Norwegian foreign minister praises Pakistan's leadership

Addresses a joint press conference with FM Ishaq Dar

ISLAMABAD: Norwegian Foreign Minister Espen Barth Eide expressed his country's appreciation of Pakistan's mediatory role in the ongoing US-Iran conflict on Thursday, saying it was a "service to the world and, hence, also to us". Eide, who is on a two-day visit to Pakistan, expressed these views while addressing a press conference alongside Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister Ishaq Dar in Islamabad. "I also really want to reiterate our strong support for the very important role that Pakistan has taken in this dramatic war that started on February 28 with

the US-Israel attack on Iran," he said, recalling that Norway was one of the Western countries that was "clearest and earliest" in stating that the war was a violation of international rules. "If we stand up for international law, it has to apply to everyone, everywhere, all the time," he stressed. He said that while Norway had "significant disagreements with Iran on other issues, they also have the right to be protected as a state". Coming to Pakistan's mediatory role in the ongoing conflict, he said he realised how difficult mediation and facilitation of parleys between the two sides could be. "I know what a massive task you were taking on when you offered Islamabad not only as the venue but also as the facilitator of these talks,"

Joint defence agreement

Pakistan, Turkiye, Saudi Arabia will form political, military mechanisms

Kuwait, Bahrain and Somalia are among the countries that have welcomed it. Iran's comments also took a rather positive tone

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan, Turkiye and Saudi Arabia will form political and military mechanisms under a defence pact signed between the regional powers last week, Turkiye's defence ministry said on Thursday, adding the alliance would also deepen defence industry cooperation. The Makkah Joint Defence Agreement was signed last week as the Middle East grapples with fallout from the US-Israeli war on Iran, which has dragged in regional players and disrupted shipping through the Strait of Hormuz and the Red Sea. At a weekly briefing in Ankara, the ministry said the mechanisms would include the three countries' defence ministers, foreign ministers, and military chiefs. It added that the joint military exercises were also being planned under the pact, while cooperation could include joint production and technology sharing in the defence industry.

The remarks come a day after Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan said that he hoped more countries would join the agreement. "Our vision for it is not limited to the three countries," the Turkish leader told the London-based Asharq Al-Awsat daily. "Rather, we aspire for it to grow, and perhaps appropriate conditions will emerge one day for all countries of the region to gather under its umbrella." Turkish Foreign Minister Hakan Fidan on Saturday said Turkiye expected Egypt to join the pact "in the next stage", telling the Anadolu state news agency only "a few technical issues" stood in the way. Egypt has not commented on the agreement nor on the remarks by Fidan, who will visit Cairo on Thursday and Friday. Kuwait, Bahrain and Somalia are among the countries that have

Iran calls for compensation after Hormuz oil spill

Oil spills in recent decades caused trillions of dollars in damage to Iran's coastal areas, says Baqaei

PARIS: Iran warned on Thursday of environmental degradation in the Strait of Hormuz after an oil spill reached its southern Qeshm island, calling for compensation from those responsible. Foreign ministry spokesman Esmail Baqaei said the slick had "degraded the waters" of the Gulf and Sea of Oman, claiming "preliminary evidence indicates a foreign bulk carrier as the source". TankerTrackers, a US-hosted website that monitors shipping movements worldwide, said however, that the spill seemed to derive from an Iranian attack on bulk carrier Minoan Pioneer in Omani waters on August 3. "The spillage then drifted across the strait over to Iran," it said. Baqaei wrote on X that such spills have in "recent decades imposed trillions of dollars in damage on Iran's coastal areas", calling for compensation. "Every party that benefits from commercial shipping through the Strait of Hormuz carries both a legal and a moral obligation to remediate the environmental harm inflicted," he added.

High profile wanted terrorist killed in IBO

PESHAWAR: A highly wanted terrorist commander was killed in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa during an intelligence-based operation (IBO) conducted by the Bannu police and the Counter-Terrorism Department (CTD), the district police confirmed on Thursday. Bannu's District Police Officer (DPO) Captain (ret'd) Muhammad Furqan Bilal confirmed the terrorist's killing in a conversation with Dawn. The DPO confirmed that the terrorist was identified as a high-profile commander, Naseer Muhammad alias Gedarh, who carried a Rs6 million bounty on his head. According to a statement issued by the police, an operation is underway against terrorists in the jurisdiction of Domel Police Station under the supervision of DPO Bilal, involving both the Bannu district police and CTD teams.

The statement elaborated that the operation is being conducted in Akbar Ali Khan Kili, Sada Khel, Sadarwan and the adjoining areas, where police and CTD teams are carrying out targeted actions based on intelligence reports regarding the presence and movement of terrorists. Search and surveillance operations are also underway in the area, while security has been further tightened in various parts of the Bannu township and Domel. The police said further details of the operation and its progress would be shared after the ongoing operation was completed. There has been a resurgence in terrorism in Pakistan since the Afghan Taliban returned to power in Kabul in 2021. Islamabad has repeatedly urged the Taliban administration to dismantle terrorist sanctuaries on Afghan soil, particularly those linked to the banned TTP.

Taliban detains two UN staffers; six NGO workers

The Taliban government's chief spokesman, Zabihullah Mujahid, told that he was "trying to gather details" about the recent detentions, but had "not received final clarity."; Human Rights Watch called for the release

KABUL: Human Rights Watch called for the release of two UN staffers and six NGO workers in Afghanistan following a string of Taliban detentions in recent weeks. HRW said on Wednesday that six male staff working with the Women and Children Legal Research Foundation (WCLRF) had been "forcibly disappeared" about the recent detentions, but had "not received final clarity." The UN confirmed the detention of two of its staffers earlier this week. "UNAMA has not been informed of the charges against them and has not been permitted to visit them," Farhan Haq, deputy spokesman for the UN

Secretary-General, said in a briefing on Wednesday. Fereshta Abbasi, Afghanistan Researcher at Human Rights Watch, said in a statement that the detentions of UNAMA staff threatened the UN's "ability to deliver lifesaving aid." As the UN's political mission in Afghanistan, UNAMA is involved in human rights monitoring and data gathering. Its reports have frequently been criticized by the Taliban government in the past. The detentions became public only days before the Taliban celebrate the fifth anniversary of their return to power this Saturday. Afghanistan remains reliant on international assistance that has increasingly dried up amid broader foreign aid cuts over the last few years, but aid groups have regularly blamed the Taliban for obstructing their work and hampering donor commitment to Afghanistan. Human Rights Watch said Taliban security forces raided the WCLRF office in Kabul on June 21, confiscating employees' belongings and sealing the office, before questioning staff about their activities. The organization's leadership team of six male employees was detained one month later, on July 18, after Taliban authorities

DERA ISMAIL KHAN: The speakers at an all-parties conference (APC) have called for self-reform, national unity and an end to religious, ethnic, linguistic and political divisions, saying the country's problems could not be resolved without individual and collective accountability. The conference was organised by the Pakistan Markazi Muslim League at a local restaurant in connection with Pakistan Independence Day. Addressing the gathering, the party's Dera division president Qamar Muhammad Ramzan said that the people should refrain from blaming others and instead examine their own conduct. "If we correct ourselves, the system will automatically improve," he said. Once the central control centre is completed, cameras installed at various locations across the city will be connected to the central system through an integrated digital network. On the occasion, GDA Director General Moin ur Rehman Khan said that Gwadar represents Pakistan's economic future and is emerging as an important centre for global investment, attracting the attention of investors and businesses from around the world. The PSS is a built-in multipurpose system that detects threats, performs surveillance, and analyzes attack patterns, installed with the objective of ensuring a safe and secure environment in Gwadar Port and the adjoining Free Zone.—DNA

Youth to design nation's centenary destiny: Mashhood

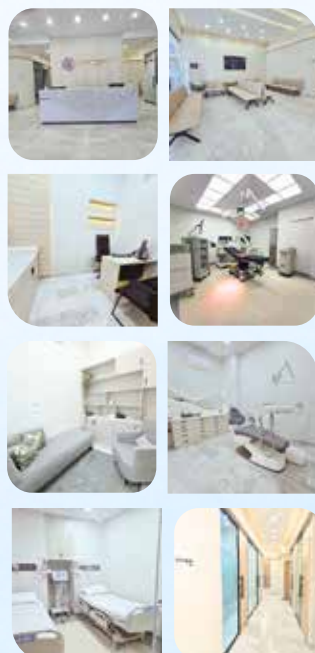
RAWALPINDI: Chairman Prime Minister's Youth Programme, Rana Mashhood Ahmad Khan has announced that the youth and citizens of Pakistan will directly design the country's centenary policy roadmap under the newly launched "Vision 2047" initiative. He expressed these views while talking to media representatives during an Independence Day event organized at the Rawalpindi Chamber of Commerce and Industry (RCCI) on Thursday. Giving details of PM's 'Vision 2047' initiative, Rana Mashhood explained that the policy framework for Pakistan's 100th anniversary will be finalized through inclusive public consultation. "Under this mechanism, policy proposals covering education, economy, employment and the environment have been formally invited from the public, particularly targeting the youth", he said. He further informed that a special committee has been assigned a six-month deadline to receive public submissions after which it will utilize two additional months to synthesize the feedback into a structured national strategy. Elaborating on key measures under the Prime Minister's Youth Employment policy P which has recently been launched, he announced a dedicated policy framework designed to foster grass-roots startups and SMEs, including a minimum 35 percent quota for women in the labour force and a mandatory requirement of 10 percent new company registrations annually to build an em-

powered digital generation. Rana Mashhood emphasized that Pakistan is rapidly advancing in technology, artificial intelligence (AI), Information Technology, and economic development. He remarked that after failing on direct conventional fronts, India is actively sponsoring and funding proxy groups like the BLA to create subversion and incite unrest in Kashmir, Balochistan, and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa. However, he stressed that the unity and potential of Pakistan's youth will effectively thwart all hostile conspiracies. Highlighting global geopolitical challenges, he highlighted that world instability and tensions between Iran and the United States prior to the 60-day ceasefire had pushed international markets into severe inflationary pressure, particularly in fuel prices. "However, through effective governance, Pakistan prevented fuel shortages and panic", he added. He further said that the diplomatic and peace-building initiatives of Chief of Army Staff, Field Marshal Asim Munir and Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif averted a wider global conflict. He stressed that PM and Field Marshal deserve for joint nomination for the Nobel Peace Prize. Rana Mashhood also acknowledged the RCCI, saying that the government deeply appreciates the efforts of the Rawalpindi Chamber of Commerce and Industry and the business community toward national economic stability, SME promotion, and youth empowerment.—DNA

Pak-China friendship enjoys broad political support: Gilani

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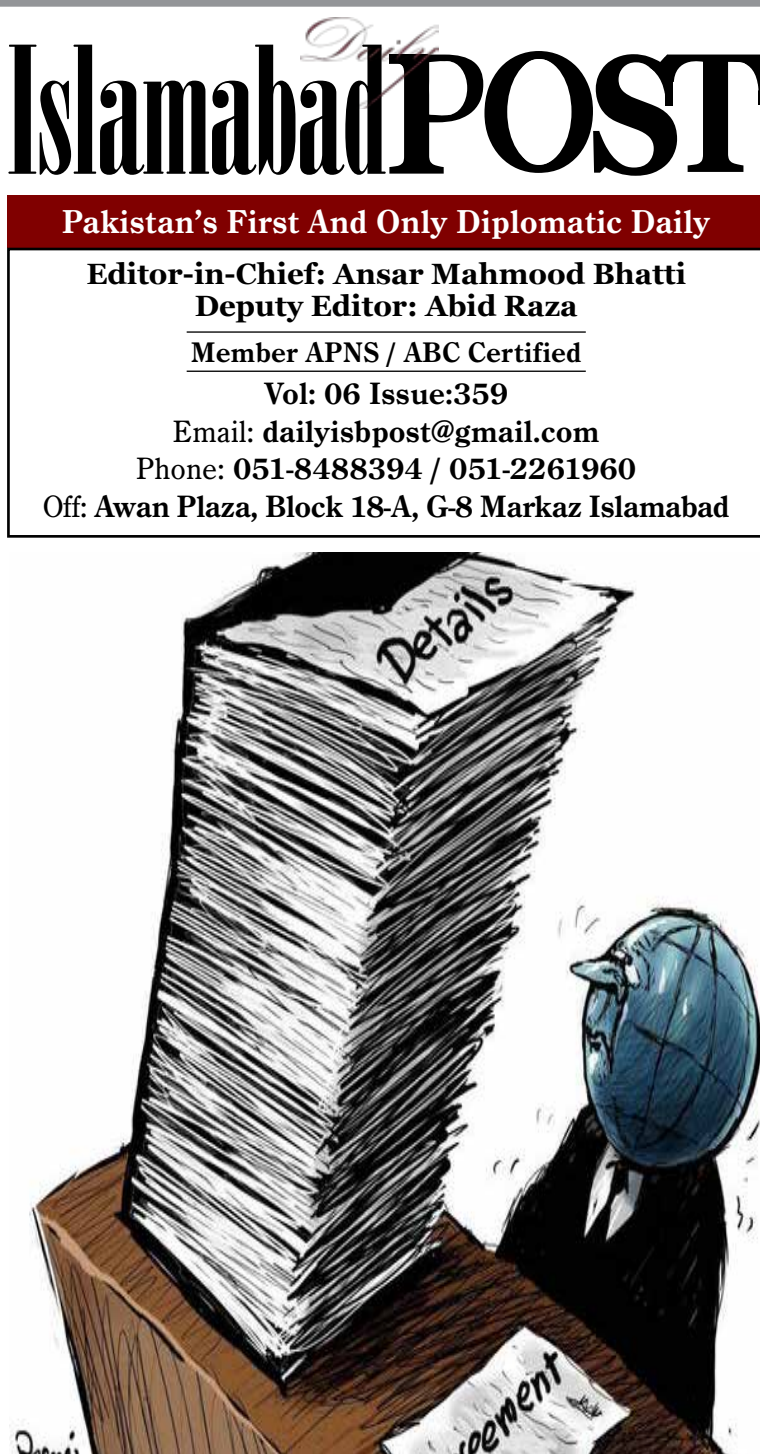
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Trump's Board of Peace facing its first real test

BENJAMIN Netanyahu's rejection of Donald Trump's latest Gaza plan has done something useful: it has stripped the Board of Peace of its ceremony and exposed the question at its core. The Israeli prime minister says there will be no withdrawal from Gaza until Hamas has been fully and verifiably disarmed. Hamas, for its part, says it will not begin surrendering its weapons while Israeli attacks continue and Israeli forces remain in place. This is often described as a dispute over sequencing. In fact, it is the conflict in miniature. Each side is being asked to surrender its principal source of leverage before it trusts the other to move. That is precisely why peace processes require more than a plan. They require an authority capable of enforcing reciprocal restraint. The future of Trump's Board of Peace will therefore be determined less by the declarations it issues than by a harder test: can it impose costs on both parties, including America's closest regional ally, when they obstruct the agreement? The board was introduced with much larger ambitions. It began as part of Trump's plan for Gaza, then expanded, in his telling, into a new instrument for resolving conflicts around the world. At its launch, it was spoken of as though speed, money and presidential will could succeed where the UN had become paralyzed. For a brief period, speculation grew that it might challenge, perhaps one day replace, the UN Security Council. Each side is being asked to surrender its principal source of leverage before it trusts the other to move. That was always a category error. The UNSC's authority comes from the UN Charter and the near-universal membership of the organization behind it. The board's limited legal role in Gaza comes from UNSC Resolution 2803, which authorizes a temporary arrangement through 2027 and requires reporting back to the council. Beyond Gaza, the board has no comparable mandate, enforcement mechanism or settled relationship with international law. It is not the UNSC's successor. In legal terms, it is closer to its contractor. Nor is the use of a small group of powerful states inherently misguided. Contact groups and ad hoc coalitions have sometimes broken diplomatic deadlocks that formal institutions could not. They work, however, when four conditions are present: a narrow objective, consent from the people most affected, a credible balance among the mediators, and a guarantor willing to enforce the bargain on friends as well as adversaries. The Board of Peace has struggled with at least three of the four. Its design is part of the problem. Membership is by invitation of the chairman. Ordinary terms last three years and may be renewed at his discretion; a contribution of more than \$1 billion removes the term limit. Trump can select and dismiss executive members, veto decisions, determine the meaning of the charter and designate his own successor. The chairman is not merely first among equals. He is the institution's proprietor. This structure has allowed membership to become an extension of Trump's



personal diplomacy. When Emmanuel Macron appeared unwilling to join, Trump threatened tariffs of 200 percent on French wine and Champagne. When Canada's Mark Carney criticized the weaponization of trade and economic dependence, Trump withdrew Canada's invitation. Admission to a body supposedly devoted to peace began to resemble a presidential favor: offered to those in good standing, withheld from those who caused offense. There is a revealing contradiction here. Trump has long criticized the UN system for entrenching the privileges of a small number of powers. Yet his alternative offers permanence in return for a billion-dollar payment and concentrates exceptional authority in one man. It does not abolish hierarchy, it privatizes it. Then came the apparent breakthrough at the end of July. Trump announced a road map under which Hamas and other armed groups would relinquish their weapons, Israeli forces would withdraw in stages, a technocratic Palestinian authority would assume governance, and an international force would oversee the transition. On paper, it addressed the essential elements of the conflict. In practice, it postponed the central question: who acts first and who guarantees that the other side follows? It would be premature to declare the board dead. Its grander incarnation, however, has already collided with reality. Netanyahu's public rejection on Sunday supplied the answer, at least for now. Israel will not accept phased reciprocity if it believes it can demand prior Palestinian disarmament while retaining military freedom of action. Hamas will not surrender the last instrument of coercive power it possesses if Israeli withdrawal remains a promise rather than a concurrent obligation. The board has drafted a bridge but neither party trusts it enough to step onto it. This is where Trump's personal control of the institution becomes both its possible strength and its fatal weakness. A conventional multilateral body would find it difficult to move Netanyahu. Trump, because of America's military, diplomatic and economic leverage over Israel, and because of his standing with the Israeli right, has more capacity than most Western leaders to do so. But using that leverage would require him to treat Israel not simply as a partner whose security concerns must be met but as a party whose violations and territorial expansion must also carry consequences. If the board speaks only of Hamas' weapons while treating Israeli attacks, restrictions on aid and movement of the ceasefire line as secondary matters, it will not be an arbiter. It will be an instrument for translating an unequal balance of power into the language of peace. No Palestinian actor could safely disarm under those conditions and no international force would wish to inherit responsibility for policing the resulting arrangement. The board should therefore be judged against a short list of visible tests: a sustained halt to Israeli strikes and Palestinian attacks, a verified freeze on changes to the lines of control, unimpeded humanitarian access, the entry of a genuinely empowered Palestinian administration, deployment of the international force and a synchronized timetable linking weapons decommissioning to Israeli withdrawal. Progress must be measured by independent verification, not presidential announcement. It would be premature to declare the board dead. Its grander incarnation, however — a Trump-led alternative to the UN and a new center of global authority — has already collided with reality. What may still survive is a more modest and potentially useful body: a temporary implementation group for Gaza, backed by American power and regional participation. But even that narrower role depends on a principle the board has not yet proved it accepts: peace requires the strong to be constrained as well as the weak. If Trump cannot use his own institution to demand compliance from Netanyahu, the board will have failed its first real test.

From Dependence to Dignity

THE gradual shift in global power has reopened an old debate about the relationship between the West and the Global South. For decades, the international political and economic order has largely reflected the interests of the industrialised West. The institutions governing global finance, trade and security were created in the aftermath of the Second World War, when much of Asia, Africa and Latin America had little influence over international decision-making. Although the world has changed profoundly since then, many of those institutions continue to operate on assumptions shaped by an earlier era. This imbalance remains evident. Developing countries often have limited influence over decisions that affect their economic futures, while international financial rules and lending practices continue to favour those with greater political and economic weight. Pakistan has experienced these realities repeatedly through its dependence on external financing and its engagement with international financial institutions. Calls for reform of global governance, therefore, are neither unreasonable nor new. Western governments would benefit from recognising that their own political and economic experience is not the only model of development. The legacy of colonial rule, military intervention and unequal economic relationships continues to shape perceptions across the developing world. A more constructive relationship requires dialogue instead of lectures, partnership instead of paternalism and consistency instead of selective application of principles. Respect is earned not only through power but also through fairness. Yet criticism of the international order should not become an excuse for ignoring domestic shortcomings. Historical injustices help explain many present-day inequalities, but they cannot account for every failure decades after independence. Pakistan's greatest challenges today stem as much from internal weaknesses as from external constraints. A more balanced national conversation must therefore acknowledge both realities. Pakistan's repeated economic crises illustrate this point. The country has undoubtedly faced extraordinary pressures, including geopolitical tensions, regional instability, global financial shocks and the growing impact of climate change despite contributing little to global carbon emissions. These circumstances justify demands for greater international support and more equitable climate and development financing. However, Pakistan's recurring balance-of-payments crises, narrow tax base, weak export performance, energy-sector inefficiencies and dependence on external borrowing cannot be explained solely by global conditions. They are also the product of policy failures that successive governments have struggled to address. Promises of tax reform, industrial modernization and export diversification, energy restructuring and institutional improvement have been made repeatedly, yet implementation has often been delayed or diluted. The result is a familiar cycle. Economic pressures intensify,

external assistance becomes unavoidable, reforms are introduced under financial compulsion, temporary stability returns, and the deeper structural weaknesses remain unresolved until the next crisis emerges. This pattern has become increasingly difficult to sustain. No country can claim genuine economic sovereignty while relying indefinitely on external lenders to finance essential imports and maintain macroeconomic stability. Borrowing may create temporary fiscal space, but it cannot substitute for sustained growth driven by higher productivity, competitive exports and domestic investment. National resilience ultimately depends on the strength of domestic institutions rather than the generosity of external partners. For Pakistan, governance reform is therefore not simply an international expectation; it is a national necessity. A broader and fairer tax system, efficient public institutions, transparent regulation and long-term economic planning are essential foundations for sustainable growth. International assistance can support reform, but it cannot replace political commitment at home. Perhaps the country's greatest unrealised strength lies in its people. Pakistan possesses one of the world's youngest populations, a demographic advantage that could become a powerful engine of growth. Yet such potential is realised only when education, skills and employment opportunities keep pace with demographic change. Without investment in human capital, a youthful population can become an economic burden rather than a national asset. Improving educational outcomes must therefore become a strategic priority. Schools require better standards, universities need stronger links with research and industry, and technical and vocational education deserves far greater attention than it currently receives. Investment in science, innovation and technology should extend beyond policy declarations and become a central component of economic planning. The experience of rapidly developing economies demonstrates that lasting progress depends on building domestic capabilities. Countries that successfully transformed their economic fortunes did not rely solely on favourable international conditions. They strengthened institutions, invested in education, encouraged industrial competitiveness and expanded technological capacity. Pakistan must pursue a similar path. Economic growth also requires a more productive economy. Remittances remain an important source of foreign exchange, but they cannot serve as the foundation of a long-term development strategy. Sustainable prosperity depends on competitive manufacturing, modern agriculture, reliable energy supplies, digital infrastructure and a business environment that encourages entrepreneurship and investment. Pakistan's geographical location provides significant commercial opportunities linking South Asia, Central Asia, the Middle East and western China. Geography alone, however, does not create prosperity. Political stability, efficient logistics, modern customs procedures and consistent commercial policies are necessary to convert strategic location into economic advantage. Regional trade, long constrained by political disputes,

deserves renewed attention if Pakistan hopes to strengthen its export base and attract greater investment. The responsibilities of reform are not confined to Pakistan. Western governments must also reconsider how they engage countries such as Pakistan. Too often, relations have been shaped primarily by security concerns, counterterrorism, Afghanistan or broader geopolitical competition. While these issues remain important, they do not define Pakistan's full potential. Pakistan should increasingly be viewed as an economic partner with significant agricultural, industrial and technological prospects rather than simply as a country requiring periodic financial support or strategic cooperation during regional crises. Long-term partnerships built on trade, investment, education and technology are likely to prove more durable than relationships driven by short-term security considerations. Western credibility also depends on greater consistency. Developing countries understandably question international norms when democratic principles, human rights or international law appear to be applied selectively according to strategic interests. Reforming global financial institutions, expanding representation for developing economies and adopting a fairer approach to climate finance would signal recognition that the distribution of global power has changed substantially over recent decades. At the same time, Pakistan and other developing countries must avoid reducing every domestic challenge to the legacy of colonialism or the shortcomings of the international system. These factors remain relevant, but they do not explain why countries with comparable histories have achieved markedly different outcomes. Domestic leadership, institutional quality and policy choices continue to shape national trajectories. Pakistan can legitimately advocate climate justice while strengthening its own disaster preparedness. It can call for reform of international financial institutions while improving fiscal discipline. It can seek greater market access while enhancing the competitiveness of its exports. Demanding fairness abroad and pursuing reform at home are complementary objectives rather than competing ones. A stronger economy would also strengthen Pakistan's diplomatic position. Effective institutions, sound public finances and an educated workforce provide governments with greater policy independence and stronger negotiating leverage internationally. Sovereignty ultimately rests not on rhetoric but on economic resilience, institutional competence and productive capacity. The West should recognise the historical inequalities embedded in the international system and support reforms that better reflect today's global realities. Pakistan, meanwhile, must recognise that international respect is sustained not by grievance alone but by performance. The country's long-term success will depend on institutions that outlast political cycles, an economy capable of producing more than it consumes, an education system that prepares future generations for a competitive world and political leadership willing to undertake reforms that have been postponed for too long.

From a nascent force to a maritime power

AS Pakistan celebrates its 79 th Independence Day on 14 August 2026, the historic day provides an opportunity not only to recall the struggle that brought the country into existence but also to reflect upon the role of institutions that safeguarded its sovereignty and national interests over the decades. Among these institutions, Pakistan Navy occupies a distinctive place. Born with the country in 1947 with limited resources and modest capabilities, Pakistan Navy steadily evolved into a professional, technologically capable and operationally versatile maritime force, carrying forward the vision of the Quaid-e-Azam and adapting itself to an increasingly complex maritime environment. Pakistan emerged as an

independent state in circumstances marked by enormous political, economic and security challenges. The newly established country had to build its institutions almost from scratch, while confronting an uncertain regional environment. Pakistan Navy was no exception. At independence, the Royal Indian Navy was divided between India and Pakistan, leaving Pakistan with only a small portion of the nava assets and infrastructure. Yet, from these humble beginnings, Pakistan Navy embarked upon a journey of institution-building, professional development and operational preparedness. The Quaid-e-Azam Muhammad Ali Jinnah, with his characteristic foresight, understood the strategic importance of the sea to Pakistan. Addressing officers of the Pakistan Navy on 23 January 1948, he reminded them that Pakistan was still in its infancy and so was its Navy, but expressed confidence that the infant force would grow rapidly. He emphasised courage, devotion to duty, professionalism and determination as the qualities that would compensate for its limited size. His message was not merely a statement of encouragement; it was a strategic vision for a Navy that would eventually become an essential instrument of national security. The early decades tested that vision. During the 1965 war, Pakistan Navy demonstrated that effectiveness at sea depended not merely upon numbers but upon training, planning, courage and intelligent employment of available resources. Operation Dwarka reflected the Navy's ability to undertake offensive action against strategically significant targets, while the deployment of submarine Ghazi demonstrated the importance of undersea warfare in maintaining deterrence. The 1971 war provided another defining chapter in Pakistan Navy's operational history. On 9 December 1971, submarine Hangor sank the Indian Navy frigate INS Khukri and crippled INS Kirpan, an engagement that remains one of the most notable submarine actions since the Second World War. These episodes became enduring symbols of professional commitment and operational courage. Pakistan Navy's evolution, however, did not stop with wartime experience. The changing character of maritime security required Pakistan Navy to expand its role beyond conventional naval warfare. The sea has increasingly become an arena where

military security, international trade, energy flows, terrorism, piracy, trafficking, environmental concerns and economic interests intersect. For a country whose economy and strategic connectivity are closely linked with the Arabian Sea, the protection and security of maritime routes is therefore a strategic necessity. Pakistan Navy consequently advanced a broader maritime-security role and contributed to international efforts against piracy, maritime terrorism and other non-traditional threats. Its participation in multinational maritime-security mechanisms, including Combined Task Forces 150 and 151, enabled it to contribute to collective efforts for maintaining freedom of navigation and security at sea. Pakistan Navy's participation in multinational exercises and maritime partnerships also strengthened interoperability and reinforced Pakistan's commitment to a stable and peaceful maritime environment. Exercise AMAN represents another important dimension of this transformation. Initiated as a platform for bringing together regional and extra-regional navies, AMAN developed into a significant forum for maritime cooperation, information sharing, professional interaction and naval diplomacy. Its underlying message - that maritime security is a shared responsibility - become increasingly relevant as the Indian Ocean and adjoining waters acquire greater strategic and economic significance. Pakistan Navy's contribution extends beyond combat and maritime security operations. Its hydrographic and navigational services played an important role in making Pakistan waters safer for maritime trade and supporting the country's maritime development. The National Hydrographic Office completed systematic surveys of Pakistan's coastal waters, produced navigational charts and contributed to the identification and development of sites for ports and harbours. One of its notable national achievements was its contribution to Pakistan's successful claim for extension of its continental shelf to 350 nautical miles, approved by the UN Commission on the Limits of the Continental Shelf in 2015. The contemporary maritime environment has further increased the importance of Pakistan Navy. Protection of sea lines of communication, maritime infrastructure, ports and commercial shipping

is no longer simply a military requirement; it is directly linked with economic security. Recent developments have underscored this connection. In July 2026, Pakistan and its territorial waters were removed from the Listed Areas of the Lloyd's Market Association's Joint War Committee, a development expected to reduce war-risk insurance costs and strengthen confidence in Pakistan's maritime sector and ports. While the decision reflects wider improvements in Pakistan's maritime security environment, it also highlights the strategic value of maintaining secure and stable waters for international shipping and trade. From the limited naval force inherited in 1947 to a Navy capable of undertaking complex operations, participating in multinational maritime-security initiatives, supporting national maritime development and contributing to regional stability, the journey has been one of continuous transformation. On this Independence Day, therefore, the story of Pakistan Navy is not merely a story of ships, submarines and battles. It is a story of an institution that grew alongside Pakistan itself. It reflects the nation's determination to convert limitations into capabilities and challenges into opportunities. The vision articulated by the Quaid-e-Azam in 1948 remains relevant: strength, professionalism, courage and devotion to duty are indispensable to safeguarding peace. As Pakistan looks towards the future, its maritime interests will become even more significant. The expansion of maritime trade, development of ports, the potential of the Blue Economy and the growing strategic importance of the Indian Ocean will require sustained attention to maritime security. Pakistan Navy, therefore, has a continuing role not only in defending the nation's maritime frontiers but also in creating an environment in which Pakistan can confidently pursue its economic and strategic interests at sea. The journey that began with a nascent force in 1947 continues. Each generation has added to its capabilities and each challenge has contributed to its professional evolution. As the nation celebrates its 79th Independence Day, the growth of Pakistan Navy stands as a reminder that national strength is built over time through vision, sacrifice, professionalism and an unwavering commitment to Pakistan.

Officials say those appeals have gone unheeded. On Monday, the district police, CTD and security forces conducted a joint IBO in the jurisdiction of the Miryan police station in Bannu, leading to the killing of an unidentified terrorist in an exchange of fire and the arrest of 10 suspected individuals. Last week, a captain was martyred while seven terrorists were killed during an IBO in KP's Hangu district. Separately, security forces killed a key terrorist commander identified as Jamidullah during an operation in Jani Khel area of Bannu, a security official said. According to the Pakistan Institute for Conflict and Security Studies, an Islamabad-based think tank, violence linked to terrorist attacks and counter-terrorism operations intensified sharply in July, making it the deadliest month of 2026, with 112 security personnel among 205 people killed.

Morocco, in the semifinals for the third time at WAFCON, dominated possession in regulation. – APP

Body of missing Pakistani climber recovered

GILGIT: The body of Pakistani climber Sohail Sakhi, who was among the 10-person expedition that went missing after the deadly Broad Peak avalanche, was recovered and shifted to the mountain's base camp, the Alpine Club of Pakistan (ACP) said on Thursday. The avalanche struck on July 30, cutting off contact with the 10-member international expedition led by world-renowned British-Nepali mountaineer Nirmal Purja on Broad Peak, one of the world's highest mountains. Purja's company later confirmed there were no survivors. The bodies of seven climbers were found. However, the search for Sakhi, American climber Sarah Mallory Geis, and Nepalese climber Nawang Thindu Sherpa was suspended last week due to a risk of fresh avalanches. On Thursday, ACP member Naila Kiani said that Sakhi's body had been found. According to Naila, a team of local volunteers from Shigar, searching the area on their

own initiative, found the remains, which were subsequently confirmed as those of Sakhi. She said the volunteers – Muhammad Nadeem, Muhammad Bashir and Abuzar – first spotted the body and alerted others in the area. They, along with other volunteers, brought the body down from Camp 1 to the base camp. ACP General Secretary Ayaz Shigri told Dawn that the body had been shifted to the Broad Peak Base Camp and would be airlifted to Skardu by Pakistan Army helicopters, weather permitting. He said the bodies of two remaining climbers have not yet been recovered. Shigri said rescue efforts for the remaining climbers would resume once weather conditions improved and the area was deemed safe. He said the local volunteers located Sakhi's body at an altitude of 5,600 metres. Renowned mountaineer Nirmal Purja along with six elite Nepali guides were also part of the expedition. – DNA

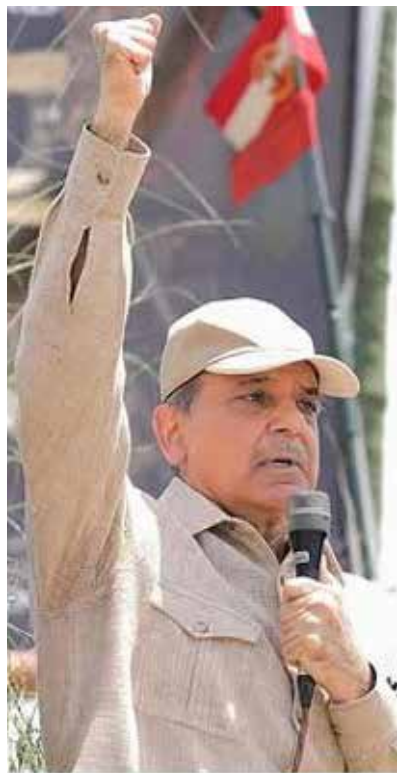

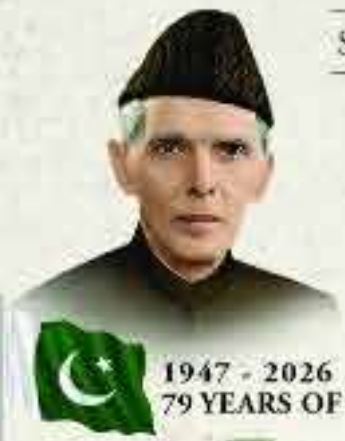

he said, lauding Pakistan's civilian and military leadership for their efforts. "What you have been doing is really a service to the world, and hence, also to us." The Norwegian foreign minister said Pakistan's mediation efforts also mattered to his country as it was a large shipping nation. "We share an interest in open sea lanes and the ability to trade in the high seas, and to respect the Constitution of the Oceans [...]. Whatever emerges from this tragic and unnecessary war in Gulf, we need to protect the principle of the free passage," he explained. "And I am so happy we see completely eye to eye [on this]," he remarked. The visiting minister added that his message to "anyone involved out there in the conflict is that this issue of free passage and an open strait is not an issue for the warring parties alone. It is a global issue that we have a shared interest in promoting". He said he had discussed other regional issues during the visit as well, ranging from the Kashmir issue to Afghanistan. Moreover, Eide said, he was glad to learn more about a recently signed defence pact between Pakistan, Türkiye and Saudi Arabia in Makkah. "These are three countries with whom Norway has very good and close relations," he noted. At the outset of his address, Eide said he was honoured to be in Pakistan, saying the last time a Norwegian foreign minister visited Pakistan was 10 years ago. "So it was about time," he remarked. "I promised you many months ago that I would come, and today, I live up to my promise. I was looking forward to this visit, which is short but very effective." Eide said there was a "strong partnership" between Norway and Pakistan, as well as the people of the two countries. "We have a sizeable diaspora of Pakistani descent [...]. Many of them are in key positions of politics and society and are a very welcome contribution to our country; and the fact that we have so many people who know these two countries intimately is yet another argument for strengthening our economic ties," he added. The Norwegian foreign minister further said that Oslo and Islamabad were discussing strengthening economic ties "in the context of specifics" and enhancing trade ties in more structural ways. He also mentioned climate change and floods in Pakistan, saying that the two sides agreed it was a foreign policy issue.

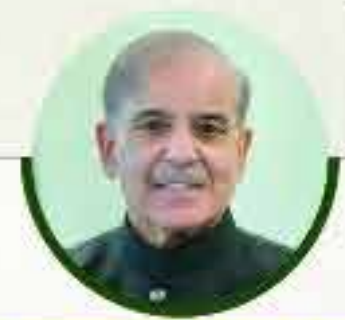

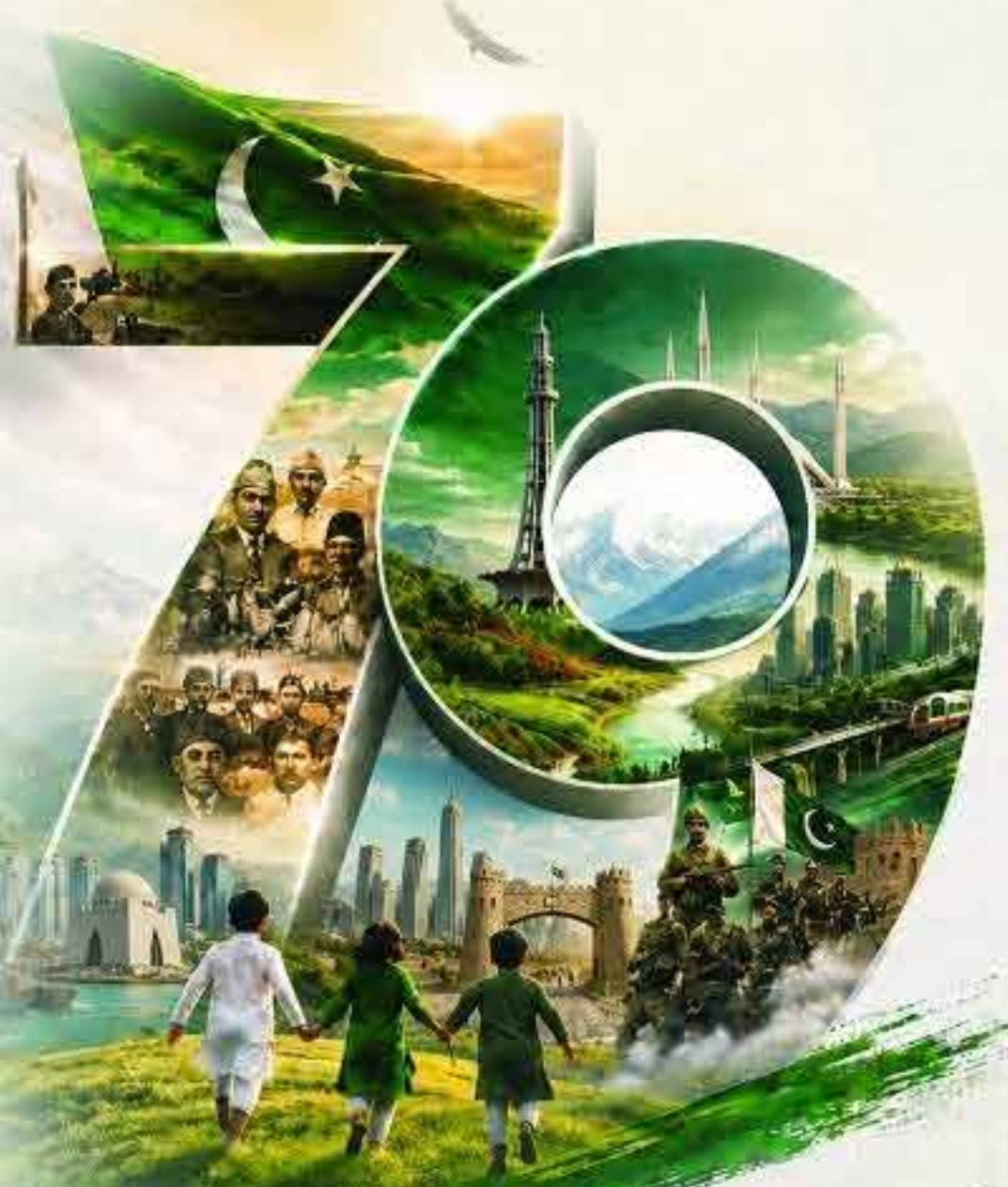

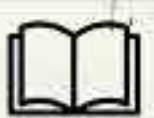

Missile threat forced Trump plane switch

WASHINGTON: A threat that Air Force One could be targeted by a shoulder-fired missile prompted the Secret Service to secretly move President Donald Trump onto a smaller government jet during a trip to Türkiye last month, a person briefed on the matter said on Wednesday.

The threat emerged on the final day of Trump's visit to Ankara for the NATO summit amid heightened tensions with Iran, the source said. The Secret Service deemed the threat to be credible and imminent, prompting an extraordinary operation to conceal the US president's movements.

The source declined to say where the intelligence came from but said officials had little time to prepare and devised the plans at the last minute. A second source briefed on the matter said there was not a clear plan by those hostile to Trump for executing the threat, but only an intent, which is why the planes were allowed to fly. Trump and a small group of aides used a catering truck to surreptitiously switch from the big blue-and-white presidential aircraft to a smaller, nondescript C-32A jet for the flight out of Türkiye on July 8, while Air Force One departed separately carrying senior administration officials, White House staff and the travelling press corps, according to the first source.

Trump told reporters on Tuesday that he made the switch at the direction of the Secret Service, which is charged with presidential security. He flew from Ankara to a refuelling stop in Britain without incident. "I think actually the plane that I flew on was at greater risk," Trump told reporters, without providing evidence.

He underscored Kazakhstan's achievements in building stronger partnerships with Pakistan, particularly in economic and cultural exchanges.

Israel sends more troops to West Bank

QUSRA: Israel's military said on Thursday it had sent more troops to a West Bank village where settlers have trapped Palestinian families inside their homes, a siege the Palestinians say is aimed at forcibly displacing them from their land. The siege began at the weekend when Jewish settlers closed off the road to the three homes in the Palestinian village of Qusra and set up a tent in their front yards, refusing to allow anyone to enter or leave. The settlers had earlier cut off their electricity and water.

Israel's military says it is trying to disperse the settlers from the area, even as a video from earlier in the week showed several Israeli men in green military garb joining the settlers in a morning prayer in the tent. The military said it was taking disciplinary action against any personnel involved.

A day after troops deployed tear gas in a failed

attempt to remove the settlers, the military said it had sent additional troops to Qusra "to carry out defensive missions and patrols in the area to maintain security and protect the area."

The United Nations said in a statement that some 15 Palestinians including two children were "being trapped inside their homes in a state of terror, unable to attend to their basic needs and without access to water or electricity."

The military has come under increasing pressure to halt rogue land seizures by settlers emboldened by the right-wing government of Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, which has spearheaded a rapid expansion of settlements in the occupied West Bank. The two families under siege in the area say they have no food or medicine, and that the settlers have been damaging their property, throwing stones at their homes and shouting insulting language at them. "We appeal to government institutions and to every free and honorable person

to help us secure food and medicine," said Qusay Abu Reeda, a Palestinian-American who is trapped with his family inside one of the homes.

The US Ambassador to Israel, Mike Huckabee, said the Israeli military and police "have gone at our request to remove the Israeli terrorists doing this," adding: "The actions of those doing this to this family's home is criminal." Palestinians say the Israeli military allows settlers to seize land and resources across the West Bank with impunity, including in areas where they hold Israel-issued ownership documents. Incidents of settler land seizures are especially common in areas on the outskirts of villages, like Qusra, which sits in an area under complete Israeli security control. The West Bank, territory Israel captured in the 1967 Middle East war, is home to some three million Palestinians and 500,000 settlers. There are some 146 settlements in the West Bank, as well as 390 smaller outposts, according to the Israeli settlement watchdog group Peace Now.

Oil eases as weaker demand outlook counters Mideast supply concerns

LONDON: Oil prices eased on Thursday after gains in previous sessions, as attention turned to expectations of weaker global oil demand this year, while there was no progress on opening the vital Strait of Hormuz. Brent futures slipped 42 cents, or 0.47%, to \$88.56 a barrel. US, trimming gains made over the previous six sessions. West Texas Intermediate (WTI) crude fell 55 cents, or 0.66%, to \$82.72, after advancing over the past five sessions. The Organisation of Petroleum Exporting Countries lowered its world oil demand growth forecast for 2026 to 580,000 barrels per day in its monthly oil market report on Wednesday.

On the same day, the International Energy Agency said it expects a 1.6 million bpd contraction in consumption this year, down from a forecast of 1 million bpd last month, because of restricted fuel supplies and higher prices from the U.S.-Israeli war on Iran that have curtailed demand.

Oil prices were also under pressure from a surprise build in US commercial crude oil inventories, which posted their largest weekly gain since January 2023 last week as exports slumped, the Energy Information Administration said on Wednesday. Crude inventories rose by 17.4 million barrels to 424.4 million barrels in the week ended August 7, their highest since June 5, the EIA said, compared with analysts' expectations in a Reuters poll for a 1.4 million-barrel draw.

Still, the deadlocked talks between Iran and the US to end the war in the Gulf have kept prices elevated. A senior Iranian source said on Wednesday that there had been no progress in talks to revive the interim deal agreed in June and define a time frame to implement it.

AJK police claim JAAC abducted 8 cops

ISLAMABAD: Azad Jammu Kashmir (AJK) police said on Thursday that eight highway police personnel on election duty had been "abducted" by the proscribed Joint Awami Action Committee (JAAC). Addressing a televised press conference, police spokesperson Khawar Ali Shaukat alleged that the JAAC attacked security forces deputed on election duty in the region. "Eight highway police officials on election duty were abducted," he said as state media shared a collage of the officials' pictures. "The personnel are in the custody of JAAC and have been subjected to brutal abuse," he said. He said that the "miscreants also threatened the families of the personnel that they would be martyred if their demands were not met". He said that recent events showed that the JAAC was not a peaceful group, but a violent one intent on challenging the state's writ and weakening institutions. "I want to make it clear that the state was not and is not weak. The state has always shown restraint," he said, adding that violent acts for the sake of rights were not above the law. He said that the people of the region, by participating in polls in the region, had made it clear that they had nothing to do with the proscribed group. He appealed to the public to disassociate themselves from the JAAC and to not get involved in acts where the state's writ was challenged. - DNA

Court orders inquiry into HIV outbreak hospital

KARACHI: The Sindh High Court (SHC) on Thursday directed the provincial government to constitute an inquiry committee headed by the chief secretary to investigate the HIV outbreak at the Kulsoom Bai Valika Hospital in Karachi. A two-member SHC bench, headed by Justice Adnanul Karim Memon and comprising Justice Muhammad Jaffer Raza, issued the directives. The development comes months after Sindh Labour Minister Saeed Ghani confirmed that six of the at least 78 children infected with HIV at the Kulsoom Bai Valika Hospital had died. During the hearing today, the court directed that the committee

include two Grade-20 officers who have no direct administrative connection with the hospital or the investigation. SHC judge Justice Adnan observed that the matter concerned responsibilities relating to human life and public health. The committee will review details of patients receiving treatment and examine evidence relating to the transmission of HIV. It will also investigate whether disposable syringes or other medical equipment were reused at the hospital. The committee has been directed to examine records relating to the purchase, storage and use of auto-lock syringes at the hospital. As per the court order, the committee will also determine the roles and responsibilities of medical, nursing, technical and administrative officials and examine whether.

Finance Minister Aurangzeb calls for advancement in digital tech

ISLAMABAD: Federal Minister for Finance and Revenue, Senator Muhammad Aurangzeb, held a meeting with Chairperson Pakistan Digital Authority (PDA), Dr. Sohail Munir, to discuss digital transformation, digital finance and measures to improve the use of technology to enhance access to finance and support economic activity.
