakistani federation itself.

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technical-level talks” in line with the Islamabad MoU and the Pakistan-Qatar joint statement. The MoU between the US and Iran was signed on June 18 after weeks of intensive diplomacy. It was aimed at reopening the Strait of Hormuz and ending the Middle East conflict – which began with US-Israeli strikes on Iran in February – after a further 60 days of negotiations. However, renewed hostilities erupted on July 7, when Iran attacked commercial shipping in the Strait of Hormuz, including a Qatari liquefied natural gas tanker, accusing the US of violating the understanding. The attack prompted multiple waves of US strikes on Iranian military targets. The conflict has intensified with the Houthis rebels in Yemen imposing a naval blockade on Saudi Arabia, extending the war to a second major shipping chokepoint. On Wednesday, the war spread across new fronts as explosions hit a natural gas loading port in Egypt and a US-owned floating storage tanker was reportedly struck by a drone, while the US and Saudi Arabia carried out joint strikes on Iran-backed paramilitary groups in Iraq in retaliation for attacks on US troops and Saudi oil targets.

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According to him, four of the deceased were from Punjab and two from Khyber Pakhtunkhwa. They were working on a development project in Kech district, and their bodies were taken to the district headquarters hospital in Turbat for autopsy, he said. Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi strongly condemned the killing of the six labourers “by Fitna al-Hindustan terrorists” – a term the state uses to refer to groups it accuses of being sponsored by India to execute terrorist attacks on Pakistani soil. Expressing his condolences to the bereaved families, the minister said the terrorists “demonstrated the worst brutality” by murdering the labourers.

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debt servicing, around \$3.5 billion will be interest repayments during the current fiscal year, he said. The SBP governor said approximately \$12 billion of the total debt servicing consisted of deposits held with the central bank, while \$3 billion were commercial loans expected to be refinanced. The remaining foreign debt obligations hover around \$7 billion. Of the total \$12 billion in deposits, \$8 billion are from Saudi Arabia. Pakistan will require rollovers of deposits falling due in December 2026 and March 2027, according to the SBP governor. In the first month of the fiscal year, July 2026, Pakistan undertook foreign debt servicing of \$2.2 billion, he said, adding that pressure on repayments would be lower during the remaining months from August 2026 to June 2027.

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tanker at Egypt’s Mediterranean port of Damietta, British maritime security firm Ambrey said in an initial assessment, while US and Saudi forces launched strikes against Iran-aligned groups in eastern Iraq and Iran fired missiles at US troops in Jordan. A statement from Egypt’s petroleum ministry confirmed a fire at the port but made no mention of a drone attack. It was not immediately clear who was responsible. The latest strikes in Iraq and Egypt threatened to draw more Middle Eastern countries into the conflict, after the Houthis in Yemen last week declared a naval blockade on Saudi Arabia. The US strikes in Iran on Wednesday followed President Donald Trump’s vow earlier in the day to retaliate against Iran for firing on US troops.

Pakistani rice exporters secure purchase orders with Chinese companies

GUANGZHOU: A China-Pakistan grains B2B matchmaking session held in Guangzhou, China, brought together 15 leading Pakistani rice exporters and Chinese agricultural companies, with participating enterprises signing purchase order letters of intent and reaching preliminary cooperation understandings. The event was jointly hosted by the Consulate General of Pakistan in Guangzhou and Guangzhou Interna-

tional Cooperation Center (GICC), China Economic Net (CEN) reported. A 17-member delegation from the Rice Exporters Association of Pakistan (REAP), representing 15 major rice exporters, attended the session, which gathered representatives from Guangdong-based companies in agricultural processing, grain and oil trading, agricultural technology, agricultural machinery manufacturing, cross-border e-commerce and supply chain services. During the matchmaking session, Pakistani

and Chinese companies held discussions on grain procurement prices, quality inspection standards, cross-border logistics, settlement arrangements, long-term supply cooperation and private-label processing. Several Guangdong enterprises and Pakistani delegation members signed purchase order letters of intent at the event, marking concrete progress in trade cooperation. The meeting also helped companies establish direct communication channels for future cooperation. Representatives from the Pakistani del-

egation introduced the country’s grain production capacity, export structure and rice supply capabilities, while member companies presented their product categories, supply volumes and logistics solutions to potential Chinese partners. According to the GICC, the event provided a platform for Chinese and Pakistani enterprises to explore cooperation opportunities in the grain sector and strengthen trade links between Pakistani agricultural exporters and Guangdong’s agricultural and supply chain industries.

Babar Azam, Shan Masood, Abbas rise in ICC Test rankings

Shan Masood jumps eight spots from 44th to 36th with 590 points following his century in first Test against Windies

DUBAI: Pakistan Test captain Babar Azam, batter Shan Masood and pacer Mohammad Abbas climbed the latest ICC Test rankings after strong performances in the opening Test against the West Indies, despite the visitors’ 90-run defeat. In the ICC Test batting rankings, Babar has climbed four places from 19th to 15th with 686 rating points, while Masood has jumped eight spots from 44th to 36th with 590 points following his century in the first Test. However, several other Pakistan batters slipped in the rankings. Saud Shakeel dropped three places from 21st to 24th with 641 points, while wicketkeeper-batter Mohammad Rizwan fell eight places to 26th with 638 points. All-rounder Salman Ali Agha also slipped four places to 32nd with 607 points. Left-handed opener Imam-ul-Haq retained his 53rd position, while Abdullah Shafique dropped one place to 57th with 511 points. All-rounder Aamer Jamal also remained in 100th place. Australia’s Travis Head continues to lead the ICC Test batting rankings, followed by England’s Harry Brook in second and teammate Joe Root in third. In the ICC Test bowling rankings, right-arm pacer Abbas made the biggest gain among Pakistan players, rising nine places from 26th to 17th with 690 rating points. Spinner Noman Ali retained his seventh position with 809 points. Left-arm pacer Shaheen Shah Afridi slipped four places to 29th with 617 points, while spinner Sajid Khan dropped one place to 35th with 545 points. Fast bowler Hasan Ali retained 38th place with 501 points. Pacer Khurram Shahzad fell one place to 52nd, Aamer Jamal remained 81st, spinner Asif Afridi dropped three places to 87th, fast bowler Mohammad Ali slipped to 93rd, while Salman Ali Agha fell four places to 99th. India’s Jasprit Bumrah remains the world’s top-ranked Test bowler, followed by New Zealand’s Matt Henry in second and Australia’s Mitchell Starc in third. – APP

FFC announces results for the second quarter ended June 30, 2026

ISLAMABAD: Fauji Fertilizer Company Limited (FFC) has announced its financial result for the second quarter ended June 30, 2026 in its Board of Directors meeting held on Jul 29, 2026. Our Urea plants produced 1,417 thousand tonnes Urea whereas Sona DAP production of 369 thousand tonnes was also achieved. Urea offtake increased to 1,404 thousand tonnes, against 1,122 thousand tonnes during corresponding period, whereas DAP sales, including imported product, increased from 288 thousand tonnes to 318 thousand tonnes in 2026. Increase in offtake resulted in urea market share improvement to 56% from 48% previously, while DAP market share registered a growth of 3% to 66%. All product revenue was registered at PKR 200 billion as compared to PKR 155 bln during 2025, mainly due to higher sales volumes. The rise in revenue, control over operating costs along with investment income of PKR 28 bln, enabled the Company to achieve net profit of PKR 41.8 bln. – APP

Arshad Nadeem reaches Commonwealth Games 2026 javelin throw final

GLASGOW: Pakistan’s Arshad Nadeem qualified for the men’s javelin throw final at the 2026 Commonwealth Games after finishing seventh in the qualification round with a best throw of 78.63 metres. No athlete managed to achieve the automatic qualifying standard of 84 metres during the three-throw qualification round. The top 12 competitors based on their best throws advanced to the final. Sri Lanka’s Ramesh Tharanga topped the qualification standings with a throw of 82.84 metres, followed by Grenada’s Anderson Peters with 81.29 metres and South Africa’s Douw Smit with 80.64 metres. England’s Ben East was among the

top five with a throw of 80.38 metres, while India’s Neeraj Chopra finished fifth with 79.61 metres. Australia’s MacEntyre placed sixth with 78.91 metres, ahead of Arshad Nadeem in seventh. Pakistan’s Yasir Sultan failed to qualify for the final after finishing 14th with a best throw of 74.36 metres. Arshad heads into the final as the defending champion after making history at the 2022 Commonwealth Games, where he won gold with a 90.18-metre throw. The effort set new national and Commonwealth Games records and made him the first South Asian athlete to surpass the 90-metre mark in the men’s javelin throw. – DNA



Russian strikes kill at least 8, wound more across Ukraine

Ukraine has escalated its retaliatory strikes on Russia in recent months, partly to pressure Moscow to the negotiating table after nearly four-and-a-half years of war

KYIV: Russian strikes killed at least eight people and wounded more than a dozen others across Ukraine, authorities said on Thursday, after President Volodymyr Zelensky warned of Moscow launching another massive attack overnight. A ballistic missile struck a village house near the central city of Kryvyi, killing four adults and two girls aged five and 12, local officials said. Eight other people were wounded in the attack, Kryvyi Rig’s defense council reported, warning “the death toll may rise.” Officials in Ukraine’s eastern Poltava region, meanwhile, said one person was killed in a drone strike on a warehouse, while at least 15 people were wounded in attacks on the western city of Lviv.

Kyiv’s city military administration confirmed one person was killed and two others wounded in the capital after Mayor Vitali Klitschko said Russia was “attacking the capital with ballistic weapons.” “The threat of further attack remains present. Stay in shelters!” Klitschko said early Thursday, adding there were fires in several districts of the city. Five other people were reported wounded in attacks in an eastern Kyiv district. “The Russians prepared a massive attack several days ago, and there is a high probability that the strike will be carried out tonight,” Zelensky said in a post on X late Wednesday. “Please, in all regions of Ukraine, pay attention to air raid alerts today and stay safe.” Zelensky in his post repeated his request to Ukraine’s allies to supply Kyiv with the missiles its air defense system lacks. Zelensky spoke on Tuesday with American counterpart Donald Trump at the White House and discussed the possibility of Ukraine producing Patriot interceptors. **Increasing attacks:** An AFP journalist in the capital heard air raid sirens, followed by several explosions. Photos shared by the city’s emergency service on Thursday showed firefighters blasting water into bombed buildings and

sifting through rubble. Last month was the deadliest for civilians in Ukraine since April 2022, as Moscow ramped up its long-range strikes on towns and cities across Ukraine, according to the United Nations. Ukraine has escalated its retaliatory strikes on Russia in recent months, partly to pressure Moscow to the negotiating table after nearly four-and-a-half years of war. In early July, Trump had expressed his intention to allow Ukraine to make surface-to-air missiles, at a time when Russia had stepped up its ballistic missile strikes. Only the American Patriot systems are capable of shooting them down, but Ukraine is desperately short of PAC-3 interceptor missiles. This shortage has also worsened since the war launched by the United States and Israel against Iran in February. Zelensky said on Tuesday he had a “good meeting” with Trump and said the US president “accepted that he will give us (Patriot) licenses.” **Attacks continue on Russia’s top on-line retailer:** A warehouse of Russian top online retailer Wildberries caught fire in the western city of Penza after Ukraine’s drone attack, regional governor Oleg Melnichenko said on Telegram. One person was injured and about 200 people evacuated from the site, he added, just

a day after the company, which has become a frequent target of Ukraine’s attacks, evacuated another facility in central Russia. Another of its facilities, in Sarapul in Russia’s Udmurtia region, also caught fire after a drone attack, the company said separately on Thursday. Its losses pile on the pain for ordinary Russians, some of whom have made online sales their main source of income, as Ukraine continues hitting energy facilities and refineries, deepening the fuel crisis in the world’s largest country by area. Drone strikes have damaged nearly a dozen Wildberries warehouses recently, destroying about 10 percent of storage capacity and inflicting losses on tens of thousands of small businesses using the platform, the company and local authorities say. Russia’s biggest bank, Sberbank, has warned it may have to boost loan-loss provisions as attacks on Wildberries hit the finances of online retailers and their suppliers. Russia downed a total of 258 drones overnight, its defense ministry said. That figure covers Russian-occupied parts of Ukraine. Reuters could not independently verify the reports. Both Russia and Ukraine deny targeting civilians in the war following Russia’s full-scale invasion of its neighbor in February 2022. – APP

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Meanwhile, Iran’s foreign ministry spokesperson says that talks with Oman are continuing through several rounds, while blaming the closure of the Strait of Hormuz and disruption to international shipping on US and Israeli military actions, Al Jazeera reports. Foreign ministry spokesperson Esmail Baqaei says the discussions with Omani officials, which began last week in Tehran, are ongoing and that further meetings have been held. “What is clear is that currently, the Strait of Hormuz is closed due to American actions and the insecurity that America has imposed on this waterway,” Baghaei tells the ILNA news agency. “International shipping is being harmed and damaged solely because of American actions.” He adds that the situation is the result of “military aggression” by the US and Israel, which began on March 28 and continues in various forms. Baqaei cites attacks on Iranian vessels, what he calls an illegal blockade of ports and transit routes, and continuing strikes against Iran.

PSX extends losses, sheds nearly 495 points

ISLAMABAD: The benchmark KSE-100 Index of the Pakistan Stock Exchange (PSX) continued with bearish trend on Thursday, losing 495.00 points, a negative change of 0.28 per cent, to close at 175,547.98 points against 176,042.99 points recorded in the previous trading session. The ready market witnessed a trading volume of 711.201 million shares, compared to 574.076 million shares traded on Wednesday, while the traded value slightly increased to Rs25.396 billion from Rs25.369 billion. Market capitalisation declined to Rs19.718 trillion from Rs19.778 trillion recorded a day earlier. Out of 495 companies that traded in the ready market, 175 posted gains, 279 suffered losses, while 41 remained unchanged, reflecting a predominantly bearish trend across the market. Trust Brokerage led the volume chart with 176.884 million shares, followed by WorldCall Telecom with 32.314 million shares and Pak Int. Bulk with 32.125 million shares. Among the top gainers, PIA Holding Company LimitedB surged by Rs325.32 to close at Rs18,000.00, while Bhane-ro Textile Mills Limited advanced by Rs78.92 to settle at Rs879.00.—APP

RCCI calls for balanced fuel pricing mechanism

RAWALPINDI: President Rawalpindi Chamber of Commerce and Industry (RCCI), Usman Shaukat called on the authorities concerned Thursday to introduce targeted safeguards alongside market-based fuel pricing reforms to protect businesses from price volatility. In a press statement, Usman Shaukat acknowledged the federal government's initiative to transition toward market-driven fuel pricing via daily adjustments, describing it as a positive step toward fiscal transparency, curbing fuel smuggling, and supporting the State Bank of Pakistan's inflation targets. However, the RCCI President cautioned that daily price fluctuations could create severe uncertainty for small and medium enterprises (SMEs), transport operators, manufacturers, and exporters by driving up freight charges, production costs, and agricultural inputs. To mitigate operational disruption, Usman Shaukat urged authorities to adopt a price-band mechanism with fortnightly revisions instead of daily changes. He also proposed temporary fuel tax rebates for export industries, targeted subsidies or tax credits for SMEs, and automatic fuel surcharge adjustments for the transport sector to sustain economic growth and market competitiveness.—APP

Rupee gains 01 paisa against Dollar

ISLAMABAD: The Rupee on Thursday appreciated by 01 paisa against the US Dollar in interbank trading and closed at Rs 277.81, compared to the previous day's closing of Rs 277.82. According to the Forex Association of Pakistan (FAP), the buying and selling rates of the dollar in the open market were recorded at Rs 278.75 and Rs 278.95, respectively. The price of the Euro against the rupee increased by Rs 1.49 and closed at Rs 318.13 against the previous day's closing of Rs 316.64, according to the State Bank of Pakistan (SBP). The Japanese Yen remained unchanged to close at Rs 1.69, whereas the exchange rate of the British Pound witnessed an increase of Rs 1.36 and closed at Rs 370.97 compared to the previous day's Rs 369.61. The exchange rate of the Emirati Dirham went up by 01 paisa and closed at Rs75.64, while the Saudi Riyal declined by 01, closing at Rs 73.99.—APP

The price of silver per tola fell by Rs76 to Rs6,215, while the price of 10 grams of silver decreased by Rs65 to Rs5,328. The price of silver in the international market also dropped by \$0.76 to \$57.36 per ounce, the association added.—APP

Organized by the Trade Development Authority of Pakistan (TDAP) in collaboration with the Trade & Investment Wing of the Consulate General of Pakistan, New York, the pavilion highlights Pakistan's growing capabilities in value-added textiles, apparel, leather products, sports goods, and home textiles. Speaking on the occasion, Ambassador Sheikh highlighted the vital role of Pakistan's textile sector in the national economy and reaffirmed the Government's commitment to promoting exports and strengthening commercial ties with the United States. Consul General Atozai underscored Pakistan's reputation as a reliable sourcing destination and reaffirmed the Consulate's commitment to facilitating business partnerships between Pakistan and the United States. Trade & Investment Counsellor Adnan Mahmood Awan said that Texworld New York City offers an important platform for Pakistani exporters to connect with international buyers and expand their presence in the U.S. market.—APP

Egypt confirms drone caused fire on two gas vessels

CAIRO/LONDON: A drone caused the fire that engulfed two gas vessels at Egypt's Mediterranean port of Damietta, the Egyptian cabinet said on Thursday, confirming that the blaze which erupted a day earlier was the result of an attack rather than an accident. No party has claimed responsibility for the incident which happened not far from the Suez Canal that has become the last safe evacuation route for Saudi oil to global markets. Authorities were continuing their investigations and taking necessary measures to protect Egypt's national security, the cabinet added. British maritime security firm Ambrey said on Wednesday that a drone had hit a US-owned gas storage tanker at the port, in an initial assessment that raised concerns about a further spread of conflict across the Middle East. Three trading sources familiar with the incident said the drone hit floating storage tanker Energos Winter, causing a fire that spread to another vessel, Gaslog Salem. The Energos Winter was reportedly struck on its starboard side, causing a fire that was extinguished, British maritime risk management group Vanguard said. Egypt's petroleum ministry said in a statement on Wednesday that the fires at the port were dealt with immediately by firefighting and security teams and caused no injuries or fatalities. Petroleum Minister Karim Badawi went to the site to oversee response efforts, it said. The drone strike occurred shortly after Iran carried out a missile attack against US forces in Jordan, and Washington and Saudi Arabia struck Iran-backed paramilitary groups in Iraq. US President Donald Trump threatened to retaliate against Iran and Yemen's Houthi group declared a naval blockade on Saudi Arabia, apparently spreading the conflict to its widest since the US and Israel started bombing Iran in February. The Energos Winter is a floating storage and regasification unit owned by US-based firm Energos Infrastructure. Its technical, safety and commercial operations are managed by Wilhelmsen Ship Management, a Singapore-based subsidiary of Norwegian company Wilhelmsen Group. The incident comes at a sensitive time for Egypt's gas market. Egypt became an LNG exporter following the development of the giant Zohr offshore gas field, but declining domestic production and rising demand have forced it to return to international markets as a major LNG buyer. Any prolonged outage would be closely watched by LNG traders for its potential impact on demand and spot prices. The vessels are expected to remain out of service for some time, two sources told Reuters, with one saying that a tank at the Energos Winter was breached, potentially prolonging repairs. The Energos Winter has regasification capacity of about 450 million cubic feet per day, equivalent to roughly 7 percent of Egypt's daily gas consumption and 16 percent of the country's total LNG receiving and regasification capacity, according to Egyptian consultancy EIAdI Studies. "The outage is not expected to create an immediate supply gap because Egypt has alternative import facilities and fuel options available, but it would reduce spare capacity in the system at a time of peak summer demand," an EIAdI note said. Some of the options, it said, include maximizing other regasification units, increasing use of fuel oil as backup fuel, tapping renewable energy capacity, and, as a last resort, temporarily reducing gas supplies to some industrial activities.—APP

MoU inked to boost vehicle exports

ISLAMABAD: MG JW Automobile Pakistan and Bangladesh's RANCON Group signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) on Thursday to boost vehicle exports and enhance automotive sector cooperation between the two countries. Special Assistant to the Prime Minister (SAPM) on Industries and Production, Haroon Akhtar Khan, witnessed the signing ceremony, which marks a step toward expanding Pakistan's automotive exports in line with the government's export-oriented economic vision. The agreement marks a significant milestone for Pakistan's automotive industry and reflects the growing international confidence in the country's manufacturing capabilities, said a press release issued by Ministry of Industry and Production. It said, under the agreement, MG JW Automobile Pakistan will export 100 locally assembled vehicles to Bangladesh during the current year, while total exports are projected to reach 5,800 vehicles over the next four years. Talking to the media after the ceremony, Haroon Akhtar Khan said the agreement would generate millions of dollars in foreign exchange for Pakistan and represents another important

step towards achieving the Government's export-led industrial growth agenda. He said, Pakistan was pursuing policies that promote exports, strengthen local manufacturing, attract investment, and create a business-friendly environment for industries, adding the government was finalizing a comprehensive Auto Policy aimed at increasing vehicle exports, enhancing localization, and strengthening the country's automotive manufacturing base. The SAPM emphasized that Pakistan's automotive sector has made remarkable progress in quality, localization, and production capacity, enabling locally manufactured vehicles to compete successfully in international markets. He said the government would continue extending all possible support to industries that contribute to exports, employment generation, and technological advancement. Speaking on the occasion, Muhammad Mostafizur Rashid Bhuiyan, Executive Director of RANCON Group, said the agreement would introduce healthy competition in Bangladesh's automobile market while providing consumers with high-quality vehicles coming from Pakistan.—APP

French teen fined in Singapore 'straw licking' case

SINGAPORE: A French teenager was fined in Singapore Thursday after pleading guilty to a public nuisance charge for a straw-licking stunt that landed him in hot water in the city state. Didier Gaspard Owen Maximilien, 19, was handed a Sg\$600 (\$465) fine after admitting to posting to social media a video of himself putting a straw he had licked back into the dispenser on an orange juice vending machine. The clip went viral on Instagram shortly after the incident on March 12, triggering a backlash that led to his arrest in Singapore, which is known for its strict enforcement of public order and hygiene rules. Handing down the sentence, Judge Kelly Ho said given Maximilien's "age and nature of the offense," alternatives like probation or a community-based sentence would not be imposed. Prosecutors agreed to the defense's proposal for a fine, saying the offense was at the "lower end" of its seriousness and while hygiene was compromised, no member of the public used the straw, so there "was no evidence of harm." They added that Maximilien "pleaded guilty at the earliest possible opportunity." Wearing a dark suit and white shirt without a tie, Maximilien was seen standing calmly in the dock while the judge pronounced the sentence. His parents were seated in the gallery. They left the court shortly afterwards and declined to speak to reporters. His defense counsel Kalidass Murugaiyan earlier argued for a fine in mitigation of sentence as opposed to probation. Maximilien's family had trouble getting a guardian in Singapore and a community-based sentence was logistically not possible as he had to go back to France in September to continue his studies, the lawyer said. "He is fully sorry for having caused all this trouble," Murugaiyan told the judge, adding that he had been counselled by his family. Singapore is known for its no-nonsense approach to public stunts.—APP

DUBAI: The UAE has condemned the recent drone attacks launched from Iraqi territory targeting oil facilities in Saudi Arabia's Eastern Province. In a statement published on its X account on Thursday, quoted by state news agency WAM, the UAE's Ministry of Foreign Affairs stated that these attacks are a "flagrant violation of the sovereignty of Saudi Arabia and a threat to its security and stability." The ministry reiterated the UAE's "full solidarity" with Saudi Arabia and its support for all measures aimed at safeguarding its security and stability. Meanwhile, GCC Secretary-General Jassem Mohamed Albudaiwi also slammed what he described as "terrorist" attacks on Saudi Arabian oil interests by Iran-aligned militias in Iraq. Albudaiwi deemed the acts "a dangerous escalation, a flagrant violation of the Kingdom's sovereignty, and a direct threat to its security and stability, as well as to regional peace and security." "The continuation of these terrorist assaults constitutes a direct threat to regional peace and security, undermining international efforts aimed at de-escalating tensions and consolidating security and stability," read the statement. - APP

Israeli
strikes
kill three
in Gaza

CAIRO: Israeli strikes killed at least three people, including two children, in the Gaza Strip on Thursday, health officials said, as mediators held new talks with Hamas leaders to work toward full implementation of a US-brokered Gaza peace plan. Medics said an Israeli airstrike on a tent encampment in Khan Younis, south of the enclave, killed a man and an eight-year-old girl. In the Bureij refugee camp in the central Gaza Strip, an Israeli airstrike hit a house killing an 18-month-old child and wounding at least eight people, medics said. The Israeli military said both strikes targeted Hamas militants. The latest deaths add to a toll of more than 1,200 Palestinians, mostly civilians, killed by Israeli attacks since the ceasefire took effect, according to Gaza health officials. Hamas does not usually disclose its losses. The truce halted full-scale fighting but has not ended near-daily Israeli strikes. Four Israeli soldiers have been killed by militants in Gaza over the same period. In Cairo, Hamas leaders were holding talks with mediators from Egypt, Qatar and Türkiye, over the implementation of the second phase of President Donald Trump's Gaza plan, as presented to them by his Board of Peace, that oversees its implementation. - APP

Oil prices slip as tankers continue to ply Middle East conflict zones

LONDON: Oil prices gave up some of their gains on Thursday as oil tankers continued to make their way out of the Middle East even as tensions there escalated, with the US-Iran war spreading beyond its main fronts. Brent futures fell \$1.29, or 1.42%, to \$89.45 a barrel as of 0110 GMT. US West Texas Intermediate (WTI) crude fell 56 cents, or 0.66%, to \$83.90 a barrel. Brent settled up 7.91% in the previous session and WTI up 6.56% in one of the sharpest spikes of the Iran war, reversing a 5% plunge on Tuesday after a pause in hostilities in the five-month conflict. Thirty-nine commodity ships passed through the Bab el-Mandeb strait into the Red Sea on Tuesday, the highest number since July 19, with only a few transiting through the Strait of Hormuz, preliminary shipping data showed. "While overall volumes are reduced, oil continues to leak out of the region through multiple channels, and additional workarounds are being explored. The longer this situation persists, the more these alternative routes and methods will erode Iran's leverage over the Strait of Hormuz," IG market analyst Tony Sycamore said in a note. The Strait of Hormuz is the world's most important oil ship-

ping route, through which around a fifth of global oil and gas flows previously passed. It has been largely blocked since the start of the US-Iran war in February despite efforts to reach a diplomatic breakthrough on the passage of ships through the strait. Iran has ruled out an Omani proposal for regional joint management of the strait, a senior Iranian official said on Wednesday. US-Saudi strikes hit paramilitary forces in Iraq on Wednesday, the first time that Saudi had publicly joined US air strikes, in retaliation for drone attacks on Saudi oil targets launched from Iraq. That marked the resumption of US strikes in the Middle East, since President Donald Trump over the weekend called off a bombing campaign amid dwindling munitions. Iran also said that it had fired on US bases in Jordan and struck three tankers that were transiting the Strait of Hormuz through what it said was an unauthorised route. Sources said on Wednesday that Saudi Arabia was seeking to build a coalition to protect Red Sea shipping from Houthi attacks. The group in Yemen said on July 20 that it would impose a naval blockade on Saudi Arabia in the Red Sea, expanding attacks on tankers and opening another new front in the Iran War in a push to also disrupt shipping in the Bab el-Mandeb strait, the second most important oil shipping channel.

New Zealand diplomat draws ire of Beijing ambassador

WASHINGTON: New Zealand's top diplomat Winston Peters drew the ire of Beijing's ambassador in Wellington on Thursday after telling a lawmaker of Chinese descent to "go back to your own country". During a debate about New Zealand's response to the Covid pandemic on Wednesday, populist NZ First leader Peters was asked by China-born Green Party member Lawrence Xu-Nan: "Are you vaccinated?" In response, Peters said the lawmaker, who was born in the Chinese city of Tianjin but grew up in Auckland, had "come here five minutes ago". "Go back to your own country. That's where they lie like a flatfish, but they don't

lie like that here," Peters said. "This is called a democracy, unlike what you're used to. Go back to where you've come from, you loudmouth." The comments sparked a rare intervention from Chinese ambassador to New Zealand Wang Xiaolong. Wang said on X on Thursday that while he preferred to stay out of domestic politics, "suffice it to say, sometimes, a statement says more about the person that makes it than anything or anybody else". Peters fired back at Wang, saying his comments had "proven my point". "We live in a democracy that includes free speech and rights - those two values that other certain countries not only limit, but do so with force," Peters said on X. "If that offends the pearl clutchers and the communist shills labelling it as 'dangerous' - welcome to New Zealand".

President praises Pakistan Navy's swift action

ISLAMABAD: President Asif Ali Zardari on Thursday commended the Pakistan Navy for safely rescuing fishermen stranded in the Northern Arabian Sea. Japan quake toll hits 34 as survivors struggle in heat

KUMAMOTO, Japan: Japanese emergency workers searched tirelessly for survivors at a wrecked shopping mall on Thursday, as the death toll from a major earthquake hit 34 and tens of thousands were left without power in punishing heat. The Kumamoto disaster management office issued the new tally for Tuesday's quake, with seven bodies now extracted from the mass of rubble, steel and wires of the Aeon shopping mall after a suspected gas blast. Eight people were also confirmed dead at the Nippon Paper Industries factory in Yatsushiro city, where part of a red-and-white smokestack collapsed, according to the office. Five others were in a critical condition after the 7.1-magnitude tremor, while almost 9,500 locals were in evacuation centers in the region of southwestern Japan on the island of Kyushu. The quake caused widespread damage, flattening homes, damaging bridges, triggering fires and leaving tens of thousands of residents without power and water in temperatures forecast to hit 38C this weekend. Some 13,520 households remained without electricity on Thursday. Hundreds of elderly people - Japan has the world's second-oldest population - slumbered on thin mats on the hard lobby floor at one community center in Uki city as they sought relief from the searing sun. "Thank God for these shelters," said one woman, who declined to give her name, as people slept between chairs and tables or gathered around a television. "In this heat, if you don't have electricity and air conditioning, it's very tough," father-of-four supermarket employee Hiroyuki Matsushima, 53, told AFP. With no power and running water, Retiree Kenji Ota, 72, has been sleeping inside his car at night. "This quake was so strong. It was horrible ... I can only sleep for two hours or so at night," he said. The town of Hikawa was one of the areas worst hit, where many older structures crumpled in the quake and where residents still had no water or power on Thursday. - APP

Nine killed in house roof collapse

LAHORE: At least nine people were killed and three others injured after the roof of a house collapsed near Sukh Nehri in Lahore's Baghbanpura area, rescue officials said. According to rescue officials, the injured were shifted to a nearby hospital for medical treatment, while efforts to remove the debris were continuing. Punjab Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz expressed grief over the loss of lives in the incident and directed authorities to ensure the best possible medical treatment for the injured. In a separate incident, two children were killed and two other people injured after the roof of a house collapsed during rainfall in Faisalabad. The deaths came weeks after 14 children died after the roof of a tutoring centre collapsed in Lahore.



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
